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Item 567-01 – <u>Saint Anne LC (Double circle, Italic lettering)</u> – 1838, folded cover from Saint Anne LC (*Double circle with italic lettering*) rated 7d collect to Quebec. \$150.00



Item 567-02 – <u>King William IV</u> – 1818, free franked folded cover signed "Clarence" as Duke of Clarence, William IV's title before ascending the throne (William Henry ,1765-1837, King of UK of GB and Ireland 1830-1837, King of Hanover 1830-1837, dated Brighton, FE 1 18, addressed to Sir William de Crespigny in London. The letter is struck with both a crowned free hs and Brighton datestamp. William, Duke of Clarence, was the 3rd son of George III and younger brother of George IV whom he succeeded as King. The recipient, Sir William Champion de Crespigny was a member of Parliament for Southampton. \$1,500.00

Item 567-03 – Prime Minister Gladstone favoured by Governor-in-Chief – 1860, free franked cover by four time British Prime Minister, William Gladstone (William Ewart Glastone 1809-1895) with his signature, then favoured to Ottawa by Sir Edmund Walker Head, the Governor-in-Chief of Canada (Sir Edmund Walker Head, Baronet, 1805-1868). Posted free at Ottawa SE 11 60 with Head's signature. The letter is addressed to William Hamilton Merritt at St. Catharines. At the time of this letter, Glastone was Chancellor of the Exchequer. It was under the administration of Sir Edmund W. Head and at his urging, that Ottawa was chosen as the capital of Canada. A great buy! \$500.00

Item 567-04 – <u>Cooksville UC Peel County (unique St. Vincent manuscript)</u> – 1842, family folded letter dated JU 18 42 from Cooksville UC (*manuscript postmark*) rated 7d collect to Barrie UC (*double circle*). The letter went to Sydenham, <u>Owen Sound</u> and returned from St. Vincent, early in July, to Cooksville. The St. Vincent manuscript is the only known example (*Grey county office, closed in 1865*). An incredible Upper Canada letter. \$750.00




Item 567-05 – <u>Barrie UC manuscript postmark (The one!)</u> – 1837, Ingram family letter from Coldwater UC, entered the mail in Barrie with manuscript postmark dated 17 MY 37 (*the only recorded example*), to Edinburgh, Scotland. Rated 25¢ plus 9d total 2/ prepaid paying the postage to New York. Carried by private trader from New York to Liverpool, rated 1/7 Stg collect from Liverpool to Edinburgh. 1d struck in black on front, reverse showing total 1/8½ Stg. Unique. \$750.00

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Item 567-06 – <u>U.States to Newmarket UC (York)</u> – 1833, friend letter from Buckingham Pennsylvania paid 25¢ to the lines at Lewiston. Exchanged at Queenston where marked <u>"British Postage"</u> and charged 9d to Newmarket for 101-200 miles and 2d ferriage total 11d. Exhibit piece! \$500.00

Item 567-07 – <u>Queenston UC manuscript postmark</u> – 1829, folded cover from Queenston with manuscript postmark, money letter, rated 1N9 collect to York. Triple weight money letter 3x7d for 61-100 miles. Docketing notes indicate that the letter contained £34 in duties from Robert Grant, Collector of Customs at Queenston. This period of manuscript postmark is more or less between straigh-line and the double circle issues. Exhibit quality. \$300.00



Item 567-08 – <u>Egremont UC manuscript postmark (The one!)</u> – 1855, folded registered cover from Egremont UC (Grey County) rated 6d to Guelph (b/s). Egremont was opened May 1 1855. This is the only known example of the Egremont manuscript. Reverse with paper lost. \$450.00

Item 567-09 – <u>East Glenelg UC (The one! and discovery copy)</u> – 1853, folded cover from East Glenelg (Grey County – 1851-1864) rated 3d struckout and rerated 6d to Quebec (b/s). Routed via Mono Mills (Peel) and Toronto. \$450.00

Item 567-10 – <u>Goderich UC (Huron)</u> – 1857, stampless cover from Goderich UC paid 3d to Cornwall. A pretty "Paid 3" handstamp. \$35.00 SOLD



Item 567-11 – <u>Belleville UC (Hastings)</u> – 1853, folded letter from Belleville UC rated 6d double weight collect to Kingston (b/s). The letter relates to property insurance. \$40.00 <u>SOLD</u>



Item 567-12 – <u>Derby UC (The only one Derby)</u> – 1855, business folded letter, signed Alexander Dunlop, mailed from Derby UC (Grey County) paid 3d to Southampton (Saugeen and Owen Sound b/s). This cover is illustrated and discussed in Canadian Manuscript Town Postmark, PHSC, p.12. The earliest P.O. to open in Derby Twp was Kilsyth in 1856. An intriguing and spectacular Grey County letter. \$750.00

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Item 567-13 – <u>List of letters remaining in Queenston P.O.</u> – 1833, proof copy of a newspaper ad "*list of letters remaining in the Post Office, Queenston, on the 5th January, 1833*". The list was used by the Postmaster to track unclaimed letters. Reverse has handwritten additions to the list. Awesome! \$250.00



Item 567-14 – <u>List of unclaimed letters at Queenston P.O.</u> – 1829, folded letter "*List of unclaimed letters at Queenston*" with dues, signed presumably by an assistant and addressed to the Queenston Postmaster A. Hamilton Esq. Three Queenston double circle strikes with small typeset date, earliest recorded date AP 6 29. Attaboy! \$250.00

Item 567-15 – Whitby UC (Ontario) – 1857, stampless cover from Whitby UC paid 3d to Toronto. (b/s). \$40.00

Item 567-18 – London UC (Middlesex) – 1854, stampless cover from London UC rated 3d collect to Trinity College in Toronto (b/s). \$20.00

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Item 567-19 – <u>Woodstock UC – fancy italic Paid 3</u> – 1857, stampless cover from Woodstock UC paid 3 to Trinity College in Toronto (b/s). Lovely Paid 3 fancy and italic handstamp. \$30.00



Item 567-20 – **Uxbridge UC registered** – 1860, stampless registered cover from Uxbridge UC (stru*ck in bleu, registered in red*) paid 5 paying 5¢ letter rate to Quebec with 2¢ registry fee paid in cash. Quebec C.E. Ruggles (b/s). Paid 5 33mm handstamp. Reverse with huge paper lost. \$125.00



Item 567-21 – <u>Spring Arbour UC (Norfolk – 1854-1858)</u> – 1855, stampless cover from Spring Arbour UC rated 3d collect to Crowland via Port Rowan, Port Robinson, St. Catharines (b/s). The Post Office at Spring Arbour was opened in Walsingham Twp April 1, 1854, under Postmaster William Pomeroy until 1856. It was <u>closed temporarily</u> from OC 15 58 to FE 1 59 and remained in operation until its permanent closure on OC 23 99. A rare 1st period 1855-1858 cover!. \$400.00

Item 567-22 – <u>Kingston Up-Can</u> – 1837, folded cover from Kingston UC (hammer Kingston Up-Can) rated 1/2 collect to Quebec. \$35.00

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Item 567-23 – <u>Bytown UC</u> – 1855, stampless cover from Bytown UC rated 3d collect to Quebec (b/s). Reverse with waxseal cutout. \$40.00



Item 567-24 – <u>Cayuga CW mourning cover</u> – 1866, mourning cover from Cayuga CW paid 5 to Bath (b/s) via Kingston (b/s). Berri hammer 1st year. A beauty from the Haldimand County. \$75.00

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Item 567-25 – <u>Hamilton UC</u> – 1856, stampless cover from Hamilton paid 3 to Toronto. \$20.00

Item 567-26 – <u>Fort Erie UC (Welland)</u> – 1845, stampless folded cover from Fort Erie UC paid 4½d to Niagara Falls, Chippawa (b/s). An early example of this hammer. \$60.00 SOLD

Item 567-31 – <u>Hyde Park Corner UC (Middlesex)</u> – 1867, 5¢ Beaver with pen cancel on cover from Hyde Park Corner UC (Berri hammer recorded from 1860 to 1870) paying 5¢ letter rate to Arkona (b/s) via London (b/s). \$100.00 SOLD

Carried by G.T.R. T.&S. Postal Car (ON-809, RF E) and L.H. & B.R. M.C. (RY-109, RF D). This Dashwood postmark is the earliest recorded date of all Dashwood cancels. Scarce RPOs. \$150.00

The Great Northern Transit Company, with headquarters at Collingwood, has four freight and passenger steamers—the *Majestic, Pacific, Atlantic, and Northern Belle* with service twice a week from Collingwood to Sault Ste. Marie, and having connection with the Northern Railway to Toronto. Plying also on Lake Ontario and the River St. Lawrence. Gum staining. \$125.00

The City of Sandusky was a wooden side-wheeler vessel built in Ohio in 1866. Registered in Canada in March 1873 by her new owner Isaac May of Keswich Ontario. She was used on the Cleveland Port Stanley route and later destroyed by fire in 1876. Slightly reduced at right. Ex Graham. \$250.00



Item 567-52 – Loutre Dam PQ (One of the toughest Quebec postmark) – 1917, 1¢, 2¢ Admiral tied by grid cancel on cover from Loutre Dam PQ paying 3¢ letter rate to Richmond (faint b/s). Loutre Dam was in operation from DE 25 1916 to NO 30 1917. This office was used by the workers on the construction of the dam. A river infrastructure downstream from the Gouin Dam on the Saint. Maurice River near La Tuque. Exceedingly rare. I record 4 strikes. Ex Bruce Field. \$250.00 SOLD





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Item 567-55 – <u>5¢ UPU to Switzerland and 4¢ use</u> – 1933, 1¢, 4¢ Medallion tied by Victoria machine cancel on cover paying 5¢ UPU letter rate to Switzerland. Redirected 3 times. \$60.00



Item 567-56 – <u>Allard Brophey registered FECB cover</u> – 1940, 13¢ Pictorial tied by Notre Dame de Grace Montreal cds on FECB cover, passed, paying 13¢ letter rate to New York (b/s). The letter is from Allard Brophey to Stanley Gibbons. Brophey was one of the more important early collectors of Canadian FDCs. Most of the earlier first day covers that exist can be attributed to him and his FDC buddy, the legendary T. R. Legault. Brophey was an active philatelist and one of the first members of BNAPS (#23). \$50.00 SOLD

Item 567-59 – <u>The establishment of the first chartered bank in Canada</u> – 1819, autograph letter signed by Rev. John Strachan, Member of the Legislative Council, York UC, to John Macaulay in Kingston. 1pp. 12¼x8. The letter <u>relates</u> to the establishment of the first chartered bank in Canada, in particular a request for enactment of a charter by merchants of Kingston in March 1817 and the other from the Family Compact for a proposed Upper Canada Banking Company to be situated in York. The Family Compact was the informal name given to the wealthy, Anglican, conservative elite of Upper Canada. John Macauley was a former student of Strachan who was living in Kingston from 1819 to 1821. Mailed from York (straight line) to Kingston with waxseal intact. \$750.00

In March 1817, at the request of Kingston merchants, the Legislature enacted a charter, incorporating the Bank of Upper Canada to be in Kingston. Although the Family Compact through the Rev. Stachan of the Legislative Coucil requested a charter of incorporation for a proposed UC Banking Company at York, the request was ignored. On June 16, 1819, they again requested and the Council ignored them again. However, at a subsequent conference requested by the Family Compact, the Kingston charter was amended changing the domicile of the Bank from Kingston to York and substituting the subscribers at York for those in Kingston. As a result, the charter was taken from the hands of the Kingston merchants and put into the hands of the Family Compact.
