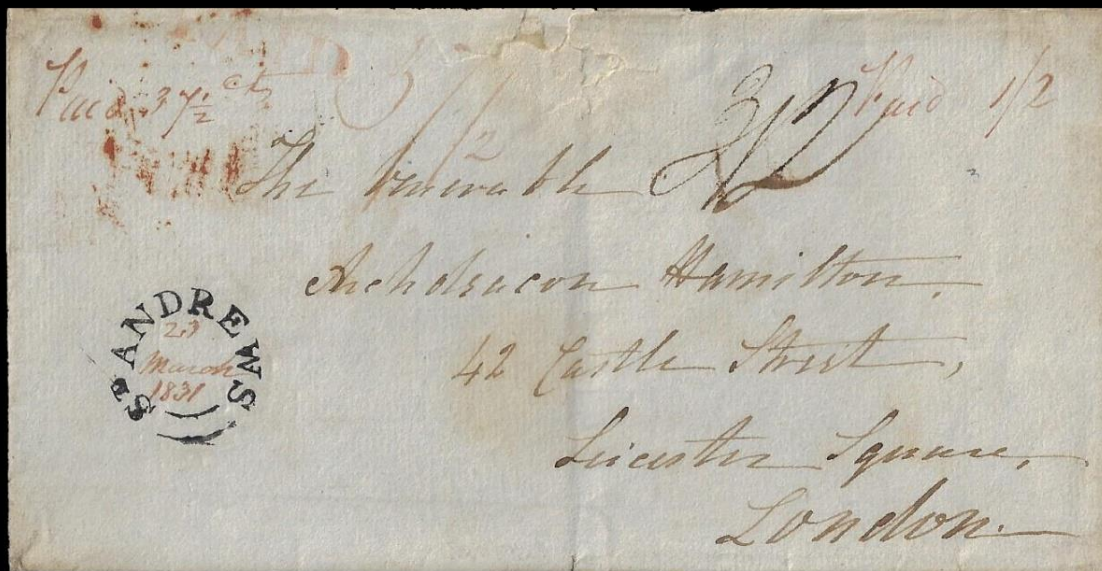

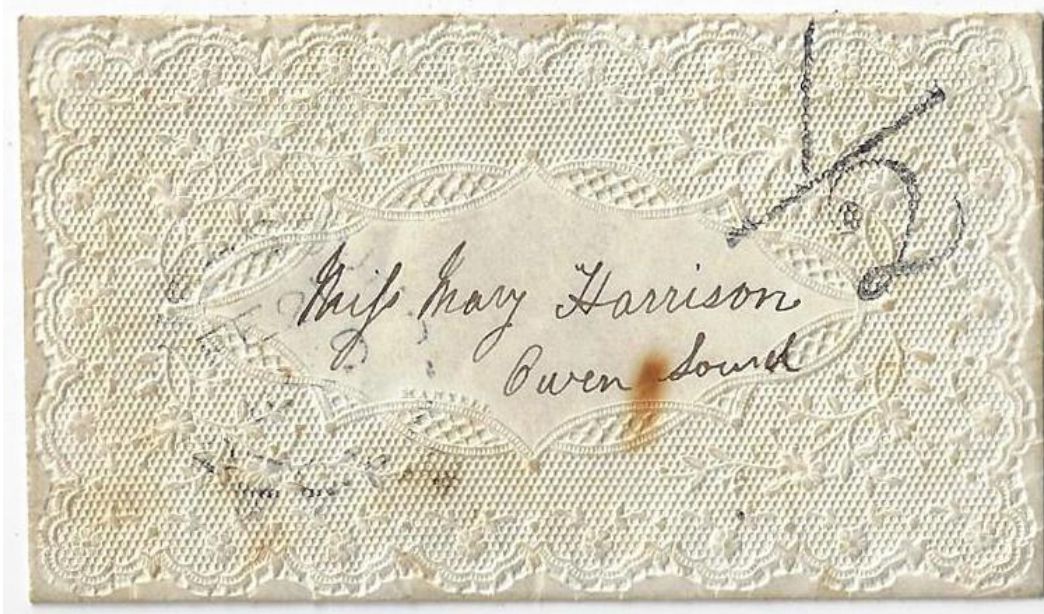

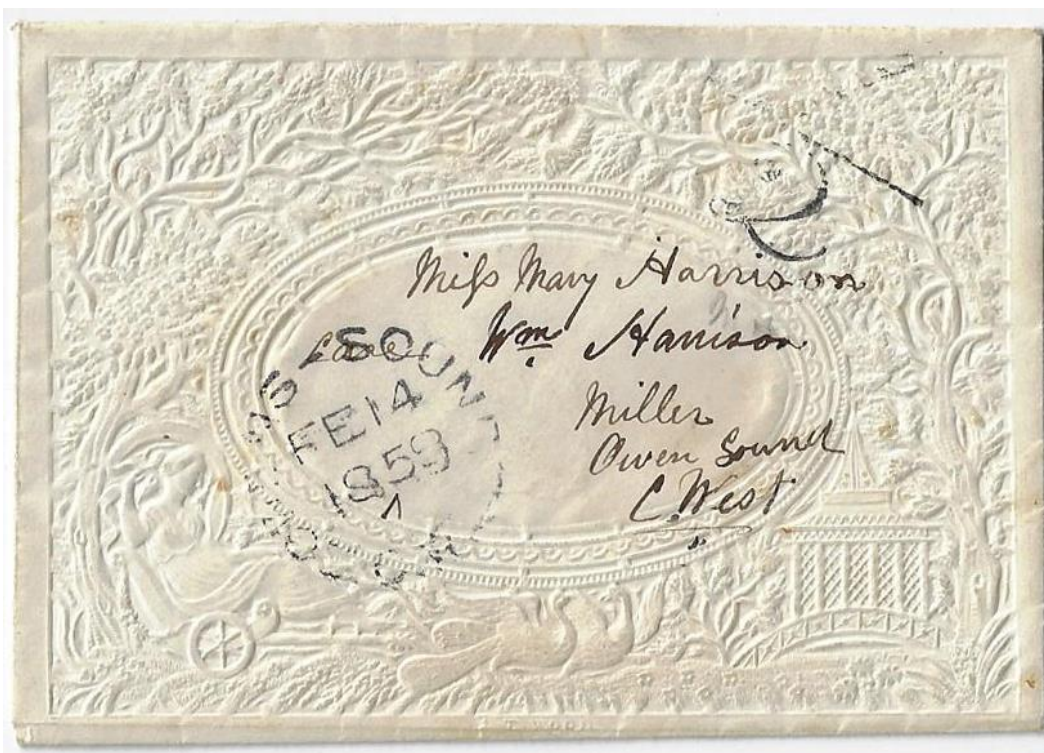

Item 565-03 – **Beaver Valentine cover** – 1862, 5¢ Beaver on embossed Valentine cover from Thorold UC, dated FE 13 62, paying 5¢ letter rate to St. Ann's (b/s). St. Ann's Lincoln and GWR (b/s). VGG cert G24292. \$275.00 **SOLD**



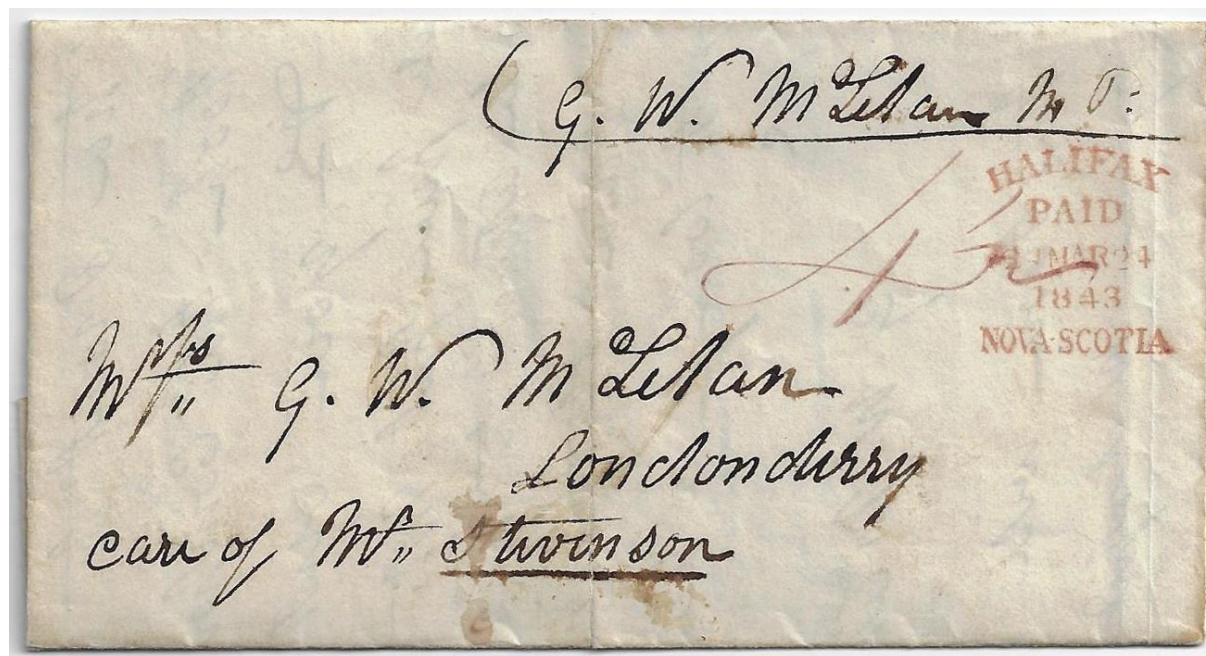
Item 565-04 – **Beaver on lady embossed cover** – 1864, 5¢ Beaver tied by large grid cancel on embossed lady cover from Port Dover UC paying 5¢ letter rate to Beamsville (b/s). Reduced at left. \$150.00



Item 565-05 – **Lady roses embossed cover to U.S.** – 1855, stampless lady cover from Barnston CE paid 10¢ paying the cross-border rate to Vermon. Exchange markings and routed via Stanstead (b/s). Stanstead County. \$100.00 **SOLD**



Item 565-06 – **Lady embossed cover to U.S.** – 1851, stampless lady cover from Eaton CE paid 10¢ paying the cross-border rate to Vermont. Exchange markings and routed via Stanstead (b/s). Compton County. \$100.00



Item 565-07 – **Gloud W. McLellan, 17th General Assembly of Nova Scotia** – 1843, folded letter from Halifax with tombstone Halifax Paid handstamp, rated 4½d to Londonderry (Halifax b/s). The letter is signed by Gloud Wilson McLellan (1796-1858) a Nova Scotia businessman and politician. He represented Londonderry Township from 1836 to 1847 and Colchester County from 1851 to 1858 in the Nova Scotia House of Assembly. \$125.00 **SOLD**

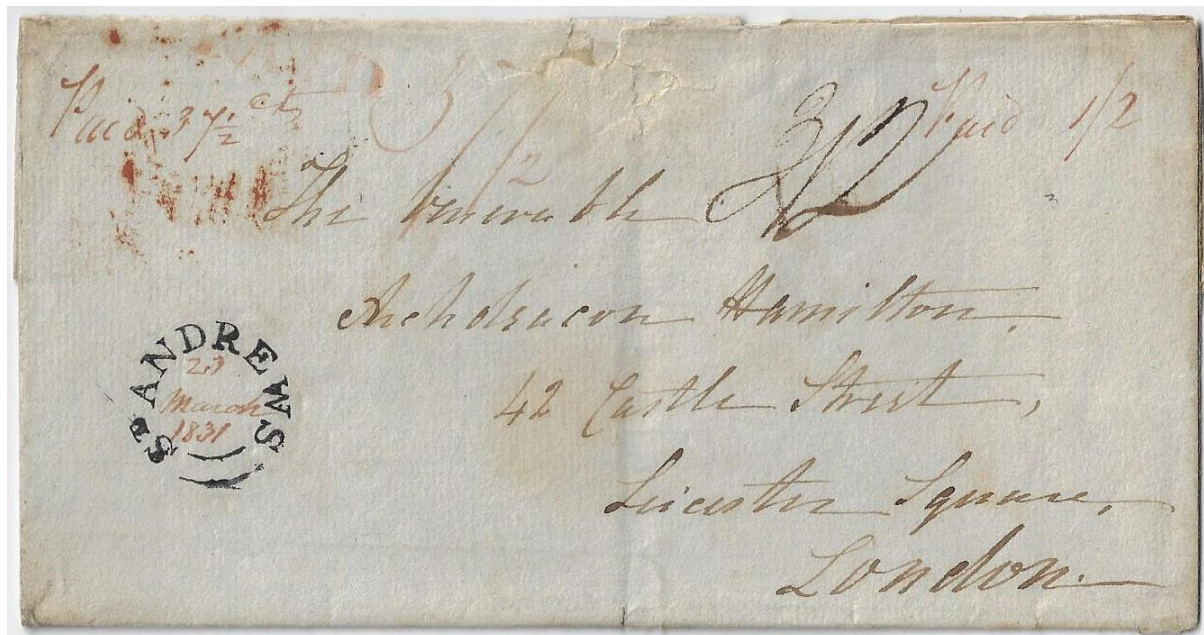

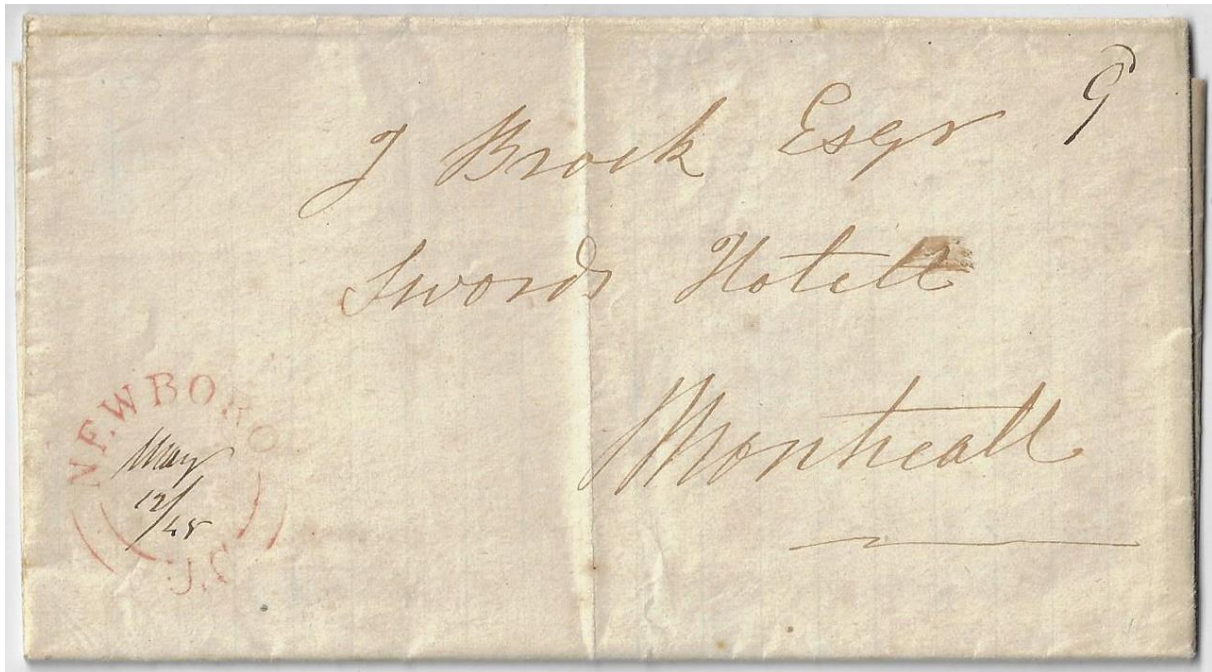
Item 565-08 – **John C. Wade, Nova Scotia MPP** – 1853, cover with autograph letter signed by John C. Wade, mailed from Halifax dated MR 18 53, rated 3d prepaid to Digby. John Chipman Wade (1817-1892) was a Canadian politician and lawyer who served in both the Nova Scotia House of Assembly (Speaker) and the House of Commons of Canada for Digby County. \$125.00



Item 565-09 – **St. Andrews LC to England (Argenteuil County)** – 1831, folded cover from St. Andrews LC (*Argenteuil County, early and exhibit strike struck in black – ms date in red*) to London England. Fully prepaid to New York with double 7d (1/2) and double 18¾¢ (37½¢). Carried by private trader from New York to Liverpool with Ship Letter Liverpool (b/s) and cds 29 AP 31 (b/s). Then, rated 3/2 Stg collect as a double letter with double 8d Stg ship letter fee plus double 11d Stg inland postage to London. Exhibit quality. \$400.00 **SOLD**



Item 565-10 – **25¢ collect in Guelph CW** – 1859, partly printed partly written mailed unpaid letter from Liverpool to Guelph CW (b/s). Carried by Canadian Packet from Liverpool to Quebec. Rated 25¢ collect, representing 6d Stg or 12½¢ plus 6d or 12½¢ penalty for 25¢ collect. The 4 accounting mark is 4d due to Britain and represents 1d of 6d Stg rate plus half the fine. An early transatlantic Cents cover and a choice unpaid letter to Guelph. \$200.00



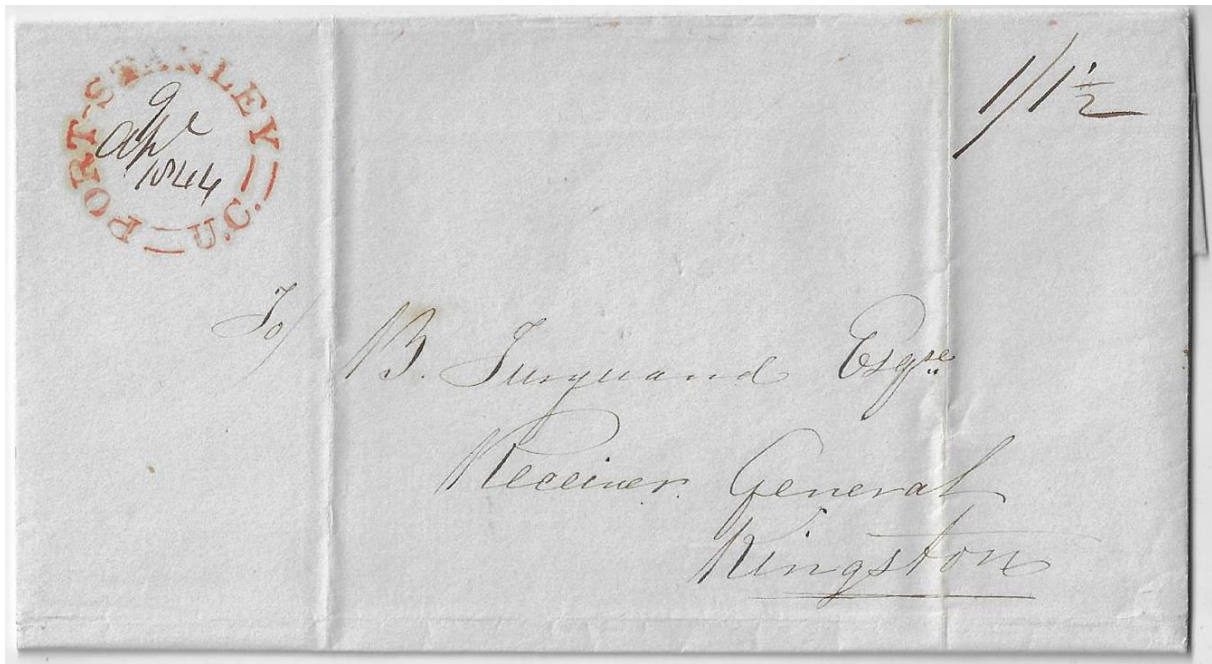
Item 565-11 – **Newboro UC (Leeds)** – 1845, folded letter signed by Richard Luckins, datelined Bedford 10 MY 45, mailed from Newboro (one of the 2 hammers), rated 9d collect to Montreal. A pretty Leeds County item! \$100.00



Item 565-12 – **Moira UC (Hastings and 2nd recorded example)** – 1843, friend letter signed by Samuel Baker, mailed from Moira UC paid 7d to Kingston (b/s). This is the 2nd recorded example and the earliest recorded date by 12 years. A spectacular and exhibit quality Hasting County letter. \$350.00



Item 565-13 – **Mill Creek UC (1839-1856 – Lennox and Addington)** – 1846, folded letter signed by George McDonnell, dated 13 JY 46, mailed from Mill Creek UC (*the 2nd recorded example and earliest*) paid 9d to Toronto (b/s). There are only 2 known examples which are dated 13 JY 46 and 16 JY 46. Mill Creek was in operation from 1839 to 1856. Exhibit quality. \$400.00



Item 565-14 – **Port Stanley UC (Elgin)** – 1844, Customs House folded letter from Port Stanley UC rated 1/1½d to Kingston (b/s). This postmark is recorded from 1843 to 1849. Exhibit quality. \$125.00



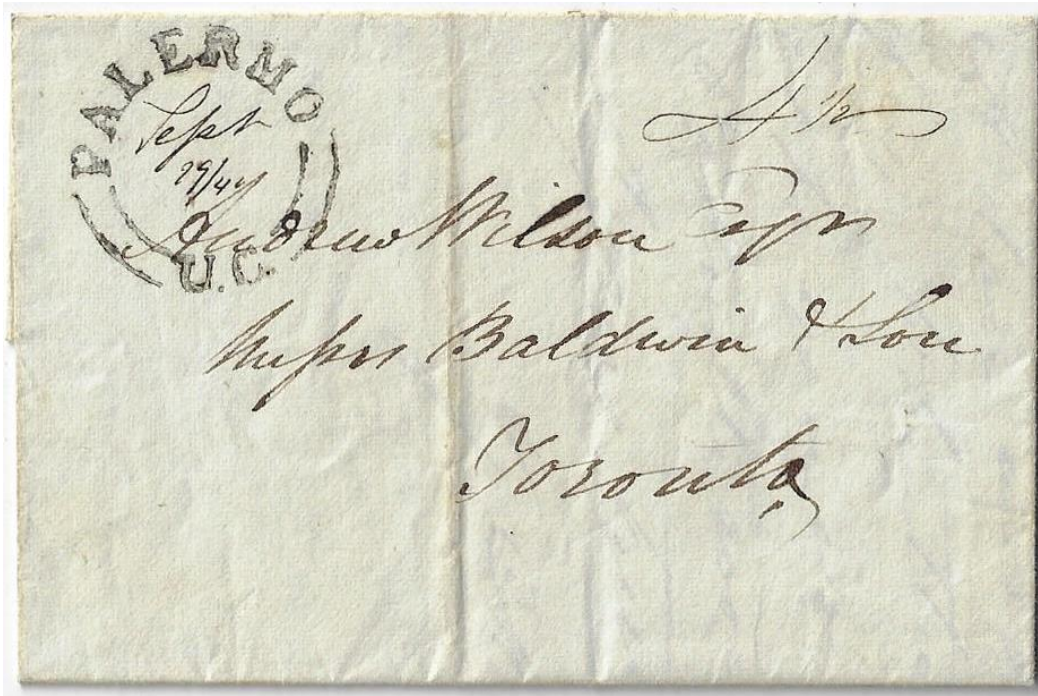
Item 565-15 – **Pembroke UC (Renfrew)** – 1850, timber folded letter from Pembroke UC paid 9d to Bytown (b/s). A very pretty italic "PAID" handstamp. The letter relates to timber cut etc. \$100.00



Item 565-16 – **Nanticoke UC (Haldimand)** – 1843, folded letter signed by David Field, datelined Walpole AU 20 43, mailed from Nanticoke paid 7d to Niagara (b/s). This is the earliest recorded date and a very scarce Haldimand office. Exhibit quality. \$125.00



Item 565-17 – **Nottawasaga UC (1841-1857 – Simcoe)** – 1849, partial folded letter from Nottawasaga UC (*the earliest recorded by 2½ years*) rated 9d collect to Chippawa (b/s). Routed via Barrie, Toronto, Holland Landing and Queenston (b/s). to Toronto (b/s). An interesting letter showing the full route from a short-lived Simcoe office. \$350.00



Item 565-18 – **Palermo UC (Halton)** – 1840, folded letter datelined Trafalgar 28 SE 40, mailed from Palermo UC rated 4½d collect to Toronto. The letter is addressed to Deacon Andrew Wilson, Archdiocese of Toronto. Exhibit quality. \$125.00



Item 565-19 – **One half penny -cracked plate** – 1858, one half penny Scott 8 (*cracked plate*) tied by Four-ring 21 cancel on cover from Montreal paying ½d drop letter rate. Very fine! \$1,500.00 **SOLD**



Item 565-20 – **3d Beaver on promissory note banking letter** – 1858, 3d Beaver tied by Four-ring 18 cancel on Notary Public printed letter from Kingston paying 3d letter rate to Port Hope. \$400.00

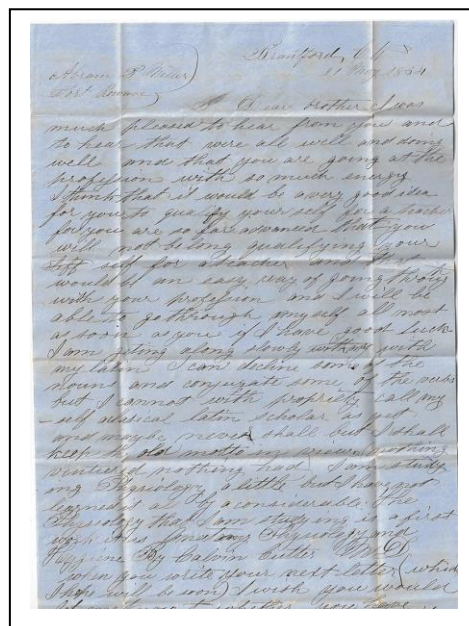

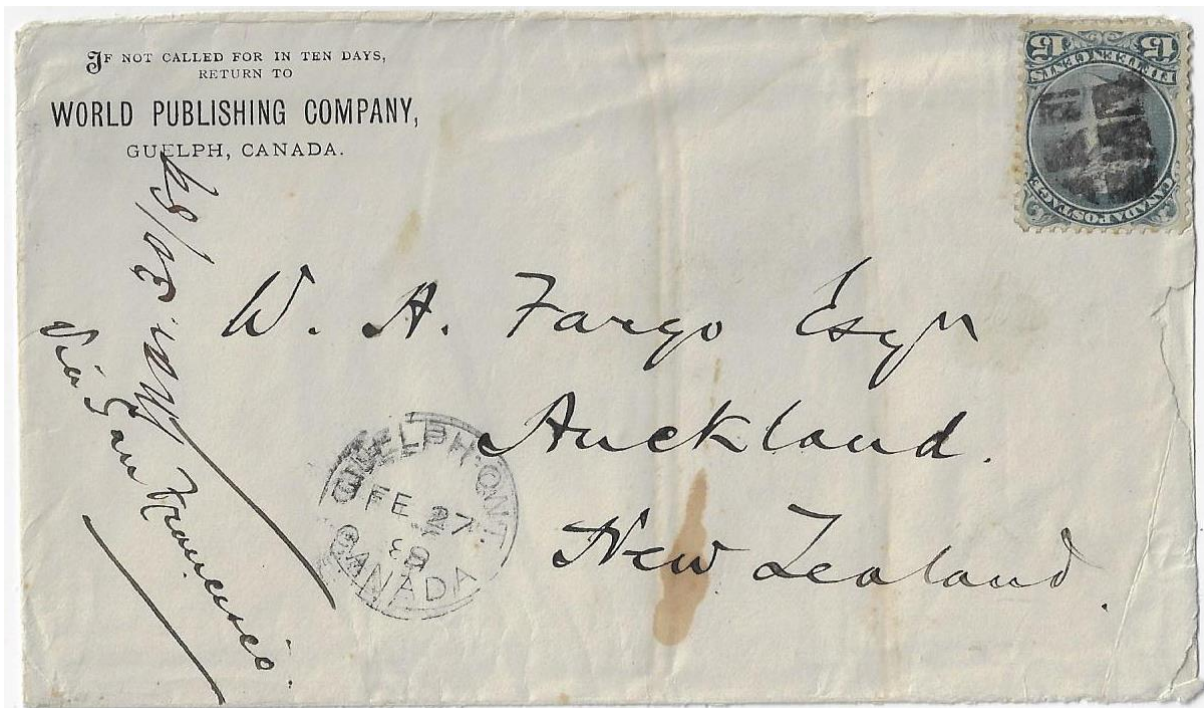

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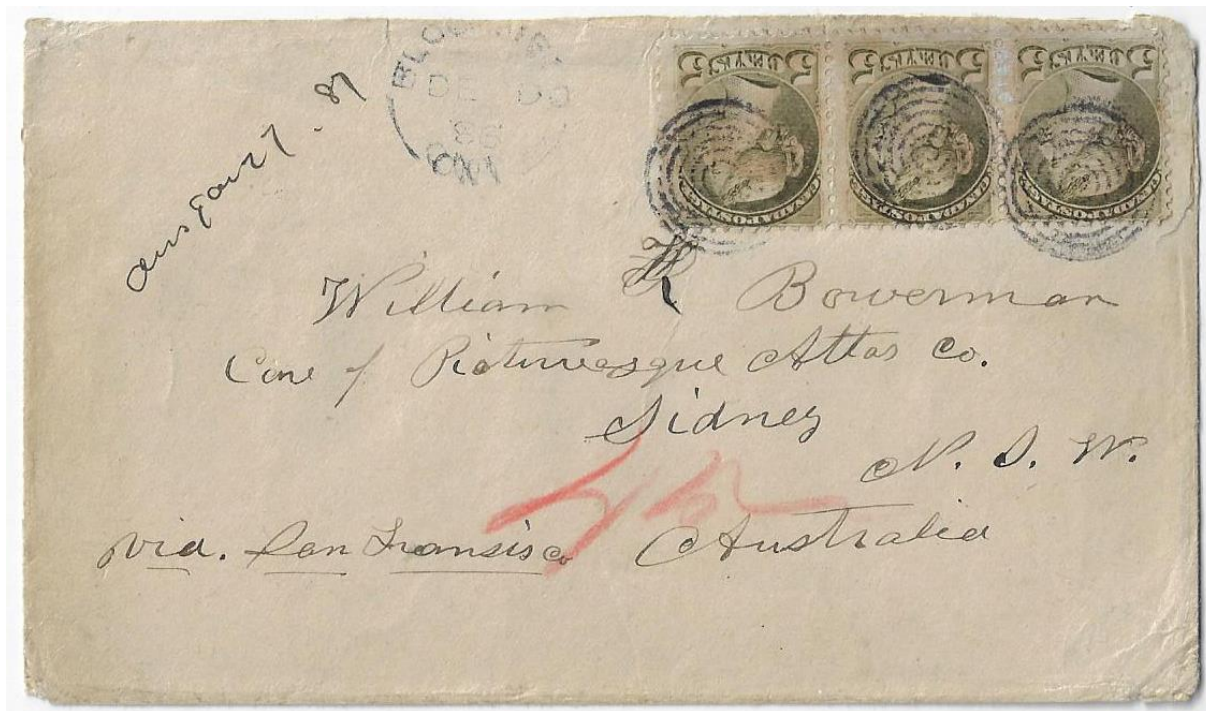

Item 565-21 – **3d Beaver on thinner paper** – 1854, 3d Beaver, red, on thinner wove paper tied by blue concentric ring cancel on cover from Brantford paying 3d letter rate to Port Rowan (b/s). Expertization 2019. Miller family letter accompanies. Ex Highlands. \$600.00



Item 565-22 – **15¢ Large Queen to New Zealand** – 1889, 15¢ LQ (blue grey) cancelled by fancy cancel on publishing company c/c cover from Guelph Ontario, FE 27 89, paying the non-UPU letter rate to New Zealand (b/s). Routed via Windsor Ont and San Francisco (b/s). The stamp is overpaying the new 12¢ rate that had been recently reduced from 15¢ to 12¢. 32 days in transit. Ex Shorting. \$1,200.00



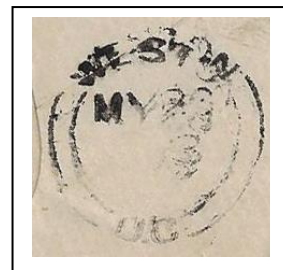
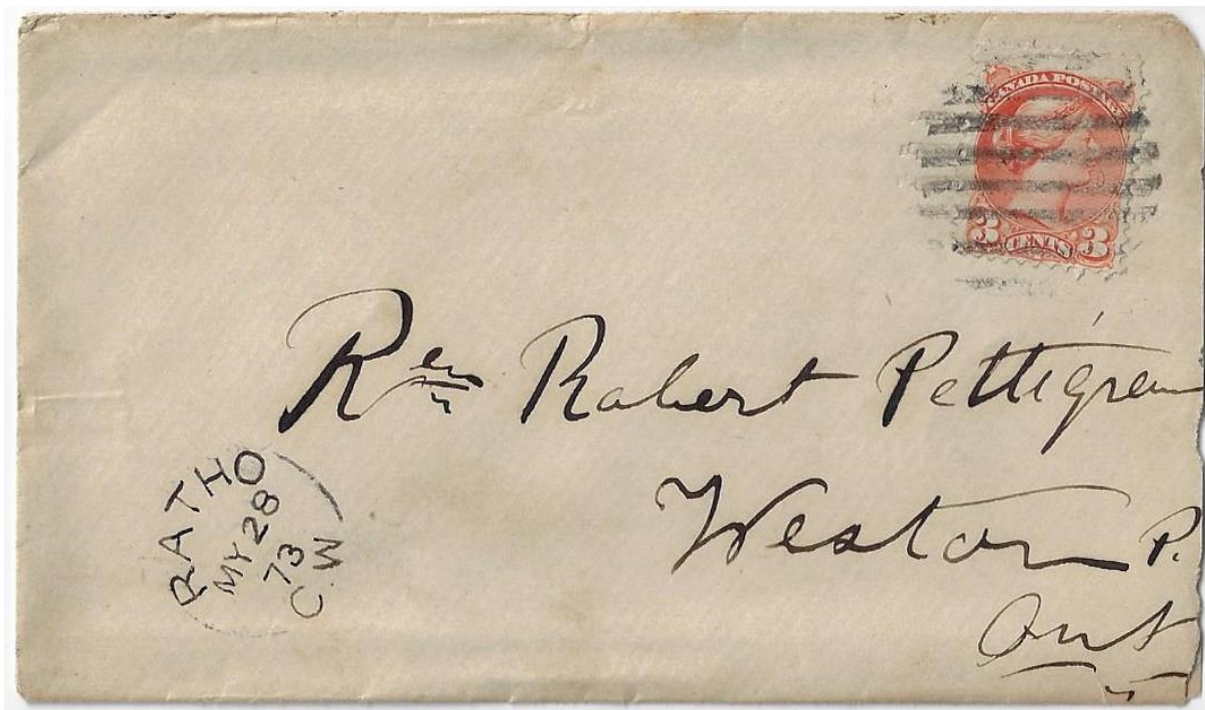
Item 565-23 – **Bloomfield Ont - 15¢ to Australia** – 1886, 5¢ SQ dull olive strip of 3 tied by neat concentric ring cancels on cover from Bloomfield Ont paying 15¢ non-UPU letter rate to Sydney, NSW (b/s). Windsor Ont and SF (b/s). \$1,250.00



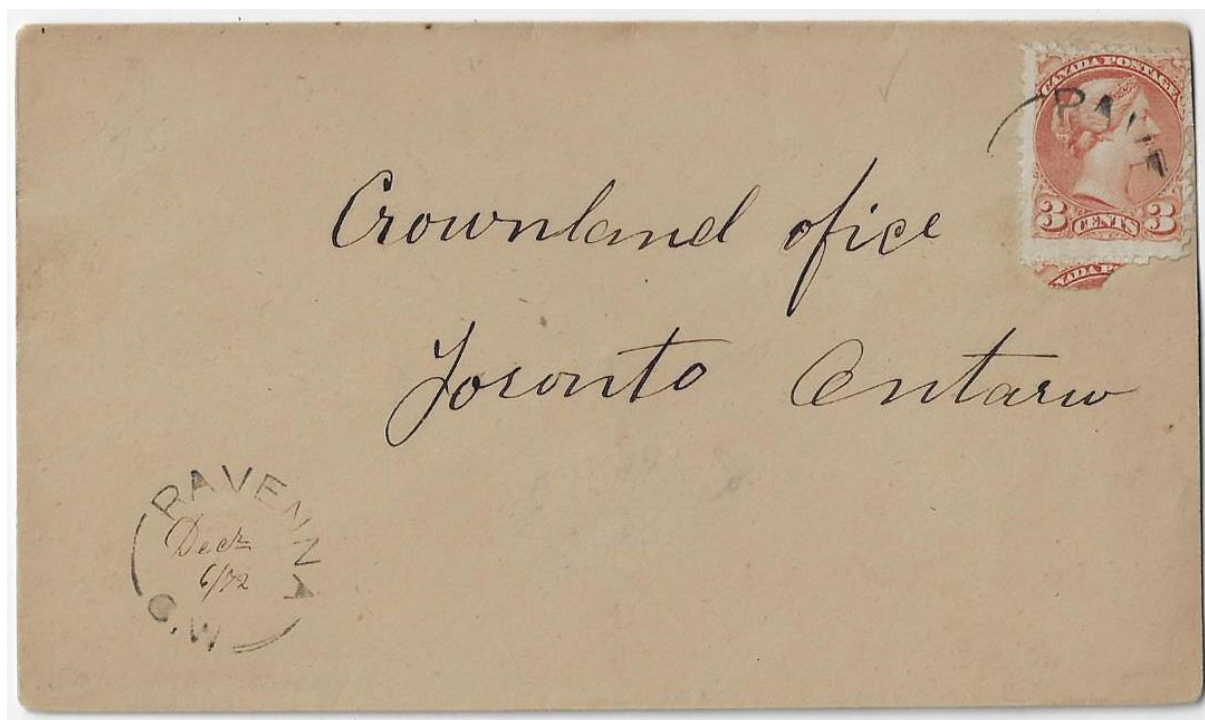
Item 565-24 – **5¢ UPU to Brazil** – 1896, 5¢ SQ tied by grid cancel on cover from Weymouth NS paying 5¢ UPU letter rate to Brazil (b/s). Halifax (b/s). \$400.00



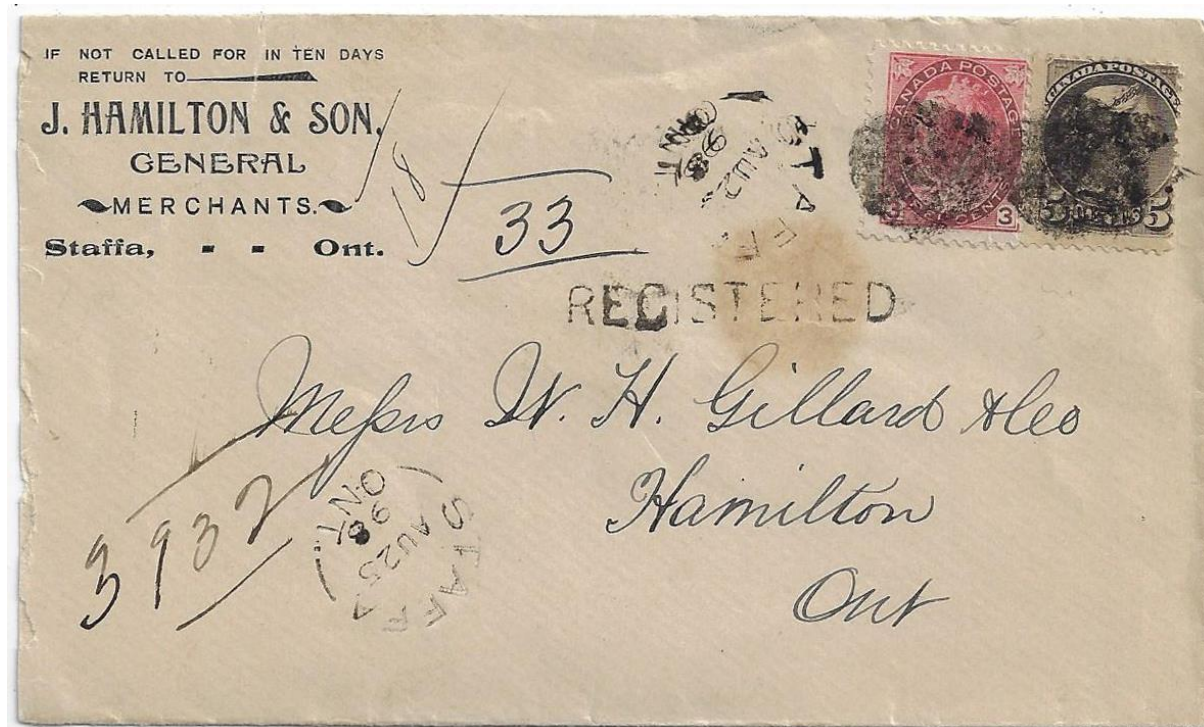
Item 565-25 – **Nissouri UC (Oxford 1853-1894)** – 1879, 1¢, 2¢ SQ cancelled by matching pen cancel on cover from Nissouri Ont paying 3¢ letter rate to Tavistock (b/s) via Woodstock (b/s). This is the latest recorded of the hammer 1. Exceedingly rare! \$150.00 **SOLD**



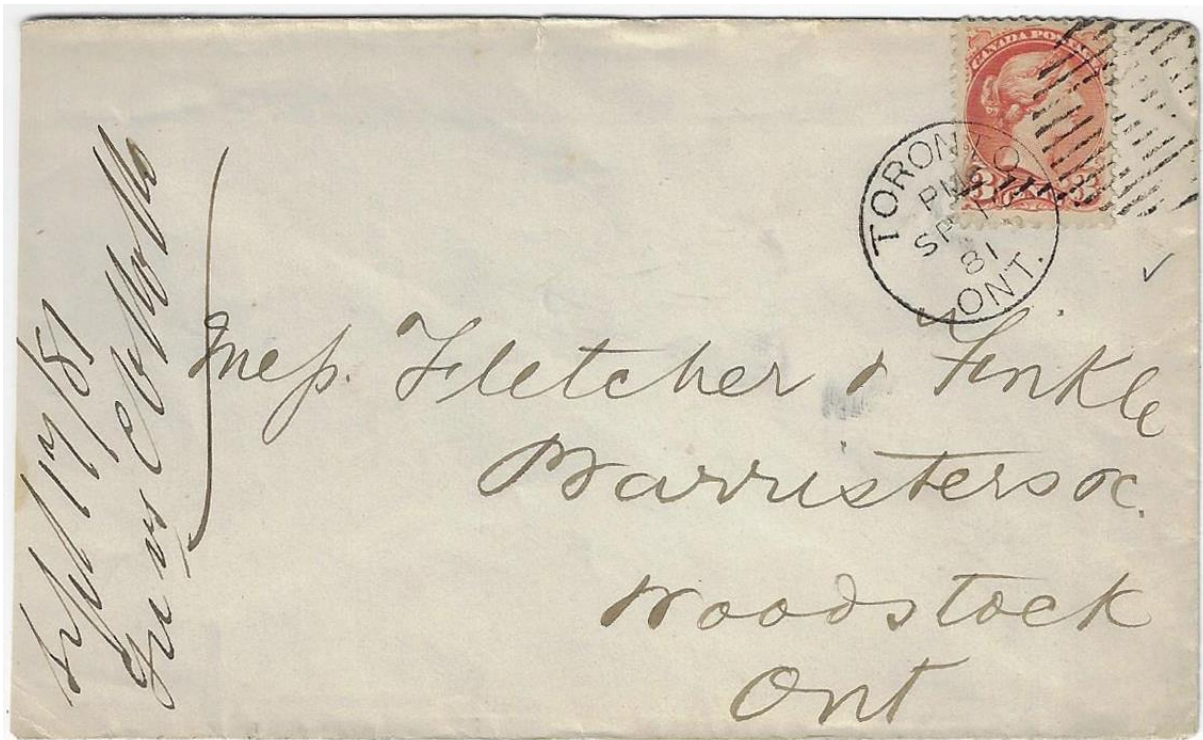
Item 565-26 – **Ratho CW Berri hammer (Oxford)** – 1873, 3c SQ tied by large grid cancel on cover from Ratho CW (*enhanced by contemporary ink*) paying 3c letter rate to Weston (b/s – York, latest recorded date by 3 years). Reduced at right. A scarce Oxford office, closed in 1913. \$50.00



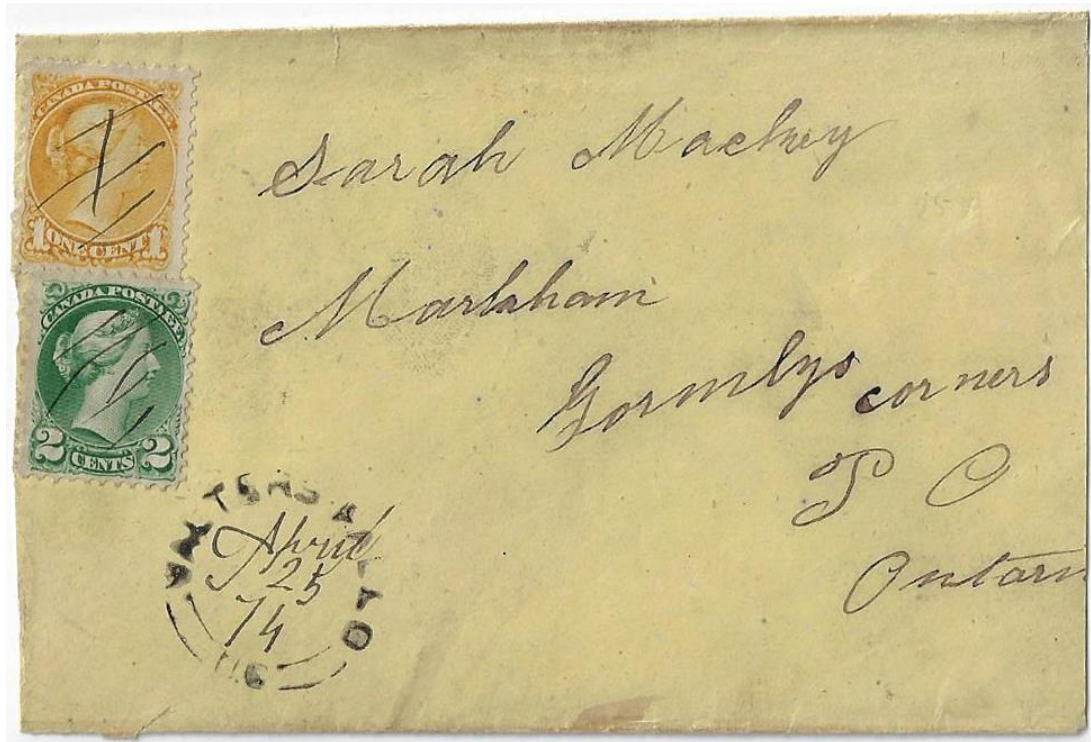
Item 565-27 – **Ravenna CW Berri hammer (Grey)** – 1872, 3c SQ tied by Ravenna CW Berri hammer on cover paying 3c letter rate to Toronto (b/s). Ravenna CW with ms date DE 6 72. Light reduction at right. \$50.00



Item 565-28 – **Staffa Postmaster and General Merchant** – 1898, 5¢ SQ, 3¢ Numeral tied by cork cancel on J. Hamilton & Son General Merchant c/c cover paying 8¢ registered letter rate to Hamilton (b/s) via Dublin (b/s). Carried by Brantford & Goderich RyPO. Hamilton was also the Staffa postmaster from 1871 to 1903. \$100.00 **SOLD**



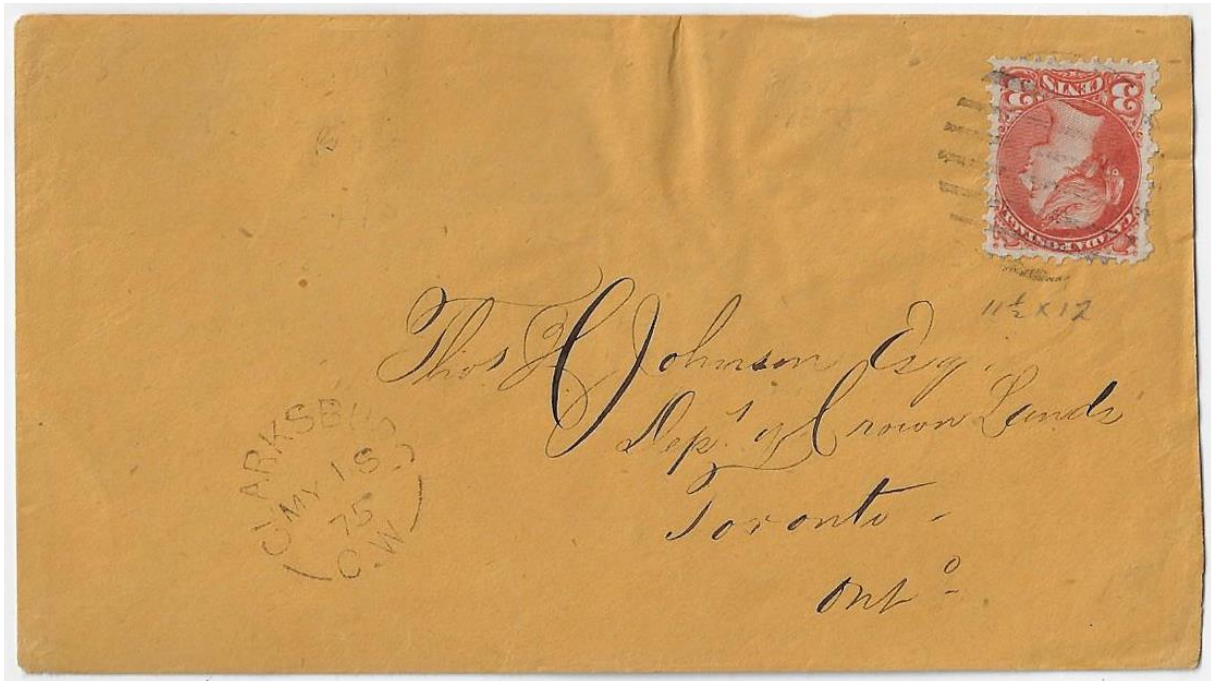
Item 565-29 – **Toronto North Branch – Intaglio “N” duplex** – 1881, 3¢ SQ tied by Toronto North Branch intaglio “N” duplex cancel (14-bar circular killer with intaglio 'N' indicating North) on cover paying 3¢ letter rate to Woodstock (b/s). This hammer is recorded from January 1881 to January 1882. Light reduction at left. Ex Draves. \$325.00



Item 565-30 – **Walter's Falls UC (Grey)** – 1874, 1¢, 2¢ SQ cancelled by matching pen cancel on cover from Walter's Falls UC paying 3¢ letter rate to Gormley (b/s). Reduced both sides. A very scarce pre-confederation hammer. \$100.00



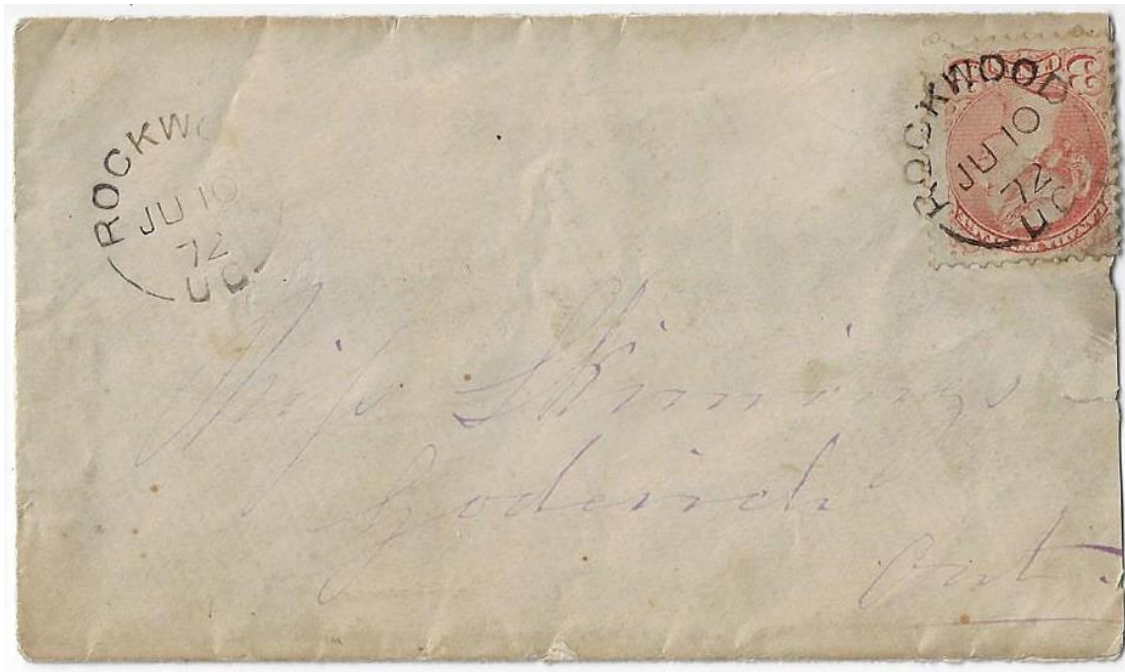
Item 565-31 – **Hillsburg CW (Wellington)** – 1876, 3¢ SQ tied by grid cancel on cover from Hillsburg CW paying 3¢ letter rate to Aldborough. Reduced at right. A rare pre-confederation hammer. \$75.00



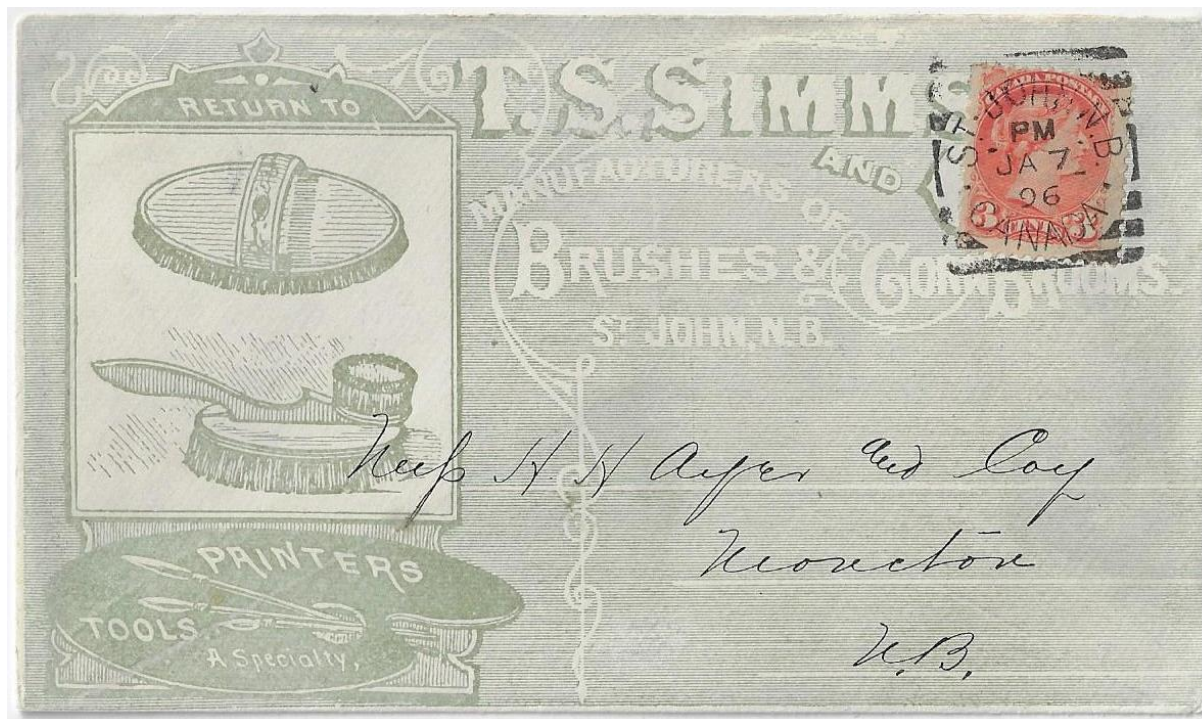

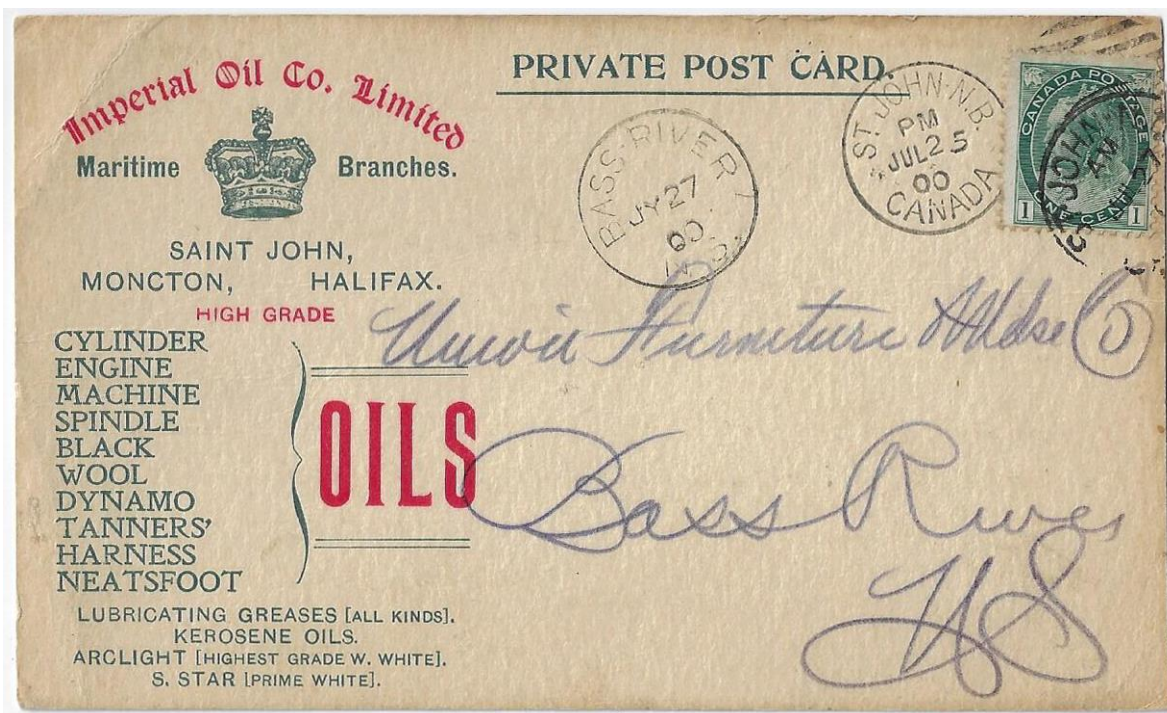
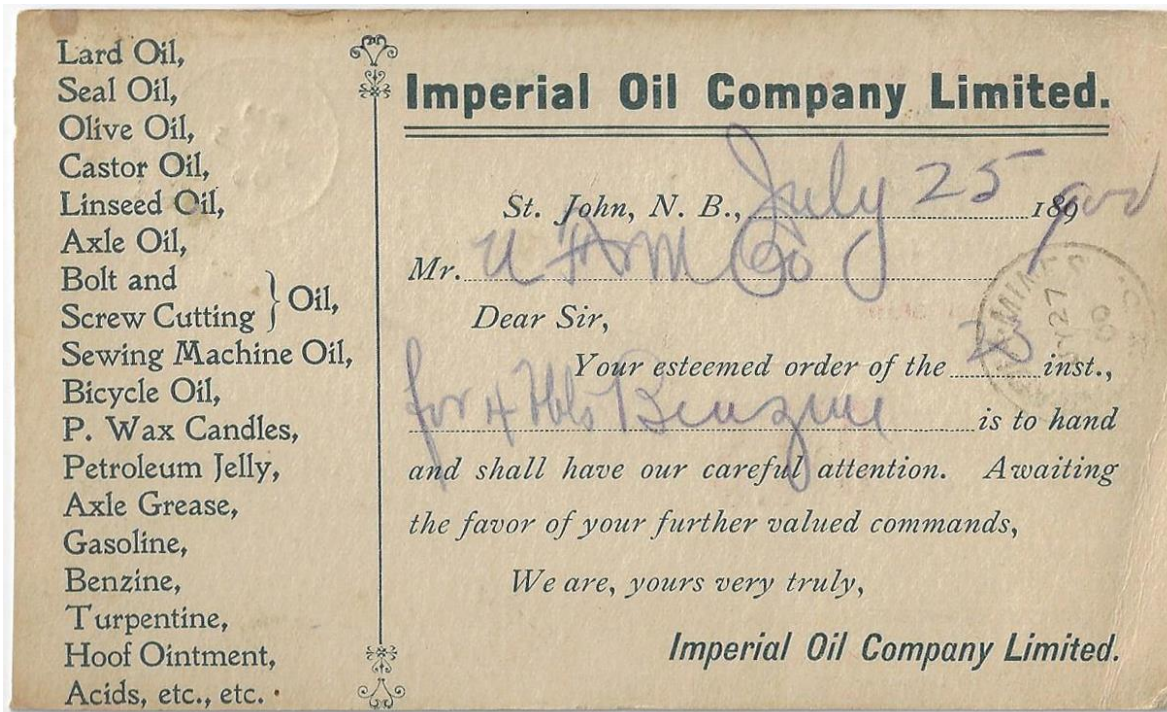
Item 565-35 – **St. John NB – T.S. Simms Brushes and Brooms** – 1896, 3¢ SQ tied by St. John squared circle on T.S. Simms Manufacturers of Brushes and Brooms advertising cover paying 3¢ letter rate to Moncton. In 1866, Thomas Simms established a small brush manufacturing business in Maine. In 1872, the business moved to St. John in partnership with broom maker John Murphy. The plant was located near the Reversing Falls on Bridge Street. \$200.00



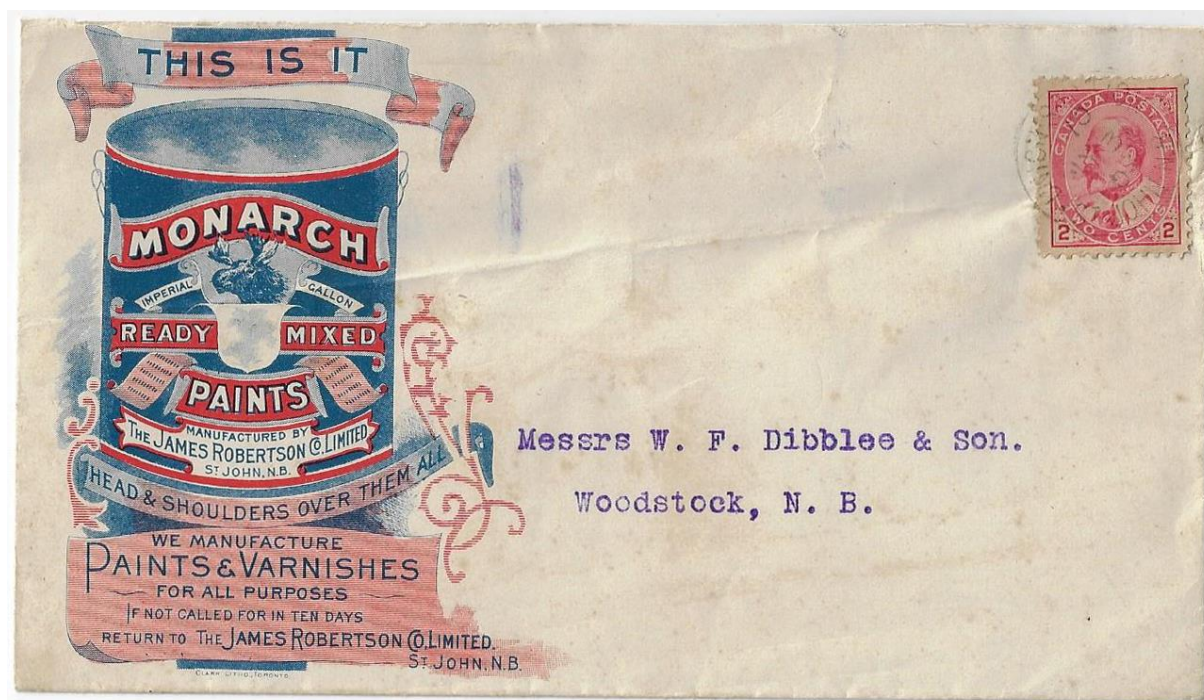
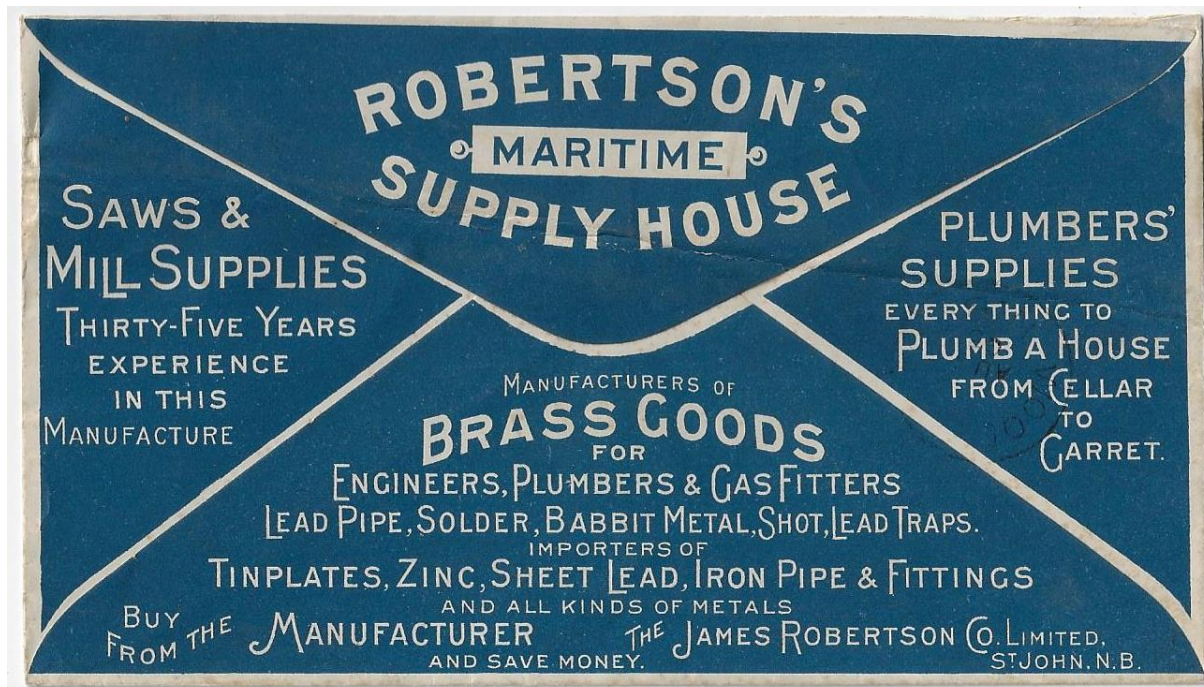
Item 565-36 – **St. John NB – W.H. Hayward China & Glassware** – 1895, 3¢ SQ tied by St. John NB squared circle on W.H. Hayward China Glassware & Earthenware advertising cover paying 3¢ letter rate to Moncton. Soon later the company name was changed to hayward & Warwick. The original store was burnt in the Great Fire of 1877. The new premises was built on Princess Street which remained the store’s site until its closure in January 2017. \$150.00



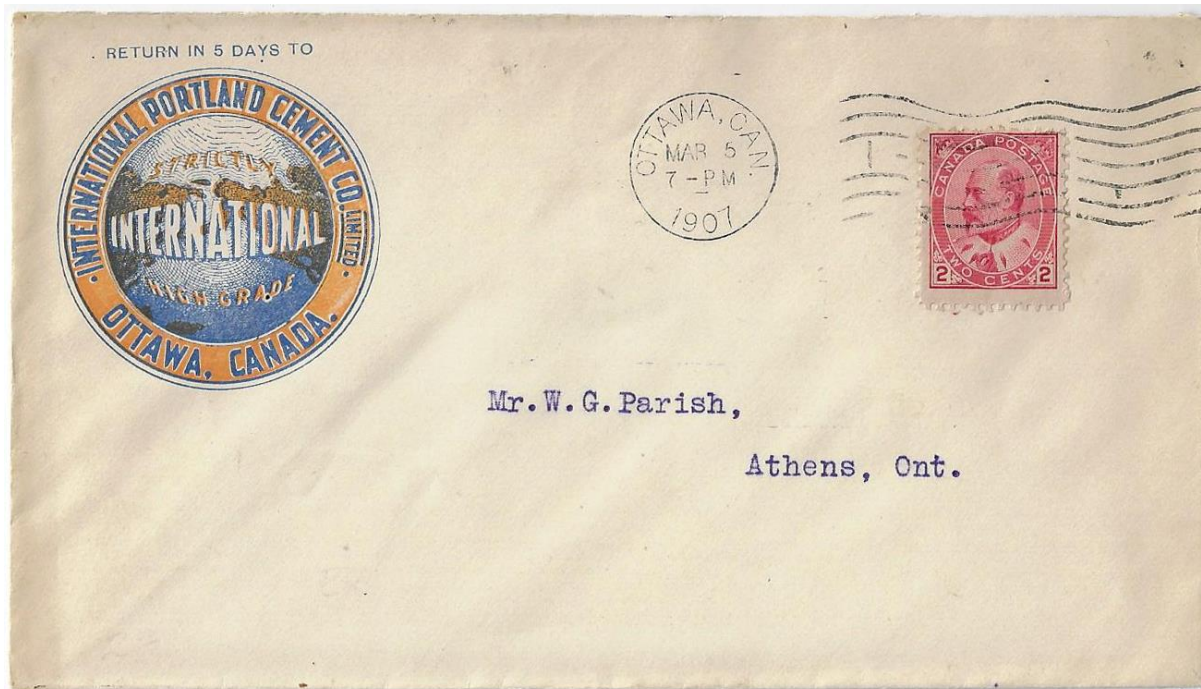
Item 565-37 – **Springhill NS registered mourning cover** – 1902, 1¢, 2¢ (3) Numeral tied by grid cancel on mourning cover from Springhill NS, squared circle MR 28 02, paying 7¢ registered letter rate to US (b/s). Halifax & St. John MC W (b/s). A rare mourning registered cover. \$250.00 **SOLD**



Item 565-38 – **Imperial Oil Co. private postcard** – 1900, Imperial Oil Co. private postcard initially mailed unpaid in St. John (duplex JUL 25 00), delayed for 2 days, 1¢ Numeral added, tied by St. John cds JUL 27 00, paying 1¢ postcard rate to Bass River via Acadia Mines (b/s). \$125.00 **SOLD**



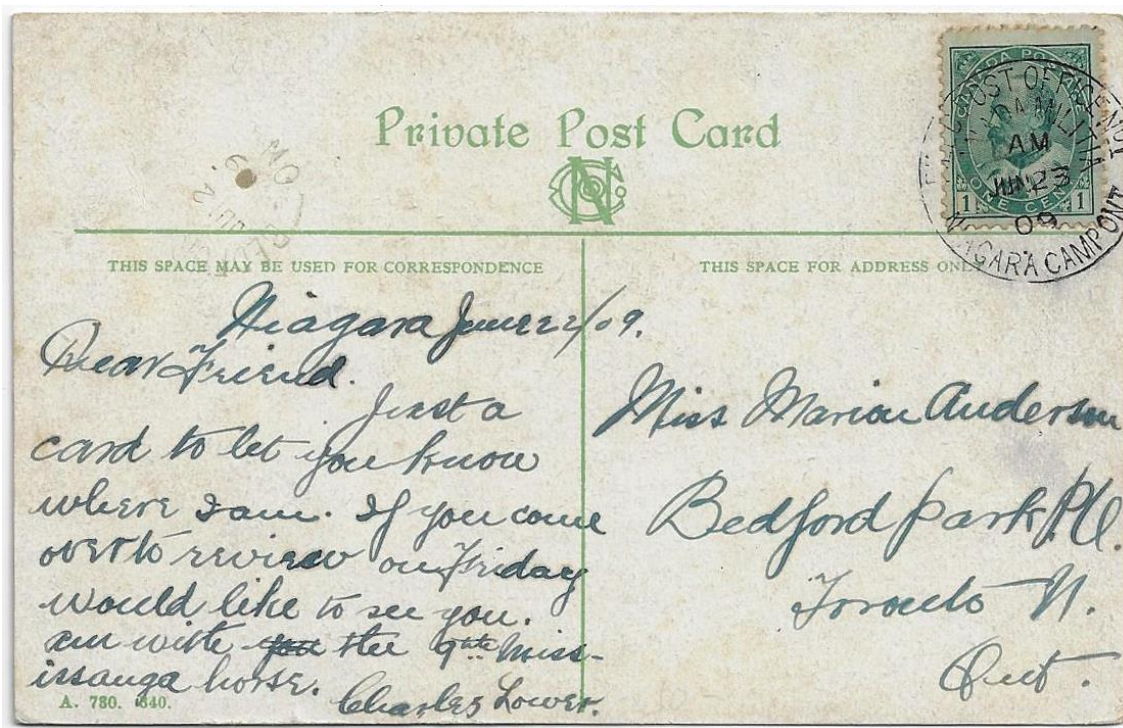

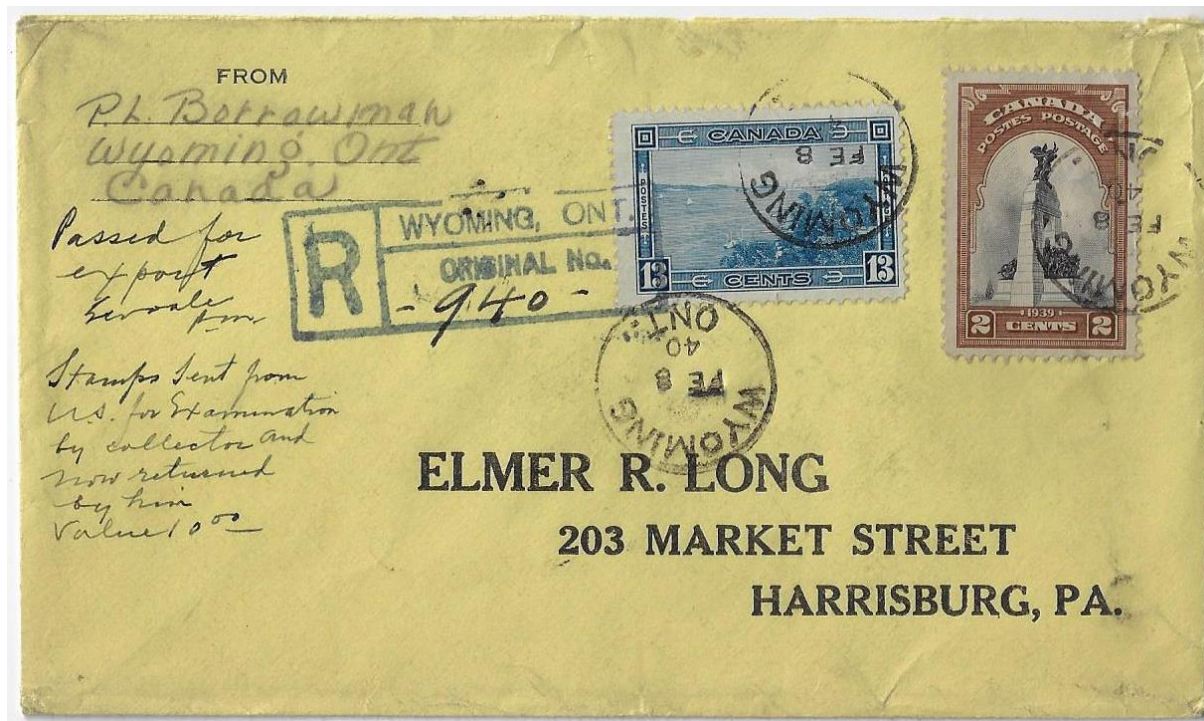
Item 565-50 – **Windsor Ont registered and FECB to U.S.** – 1940, 1¢, 2¢, 4¢ Pictorial coils, 1¢, 8¢ Mufti tied by Windsor Ont Walkerville P.S. cds on cover paying 15¢ double weight registered letter rate to U.S. FECB in London Ont, passed, with “censorship clerk” tape, the first issue of the FECB re-sealing labels. In response to concern about the term “censorship clerk” the subsequent printings amended the terminology to “Examiner”. \$75.00



Item 565-51 – **Hawkesbury Ont - FECB form B** – 1942, 3¢ Mufti tied by Hawkesbury Ont duplex cancel on FECB cover paying 3¢ letter rate to Philadelphia. Hawkesbury MOTO handstamp applied when passed for export with FECB permit application form B-13-B. \$50.00



Item 565-52 – Toronto Sub No.116 – full service – 1944, 7¢, 10¢ War, 10¢ Special Delivery E10 tied by Toronto Sub No.116 cds on FECB cover paying the full service (airmail, special delivery and registered) letter rate to US (b/s). Very scarce! \$75.00



Item 565-53 – **FECB – stamps sent from U.S. for examination** – 1940, 2¢ Royal Visit, 13¢ Pictorial tied by Wyoming Ont cds on cover paying 15¢ double weight registered letter rate to U.S. FECB passed for export and signed. “Stamps sent from U.S. for examination by collector and now returned by him value 10.00”. Routed via Hamilton and Toronto. \$35.00

Item 565-66 – **Quebec 1782 signed John Macdonald** – 1782, favoured autograph letter signed at Quebec, by John Macdonald, to John Trotter at Wolfes Cove (Anse au Foulon), regarding shipping timber. \$300.00

Anse au Foulon is a small cove at Quebec located about one and one-half miles above Quebec City, in the formerly independent town of Sillery. The cove was known and referred to as Wolfe's Cove by Sillery's once-sizable English-speaking population. The first written reference to this appellation pertains to the event which took place at the cove and its cliff in 1759. On the night of 12 September 1759, and early morning hours on the 13th, British forces commanded by James Wolfe landed at Anse au Foulon, prior to proceeding to the Plains of Abraham.

Addressed to "Mr. Ignace Dumouchelle" on back of the blank face. The paper is watermarked with an image of Britannia with shield and spear, in an oval frame surmounted by a crown. Remnants of a seal, with a small chip missing from the opposing blank face where the letter was opened. A few pin holes on the blank face. Otherwise near Fine. Rare.

In the letter, Franchère regrets that he is unable to advance any more money to a voyageur by the name of "Henault," having already advanced him a substantial amount. Franchère states that his instructions from the gentlemen of the "company" (the American Fur Company) indicate that he should not exceed £4, and that if "Henault" is honest, he will have no problem clearing his debt to Dumouchelle when he returns in the spring.

Gabriele Franchère (1786-1863) was born in Montréal. He joined John Jacob Astor's Pacific Fur Company in 1810, and accompanied the first voyage to the mouth of the Columbia to establish Astoria in 1811. He returned to Montréal in April of 1814 after the sale of Astoria to the North West Company, having refused employment offered by the new owners.

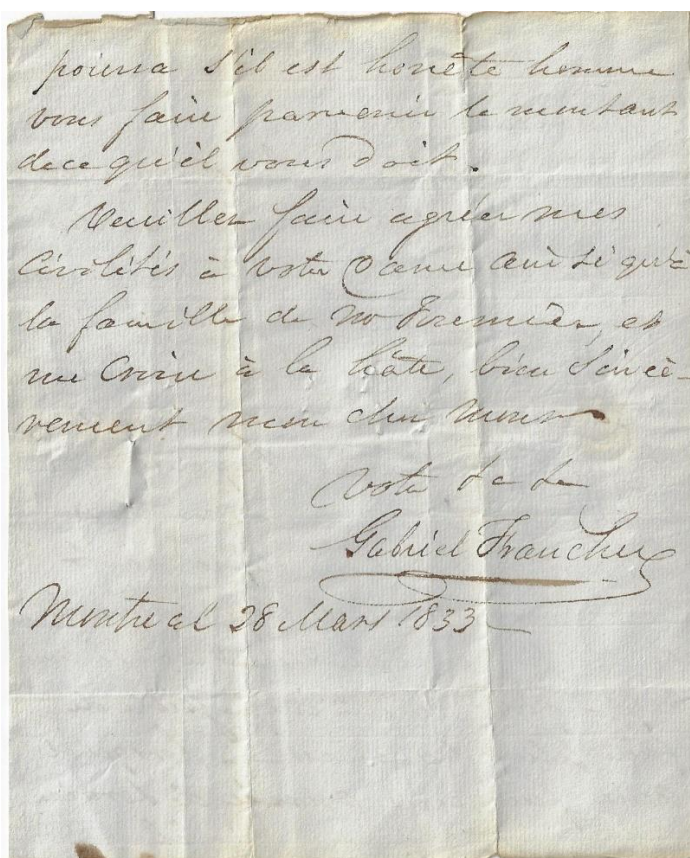
In 1820, he published an account of his travels as "Relation d'un voyage ..." (Montreal, 1820), which was subsequently translated into English and published as "Narrative of a Voyage ..." (New York, 1854).

In 1828, Franchère became Astor's Montréal agent for the American Fur Company, and continued in this capacity until 1834. He played an important role in enlisting and managing voyageur labour, as well as purchasing and shipping goods for the trade (probably within the Great Lakes region). He was also involved with the inevitable problems associated with voyageur management, including deserters and delinquents who gladly accepted cash advances and then headed for the woods. The letter offered here is an example of the kind of fur trade labour management issues that Franchère had to deal with as Montréal agent for the company.

In late 1834, Astor sold his interest in the American Fur Company, and Ramsay Crookes was appointed director. Franchère accepted the position of agent for the company at Sault Ste. Marie, and remained there until 1842.

This was a period of great change in the fur trade, and the business felt its effects: in 1842, the American Fur Company went into bankruptcy. Franchère was personally involved with settling outstanding debts of the company. Franchère eventually re-entered the fur trade with Pierre Choteau Jr. and company, and at a later date, set up his own firm, operating out of New York City.

Ignace Dumouchelle was probably one of the American Fur Company's field agents. Voyageur "Henault" was probably working for Dumouchelle

HUDSON'S BAY COMPANY.

PRIVATE INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE COMPANY'S AGENTS.

HUDSON'S BAY HOUSE,
London, November 22nd, 1858.

ALTHOUGH in former times the allowances and rations allowed by the custom of the Company were considered to be calculated on a very liberal scale, the Company are aware that of late, complaints have been raised that in those rations some luxuries are omitted which, though used by the labouring classes in modern times, were not thought necessary at the period when the scale of rations was originally arranged.

The Committee are anxious to conform to the change, and they have consequently included Tea and Sugar among the rations to be supplied to all classes of Servants, at the same time, that the option will be given to such as may choose to dispense with those articles, to get an equivalent for the whole, or for a part, in money.

In re-adjusting their Scale of Wages and Rations, the Company have thought it right to take the opinion of some of their retired Chief Factors as to the changes which ought to be made. They have accordingly consulted Mr. D. FINLAYSON and Mr. JAMES HARGRAVE, both of whom have within the last few weeks returned to this country, after forty years connection with the Company, and it is in conformity with their opinion that the present Scale of Wages and Rations has been determined on.

Mr. HARGRAVE, in speaking of Rations, says,

"I enclose a List of the customary Rations issued at York Factory to the Servants of the Honorable Company. This Scale of rations has, to my knowledge, been in use for the last twenty-eight years, at least, (formerly I believe they were less) and till lately they have ever been considered by the Servants as a most ample allowance. No Tea or Sugar has ever been given gratuitously as rations to labouring Servants, either by the Hudson's Bay or North-West Company. In regard to the giving of Tea and Sugar as portions of their rations to their Servants, I am of opinion that such would be easily done at York Factory and on the Shores of the Hudson's Bay, as also perhaps at all the Stations to the Southward of Portage La Loche; but in Athabaska, Mackenzie River, and New Caledonia, the requisite quantity of these articles might not always be available at the proper seasons, and a breach of contract on the part of the Company (for in that light would such a failure be interpreted), might be productive of considerable inconvenience."

To obviate this inconvenience, Mr. HARGRAVE recommends the alternative of Tea and Sugar, or a sum of money in lieu of it; and you will observe that his recommendation has been adopted.

Mr. HARGRAVE, who was for many years at the head of the Company's affairs at York Factory, speaks particularly of the requirements of that place; but in allusion to the other Stations, he says:—"In regard to *Inland* Rations, I am less informed of details, but have

"always understood that at *Ice* Stations a Servant helps himself to as many fish and potatoes, as he is able to carry off for himself and family. At most Stations, such as Sauc-kah-wan and Sauc River, the same rule prevails, unless in "cases of scarcity" when the rations are weighed to the Servants, being, as I am informed, *5 lbs.* good Buffalo meat for one Servant, half that quantity for a wife, and a quarter for each child, in addition to which, they have whatever quantity of potatoes they may choose to consume, all free of cost. At these Posts, however, *flow* forms part of the rations of the Servants, and only a limited part of those of the Officers."

I enclose a Statement drawn up by Mr. HARGRAVE, of the Standard of Rations supplied at York Factory, by which you will be able to judge of the quantity and quality of the food provided for the men (See List attached).

As it may be important to some engaging to go to so distant a Country to know upon what terms they can obtain supplies of Clothing and other articles not included among the regular rations served out to them, it is as well you should be aware that the Company supplies all the goods in their Stores to their own use on such terms that they cost little, if anything, higher than they do in this Country.

I think it is necessary to give you these particulars for your private guidance. It is not the wish of the Company to hold out expectations to the men in which they will be disappointed, but the men engaging may depend that any promise made to them will be strictly adhered to.

It may be added that as it is understood that some Servants have represented, though we believe without any just cause, that they have a difficulty in obtaining a settlement of their accounts while at the Stations, or of ascertaining how their balances with the Company stand, all their returns to this Country, directions have been given to the Officers in charge of all the Stations that every man in the service is to be furnished annually with a Copy of his account, so that he may know his precise position.

The Company's Ships will for Hudson's Bay in June, and all servants continuing to enter the service of the Company must be prepared to embark either in London, Stockholm, or Stornoway, according to circumstances, of which this notice will be given.

Should the servants engaged be required to come to London for Embarkation the expenses of their journey will be paid by the Company, and in all cases they will be put on board free of expense.

The following is a Statement of Labourers, Mechanics, and Boatmen, required for the service of the Hudson's Bay Company in 1859.

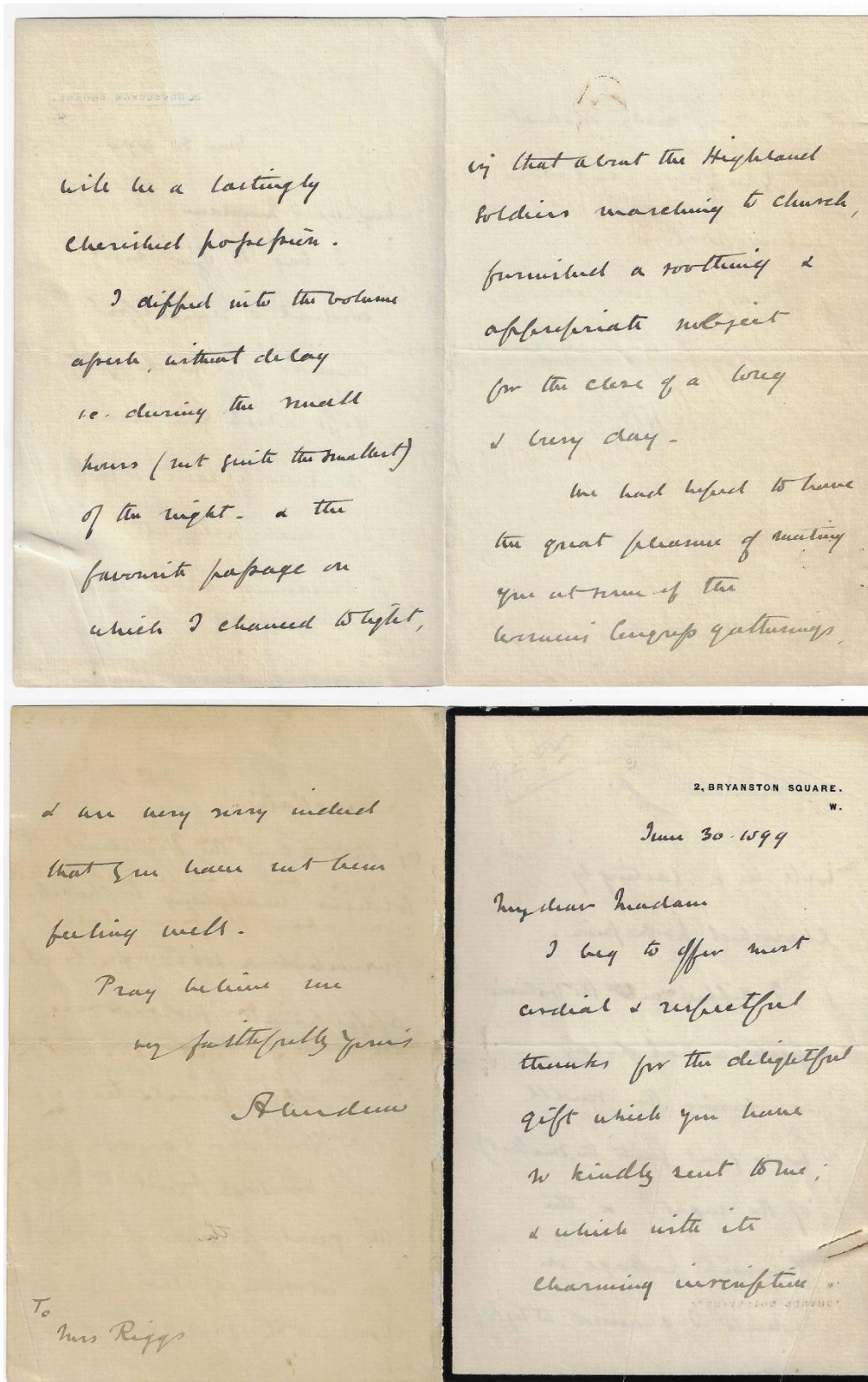

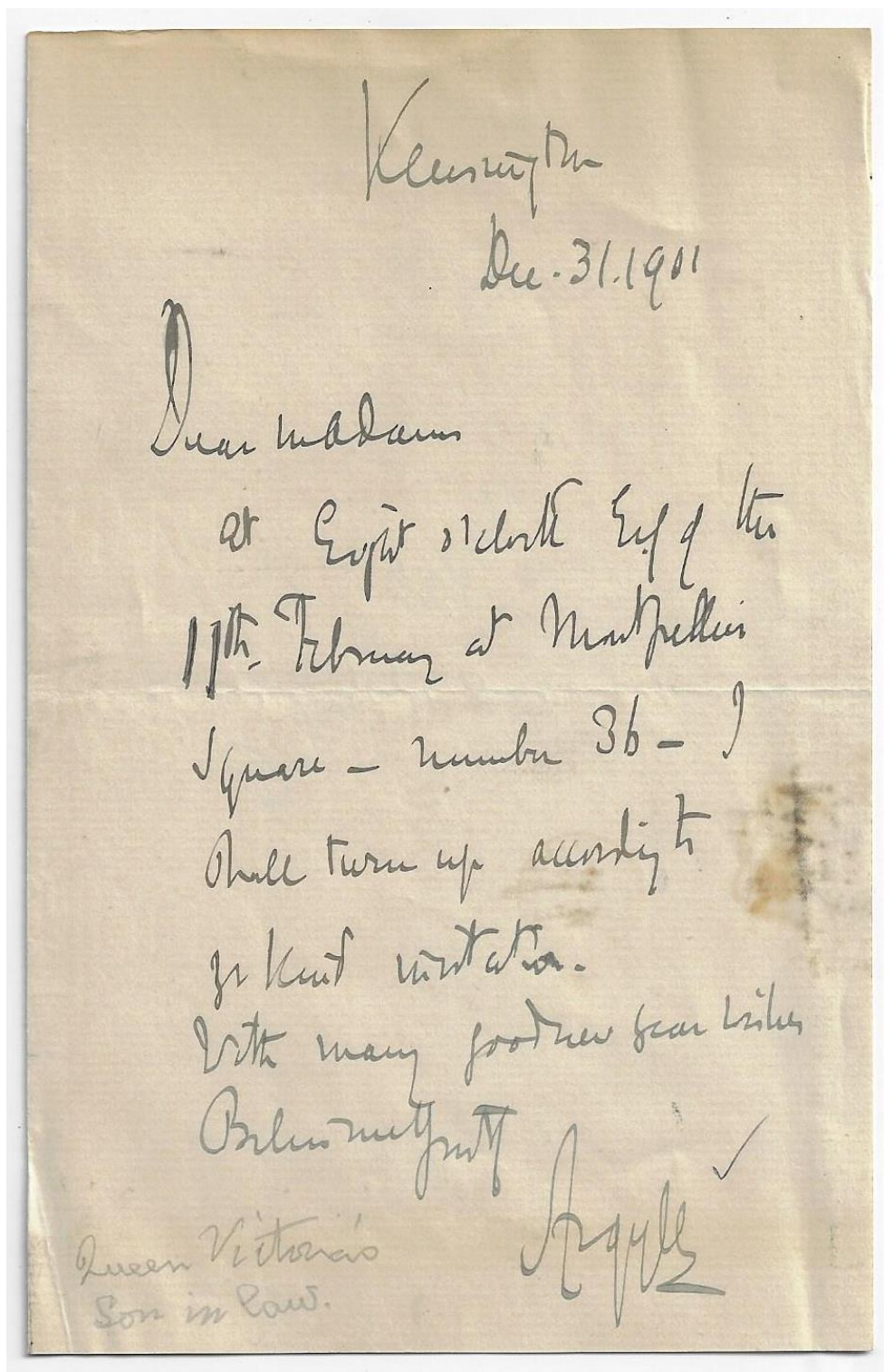

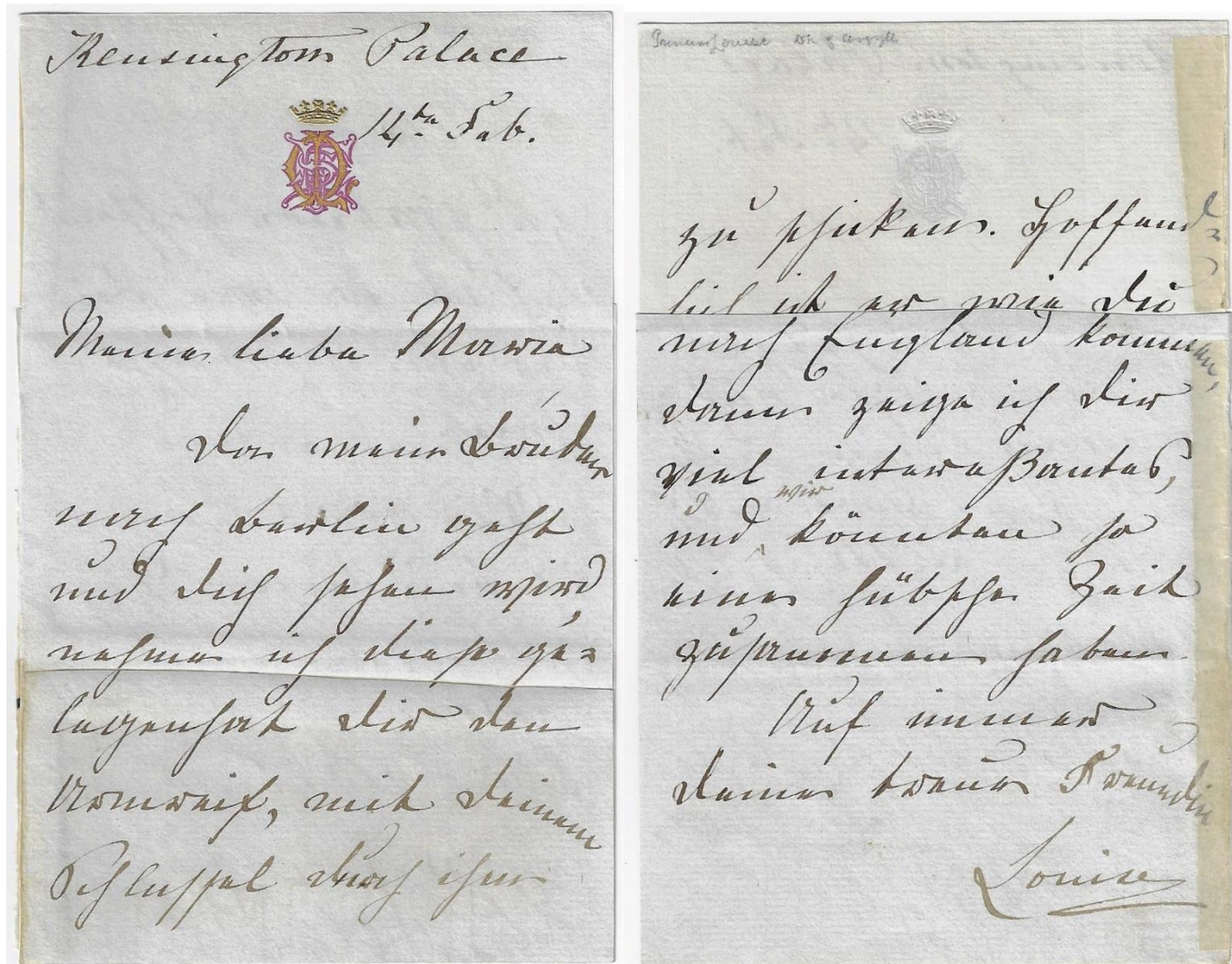
