

Item 632-01 – **St. John grocer cameo advertising** – 1868, N.B. 5¢ tied by grid cancel on C.L. Richards Wholesale Grocer cameo advertising cover from St. John paying 5¢ letter rate to Cambridge NB (b/s). The firm C.L. Richards was a wholesale grocer specializing in flour but acted also as a commission merchant for a wide variety of food products etc including grains, drugs and WINES as well as building supplies. Richards published weekly circulars listing up-to-date wholesale prices for these products, list of vessels, insurance rates etc. (*Those circulars are well-known by collectors, blue paper circulars with 1¢ LQ stamp for example*). Reverse with small paper lost mentioned for the record. \$400.00





Item 632-02 – St. John clocks watches jewellery toys advertising – 1863, N.B. 5¢ tied by oval grid cancel on F.A. Cosgrove Fancy Goods advertising cover from St. John paying 5¢ interprovincial letter rate to Annapolis NS (b/s). The firm was an importers and wholesaler of jewellery, clocks, watches, fancy goods and toys from the US and the UK, France and Germany. This company is not mentioned as destroyed in the 1877 Great Fire suggests that they were no longer in business in the 1870's. The docketing note indicates the letter contained a bill for 14 pounds. Roughly opened with backflap tears. \$200.00






Item 632-03 – St. John commission merchant and shipping advertising – 1866, N.B. 5¢ tied by oval grid cancel on Troop & Son embossed advertising cover from St. John paying 5¢ interprovincial letter rate to Granville NS (St. John and Annapolis b/s). The company was founded by Jacob V. Troop (1809-1881). He originally operated a general store but realized that ship ownership was much more profitable. His first shipping venture in 1847 led to rapid and profitable fleet expansion concentrating on sailing vessels. Troop also operated as a commission merchant and ship broker. In 1864, he took his son Howard into the business. Eventually they became agents for Cunard, White Star and Beaver Lines. \$200.00 SOLD





Item 632-04 – St. John commission merchant and insurance advertising – 1861, N.B. 5¢ tied by oval grid cancel on Alex Balloch Commission Merchant and Insurance embossed advertising cover from St. John paying 5¢ letter rate to Kingston NB (b/s). The original insurance agents in St. John usually were ship brokers and commission merchants. Insurance was a logical extension of the functions of commercial overseas ventures and risk-sharing practices. \$200.00



Item 632-05 – **St. John commission merchant and insurance advertising** – 1867, N.B. 10¢ tied by oval grid cancel on Thomas & Wetmore Commission Merchant and Insurance advertising cover from St. John paying 10¢ cross border letter rate to Portland, Maine. Located at 96 Prince William Street. \$300.00 **SOLD** 







Item 632-06 – American Telegraph Company - New Brunswick to Scotland – 1867, N.B. 12½¢ tied by oval grid cancel on American Telegraph Company embossed advertising cover from Sackville paying 12½¢ Allan Line letter rate to Scotland (b/s). Routed via Moncton and Glasgow (b/s). The oval embossed advertisement is the company's eagle emblem with thunderbolt in its talons, mentioned for identification type purposes. \$600.00

The American Telegraph Company was one of the early major players in the development of the US telegraph system with strength in eastern US. In the 1850's, a transatlantic cable between UK and North America was planned, to run via Newfoundland and Cape Breton to the mainland at Sydney NS from which it branched through Sackville NB west to Canada and south to the US. To gain necessary access to the lines, American Telegraph leaser from Montreal Telegraph Co., its lines which rate from Sarnia through Sackville and into Nova Scotia. Eventually in 1858, it acquired the Canadian company. In turn, American Telegraph was taken over by Wester Union which by the completion in 1866 of the international cable had acquired almost all its competitors.



Item 632-07 – <u>Caledonia UC Postmaster Free(Prescott)</u> – 1841, Postmaster free franked letter from Caledonia UC to Richmond LC (*District St. Francis, Richmond County*). Family letter enclosed with John Roper Drugs, Groceries & <u>Liquors</u> embossed. A spectacular advertising folded letter from Eastern Ontario. \$400.00





Item  $632-08 - \underline{\text{Rawdon LC Money Letter}} - 1844$ , folded cover money letter from Rawdon LC rated 3/10 collect paying the triple rate to Kingston for 101 to 200 miles (b/s). Rawdon to Kingston was 199 miles, routed via Montreal (b/s). Interestingly with boxed and inscribed "Money Letter" in the upper right corner. The docketing note indicates that the letter contained £2 5 Shillings and was from Alex Daly. \$150.00



Item 632-09 – <u>Cash letter from Perth UC (Bathurst District)</u> – 1827, Postmaster free franked <u>cash</u> letter from Perth UC to York. Reverse with Perth straightline in black and endorsed and signed *Cash £27-0-0 J.T. PM»*. The letter is from Postmaster Josias Taylor who was also the acting Inspector of Licenses for the Bathurst District. The letter relates to the amount received for licenses granted, not on Post Office business. Some of us would say that this is an example of the free privilege being abused. A very early and primitive Money Letter. \$350.00



Item 632-10 – <u>Carried by the Speculator ship's Captain</u> – 1819, folded invoice for goods from Liverpool, with letter on page 2, carried by favor of the Speculator ship's Captain, to Montreal. The letter relates to goods carried on the Albion. The Speculator was launched in 1797 on the Thames and served the British Government until 1803. The Albion was a sailing ship built in Bristol and launched in 1813. She made voyages transporting convicts to Australia and traded with Jamaica, India and Quebec Canada as well as for the British East India Company. \$125.00





Item 632-11 – <u>Drummondville CE to Ely, England</u> – 1856, stampless cover mailed unpaid from Drummondville CE rated 8d Stg collect to Ely, England. Routed via Melbourne and Montreal (b/s). No BNA rate. Carried by Cunard from Boston, entered in Liverpool as packet letter (b/s). \$100.00





Item 632-12 – **Toronto Paid 7 & 25 – Canada Company** – 1839, Canada Company pre-printed abstract of transaction in Canada form mailed from Toronto to London. Paid 7 & 25 (*the rate without ferriage charge*) prepaying postage to New York via Niagara. This rate handstamp replaced the Paid 9 & 25 to reflect the abolition of ferriage in 1837 and was used on letters from Toronto to New York via Niagara until +/- 1840. The Ferriage charge was abandoned FE 22 37. The letter was carried by Black Ball Line packet "Columbus" sailing from New York FE 2 39. Entered in Liverpool as Ship Letter on FE 21 39 (b/s), rated 1/7 Sterling collect representing 8d ship letter and 11d inland to London. The form is signed by Commissioner W. Allan (*the former Postmaster of York U.C.*). Reverse shows 3/2 which is the cumulative for two letters at 1/7 each. \$250.00 SOLD

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Item 632-13 – Quadruple rate Glasgow to Montreal with road tax – 1836, business folded letter from Glasgow Scotland to Montreal via Liverpool forwarding agent. Details of agent have been struck through before onward transition to Canada. Rated 3/8 quadruple 11d Stg, plus ½d Scottish road tax (the first letter that I have seen going to Canada with the road tax, usually applied to Scottish incoming letters). Carried by Black Ball packet "Hibernia" from Liverpool to New York. Entered in New York as ship, rated 20¾¢ to Canada and then converted to 4/6 BNA postage collect. Some what a huge rate. \$250.00



Item 632-14 – Paid Ship Letter Crown London - to Toronto UC – 1840, folded letter from London England to Toronto with Paid Ship Letter Crown London, rated 8d Stg outgoing packet letter rate. Carried by Red Star Line packet "Sheffield" departing Liverpool FE 1 40. Entered in New York as ship letter on MR 18 with a huge delay due to heavy winter seas (source: Pulling tables p.224), rated 27¢ for 2¢ ship and 25¢ to the lines via Lewiston and Queenston exchange. US postage converted to 1/4½ plus 7d (around the Lake) total 1/11½. \$300.00




Item 632-15 – <u>Aylmer CW Surgeon and Dentist advertising</u> – 1867, 5¢ Beaver tied by concentric ring cancel on W.E. Hughes Surgical and Mechanical Dentist advertising cover paying 5¢ letter rate to Brantford (b/s) via London (b/s). Too late auxiliary marking. \$500.00



Item 632-16 - 10¢ Consort pair (printing order 16C) - 1864, 10¢ Consort pair (printing order 16C, brown yellowish, perf 11.9x11.8) tied by Montreal CE Berri duplex cancel on cover paying 20¢ double weight cross border letter rate to New York (b/s). Staining LL. Ex Highlands. \$500.00




Item 632-17 – <u>Aylmer Ont – The Brown House</u> – 1891, ½¢ block of 6 tied by London Canada duplex cancel on The Brown House of Aylmer advertising cover paying 3¢ letter rate to New York. The Brown House, a successor of Aylmer's Commercial Hotel, was opened in the early 1880's under the proprietorship of Hiram Brown. \$150.00 SOLD







Item 632-18 – <u>Adlborough Agricultural and Rodney Fair</u> – 1888-1890, 1¢ SQ tied by Rodney Ont cds on Aldborough Branch Agricultural Society and Rodney Fair advertising wrapper paying 1¢ printed matter rate to Wardsville. AND - 3¢ SQ tied by grid cancel on Aldborough Branch Agricultural Society and Rodney Fair advertising cover paying 3¢ letter rate also to Wardsville. A very scarce pair, the wrapper is exceedingly rare. Nice Lovebirds. \$350.00




Item 632-19 – White Bronze Castings (Palestine Model Company) – 1894, 1¢ SQ tied by St. Thomas Ont squared circle (PM/MR/1/94) on Palestine Model Company and White Bronze advertising cover paying 1¢ printed matter rate to New York. Mediterranean Sea and shore illustrated. A most unusual advertising. \$150.00




Item 632-20 – <u>St. Thomas Nursery, Wyandottes and Leghorns</u> – 1899, 1¢ Maple Leaf tied by St. Thomas roller cancel on A.W. Graham Nurseryman advertising cover paying 1¢ printed matter rate to Roebuck. Plants, trees, fruits, Wyandottes and Leghorns. \$100.00



Item 632-21 – <u>E.C. Hill & Co. bicycle makers</u> – c1898, 1¢ Maple Leaf tied by Toronto roller cancel on E.C. Hill & Co. Bicycle Makers advertising cover paying 1¢ printed matter at to Napierville. \$125.00



Item 632-22 – Master Blacksmiths and Machinist – 1902, 1¢ Numeral pair tied by Toronto International machine cancel on multicoloured Buffalo Forges H.W. Petrie Master Blacksmiths advertising cover paying 2¢ letter rate to Athens (b/s). Machinist and General Machinery Dealer. 141-5 Front Street W. \$750.00







Item 632-23 – 10¢ UPU registered to Belgium via Q & Lake St. John RPO – 1902, 5¢ Numeral (2) tied by grid cancel on cover from Roberval Que paying 10¢ UPU registered letter rate to Belgium (b/s). Carried by Q & Lake St. John M.C. South (1890-1905, RY-164, RF C) to Quebec City. Liverpool and London transit. Registry exchange label in Antwerp. Small tear on flap. \$400.00



Item 632-24 – <u>Toronto Eclipse Soap advertising</u> – 1903, 2¢ Numeral tied by Toronto Station B International machine cancel on John Taylor & Co. Eclipse Soap advertising cover paying 2¢ letter rate to Halifax (b/s). Toronto Station B Dater Records Dec 1902 to Aug 1908. A very scarce advertising cover, much scarcer than the Sunlight Soap advert. \$150.00



Item 632-25 – <u>Hartland New Brunswick arsonist FIRE of 1907</u> – 1907, Hartland NB covered bridge fire real photo postcard. Unused. On July 15<sup>th</sup> 1907, a devastating fire erupted in Hartland causing widespread damage and financial losses. The fire, believed to be of incendiary origin, destroyed many buildings and threatened the town's beloved Hartland Covered Bridge. \$75.00



Item 632-26 – <u>Aylmer's Big Race Meet advertising with collar</u> – 1911, 2¢ Edward tied by Bridgeburg & St. Thomas RPO cds on Aylmer's Big Race Meet "collar" advertising cover (*Horse or Motorcycle?*), paying 2¢ letter rate to Smithville (b/s). The collar meets postal regulations. The letter accompanies relates to sales and commissions. Cover reduced at right. \$125.00





Item 632-27 – <u>Ingersoll Ontario - Grieve & Daniel Dry Goods</u> – 1911, 1¢ Edward (perfs gum toned) tied by Ingersoll Ont International machine cancel on Grieve & Daniel Dry Goods real photo postcard to Wilton Grove. Crease but still a highly desirable photo card. \$100.00






Item 632-28 – <u>Champlain DeMonts Tercentennial 1604-1904</u> – 1904, 1¢ Edward tied by St. John machine cancel on The Champlain DeMonts Tercentennial 1604-1904 patriotic postcard to New York. This card is from a set of 14 cards, listed as UKN5-001 (unknown publisher series 5). Bridges and Reversible Falls St. John. Staining. \$50.00 <u>SOLD</u>





Item 632-29 – Shedden Ontario (Elgin County) – c1905, 1¢ Edward on Shedden Ontario street scene real photo postcard to Detroit. Photo by Gould & Bourne of St. Thomas showing the Post Office, John and Manson Horton' store and the Sterling Bank with numerous carriages, kids posing etc. John and Manson Horton were the Postmasters from 1875 to 1929 both until their death. A spectacular postcard. \$150.00






Item 632-30 – <u>Woodstock Ont -furnaces, stoves, ovens and cabinet ranges</u> – 1921, 2¢ Admiral tied by Woodstock Ont machine cancel on James Stewart Manufacturing Company private postcard, Good Cheer advertising, paying 2¢ postcard rate to Gorrie. \$75.00 <u>SOLD</u>





Back side of the envelope above showing clasp. The clasp was and still is a patented device.

Item 632-31 – Clasped envelope, 1¢ 4<sup>th</sup> class domestic rate – 1912-1914, 1¢ Admiral tied by Montreal roller No.97 on Saint Joseph's Oratory of Mount Royal envelope paying 1¢ 4<sup>th</sup> class matter rate to St. Philippe de Kamouraska. This is a rare Admiral cover: This envelope was made of heavy paper stock which would permit a more substantial enclosure to survive the wear and tear of postal handling and allowed postal inspection. The content was likely a small religious trinket or pendant and as such was merchandise and could be sent at the 4<sup>th</sup> class matter rate (1¢ per ounce only possible between 1 JA 1912 and 13 FE 1913 – Then, the rate was replaced by Parcel Post at the minimum rate for merchandise of 5¢). If it contained printed matter, and there is no evidence of this in the form of folds, the cover could also be sent at the 3<sup>rd</sup> class matter rate up to 4 ounces. The strike of the roller is somewhat irregular suggesting some hard content pointing to the possible merchandise content. A great example of the most basic 1¢ per ounce 4<sup>th</sup> class matter rate. A long description for what it looks like an ordinary 1¢ Admiral cover, nope, it is a seldom seen, hard to find Admiral cover and a great item for an exhibit or non-letter rate presentation. \$100.00 SOLD



Item 632-32 – White Swan Yeast Cakes advertising – 1913, 2¢ Admiral tied by Toronto machine cancel on White Swan Spices and Cereals Ltd advertising cover paying 2¢ letter rate to Greenwood (b/s) via Whitby (b/s). Reduced at right. \$75.00






Item 632-33 – 12¢ special delivery Toronto to Massachusetts – 1913, 2¢ Admiral tied by Toronto duplex C cancel on cover, with US 10¢ Special Delivery stamp tied by grid cancel, paying 12¢ special delivery letter rate to Massachusetts. Fee paid at Cambridge Mass auxiliary marking, reverse with Boston & Albany RPO (b/s). \$175.00 SOLD





Item 632-34 – 10¢ UPU to Finland – 1923, 10¢ Admiral tied by Montreal machine cancel on cover paying 10¢ UPU letter rate to Finland (b/s) Reverse with Jubilee Exhibition of Sweden cinderella tied by matching Helsinki. \$75.00 SOLD






Item 632-35 – 40¢ fifteen times domestic registered – 1930, 20¢ Admiral (2) tied by grid cancel on large cover reduced to letter size from Yahk BC paying 40¢ fifteen times registered letter rate to Cranbrook. 30¢+10¢. \$150.00






Item 632-36 – <u>Vernon Camp YMCA staff RPPC</u> – 1916, YMCA Staff at Vernon Camp BC real photo postcard, photo by H. Smith, mailed from the camp to New Westminster. Insufficiently addressed with "*Please have your mail addressed to street and number*". \$150.00





Item 632-37 – Kalamalka Lake mailed from Vernon Camp – 1915, 2¢ Admiral tied by Vernon Camp BC cds, (JUL 6 15) on Kalamalka Lake real photo postcard paying 2¢ postcard rate to Victoria. "Did you forget the carving set and the tobacco pouch..." \$75.00





Item 632-38 – <u>St. Thomas "The Flower City"</u> – 1921, 3¢ Admiral tied by St. Thomas Ont machine cancel on St. Thomas The Flower City promotional cover paying 3¢ letter rate to New York. \$75.00





Item 632-39 – **2¢ First Issue postage due – Vernon BC** – 1927, 1¢ Admiral tied by Diamond Jubilee Flag cancel on postcard from Vancouver underpaying 2¢ postcard rate to Vernon (cds as receiver). Charged 2¢ and postage paid in Vernon with one very fine almost jumbo J2 2¢ First Issue stamp. Interestingly tied by broken circle the same day JU 28 27. This card was published by The Coast Publishing Co. Vancouver, made in USA, showing several Totem Poles in Stanley Park. \$50.00 **SOLD** 



Item 632-40 – \$1.00 Parliaments on circular receipt – 1929, 20¢ Admiral (3), 5¢, 10¢, \$1.00 (2) Scroll tied by Virden Mancds on circular receipt for distribution for Golden Rule Chain Stores. Total \$2.75. The rate was ½¢ per circular for distribution to box holders and 1¢ for rural route delivery. The Post Office ran out of forms and they just added stamps for several other distributions to the last form that they used. Nice franking. \$250.00






Item 632-41 – <u>Perishable parcel post rush rush</u> – c1922-5, 5¢, 20¢ (2) Admiral tied by Port Burwell Ont roller No.1 cancel on McConnell Nursery Co. perishable parcel post tag paying 45¢ parcel post rate to Paris. Plants for Canadian homes!!! \$200.00






Item 632-42 – 13¢ 4th class matter rate (merchandise) – 1912, 1¢ (3), 10¢ Plum Admiral tied by Calgary Alta roller cancel on Canadian Lighting Company mailing tag paying 13¢ 1¢ per ounce 4th class matter rate to Cowley. About 100 miles south of Calgary. It is a 4th class matter rate for 12 to 13 ounces. This merchandise rate was effective from JA 1 12 to FE 13 14. Two things: This tag was mailed shortly after the beginning of the Admiral era and prior to the re-introduction of Parcel Post. Firstly the 1¢ stamps are from the sheet plates and of the original die. The 1¢ die was retouched and by 1913 stamps from the retouched die were in common use in larger post office such as Calgary. Then, when parcel post was introduced on FE 14 14, there was no 13¢ parcel rate for a parcel mailed in the same province and to be sent more than 20 miles from the office of origin. This includes any combination of possible indemnity fees. A very pretty 4th class matter rate Alberta use. \$200.00





Item 632-43 – <u>Lethbridge Alberta parcel post</u> – 1929, 10¢ Admiral (2), 2¢ Scroll (3) tied by Lethbridge Alta roller cancel on Ellison Milling & Elevator Co. parcel post tag paying 26¢ parcel rate to Calgary. \$150.00





Item 632-44 – <u>Parry Sound Ont – the centre of the universe</u> – 1927, 2¢ Admiral tied by Parry Sound Ont cds on J.M. & J.O. Reid c/c cover, reverse with Parry Sound the Gateway advertising, paying 2¢ letter rate to Toronto. Addressed to Colonel Alexander Fraser LLD. \$100.00

Colonel Alexander Fraser LLD ADC was a staff member of the Toronto Mail. In 1903, Fraser was selected as the first Archivist of Ontario and served in that capacity until his retirement in 1935. He was involved in and assumed leadership roles in many local societies. He also edited and published many books and articles, including a two-volume history of Ontario. The Alexander Fraser Award is given to individuals who have contributed in a significant way to the advancement of the archival community in Ontario. (Source: Archives Association of Ontario)





Item 632-45 – <u>Commercial Airways Ltd registered</u> – 1930, 5¢ Airmail C1, 8¢ Scroll, 2¢ Arch tied by Edmonton cds on registered Commercial Airways cover, Edmonton and Fort McMurray flight, paying 15¢ registered airmail letter rate to Michigan (b/s). Reverse with Commercial Airways semi-official adhesive CL50 (*could be the thick paper*). Only permitted to be used on mail for destinations to which companies provided air mail service not contracted by the Post Office. <u>Philatelic inspire!</u> Received at Fort McMurray and returned to Edmonton the next day and carried on Commercial Airways on the return trip with no additional stamp. Forwarded to the Sask. Hard & Edmonton RPO No 3. to Michigan via the M. Jaw & Macklin RPO. Entered the U.S. through the CPR SOO line at North Portal, North Dakota. \$125.00



Item 632-46 – 6¢ Airmail C4 commercial use – 1932, 6¢ Airmail C4 Ottawa Conference tied by Kitchener Ont cds on cover paying 6¢ airmail letter rate to England. A very pretty commercial usage and seldom encountered. \$75.00






Item 632-47 – <u>Imperial Airways (Northern Route)</u> – 1939, GB 5d, 10d tied by Liverpool cds 50 on North Atlantic Air Service cover, by Imperial Airways first transatlantic airmail by the northern route, to Moncton via Montreal (b/s). \$25.00




Item 632-48 – <u>Canadian Airways Ltd</u> – 1932, 3¢ Medallion tied by Edmonton cds on flight Edmonton to Fort McMurray <u>philatelic</u> cover (b/s), reverse with CL51 tied by the company handstamp. Canadian Airways Ltd service was for Northern Alberta, Northwest Terr and Manitoba mining area. Recto with CAL sticker. \$75.00 <u>SOLD</u>





Item 632-49 – <u>Steam laundry advertising</u> – 1935, 3¢ Medallion tied by Aylmer West duplex cancel on Aylmer Steam Laundry back advertising cover paying 3¢ letter rate to Hamilton. \$60.00





Item 632-50 - 35 c airmail to St. Lucia BWI - 1935, Toronto 5 c, 10 c (3) meter strikes on Purity Flour and bread and board with its knife illustrated paying 35 c airmail letter rate to St. Lucia. (b/s). A real wow cover. Advertising airmail covers to foreign destination are all very scarce. \$125.00



Item 632-51 – Royal Visit meter slogan on unaddressed cover – 1939, Toronto 1¢ meter with Royal Visit to Canada GR ER slogan on unsealed and unaddressed cover. The first that I have seen. For the specialist. \$50.00





Item 632-52 – <u>John Deere mailing tag with COD</u> – 1940, 10¢, 20¢ Pictorial tied by Welland Ont cds on John Deere mailing tag for parts paying 30¢ parcel post rate to Gorrie. COD triangle label with 62¢ collect and 8¢ money order fee. \$125.00 SOLD





Item 632-53 – 4¢ Mufti block paying 20¢ airmail to British Guiana – 1942, 4¢ Mufti block of 5 tied by St. Thomas Ont duplex cancel on Alma College cover paying 20¢ airmail letter rate to British Guiana. Nice!. \$100.00



Item 632-54 – **2¢ Fourth Postage Due Issue block of 4** – 1943, mailed unpaid cover from Aylmer West to Tillsonburg, caught and charged 8¢ due, paid with 2¢ Fourth Postage Due Issue block of 4 tied by numerous Tillsonburg cds. Scarce. \$50.00 **SOLD** 







