### Quebec 5th June 1789

My Dear Father

I have arrived here at last the 28th May after a tedious voyage of two months, we had westerly winds the whole way to the banks, and gales of wind every other night which obliged us often to lie to. However I kept my health perfectly and was the only passenger on board that was not sick...

Upon the whole we found it very pleasant the 3 days we were there, only extremely cold owing to the mountains of ice we passed, two were as big as Arthur's Seat. I took scetches of them. We had very cold weather coming thro' the Gulf but when we came into the river intolerably hot, and has been ever since. I should like it well enough if it were not for the mosquitos which are very troublesome and bite so as to swell the face. We shall stay here till friday and set out for Montreal, Capt. Lindsay goes with me that length. I shall stay there only a day or two and proceed for the falls of Niagara, to which place (1 am told) it will take me 3 weeks to go from Montreal as I must go by boat against the current the whole way, from the falls I go to Detroit where the headquarters of the Regt are. Which place is exactly 1005 miles from Quebec, however tho' the distance be as great it will not cost me half as much as living at Quebec or Montreal as I go in Government boats the whole way and have nothing to pay for but my vegetables being allowed rations from the day I leave Montreal. I have got letters here to Mrs Colonel Campbell General at Montreal, he is Superintendant of the Indians which is 1000£ a year, but is now in Britain. Here we have been paid the greatest attention so I was presented yesterday to Lord Dorchester by Colonel Dixon of the Artillery and dine there today. There is I believe a ball and supper there on the 4th to which Capt. Lindsay and myself are invited. We have invitations every day we are to stay, with a <???? the Commisary General, Mr Gray the Attorney General, Capt Barns the Deputy Quatermaster General and the 53 and Artillery Majors. Lord Dorchester told me, when I was presented to him, that if I chose it I might stay where I was as the 65th Regt, was coming down to St. Johns (St. Jean) the beginning of July but I declined staying as 1 thought it would be too expensive, and I wished <???? to see the upper Country as I might not have another opportunity. There is a great famine here at presen

I have seen since I arrived the heights of Abraham where Wolfe was killed, the falls of Chaudiere and Montmorency all of which pleased me exceedingly, but I am told these falls (tho by far the largest I ever saw) are nothing to those of Niagara which are terrible. I shall give you a description of them in my (words under seal) I have seen them.. I have nothing more to add at present but to beg if there is a Lieutenancy <???> up you will think of me. I shall write to Lord Bridalbane and Lochnel today. I hope young Mac has got a Commission and is gone to France. I shall be much oblidged to you to write me on receipt of this and let me know all the news of the Country (I mean Britain) and direct to me at St. Johns. My love to my sisters. I hope you and them are in good health. I shall write Mary when I come down to Montreal after having been up the country. I am dear Father your affectionate Son.


Henry Hope the Lieutenant Governor died a few days before I arrived here, so that Colonel Dundass's letters will be of no use when they arrive, however I know everybody here already.





Item 644-01 – Officer going to Detroit - family letter Quebec to Scotland – 1789, family letter signed Henry Campbell mailed unpaid from Quebec to Ardchattan, Bonawe, Scotland. Rated 6 and 1/6 collect to Ardchattan. Entered as Bristol Ship Letter (BRISTOL SHP-LRE) and Bishop mark JY 11 89 receiver (b/s). An interesting Campbell letter to his father on the iourney to his Regimental Headquarters in Detroit. \$1,500.00





Item 644-02 – Williamsburg UC to England by Boston Liverpool Packet Co. – 1825, folded cover dated 2 June 1825 possibly from Williamsburg UC to England. Carried privately to Boston and then by the seldom encountered private trader Boston & Liverpool Packet Company, also called the Jewel Line. This company operated from 1822 to 1827 only and employed 4 ships (see Frank Staff p.61 and p.121). Endorsed and carried by the Amethyst Captain Thompson and entered as ship letter in Dartmouth (b/s). rated 1/7 Sterling collect representing 8d ship and 11d to London. Reverse with 3/2 the double 1/6. The writer was Anglican Minister in the Williamsburg UC area. 56 days in transit. A rare Transatlantic letter. \$350.00





Item 644-03 – <u>2½d Currency – partially underpaid to Scarborough</u> – 1850, stampless cover from Grantham England to Scarborough CW (b/s) / Toronto. Carried by Cunard Europa from Liverpool to New York. Paid 1/ Sterling paying postage to Halifax but did not pay the 2d Canadian Inland. More to pay and rated "2" converted to 2½d Currency shows by Arnell handstamp B3 applied in Toronto. The letter missed the first Cunard sailing to Boston on JA 12 50 so was held and sent on the Europa sailing to New York on JA 26 50, arriving at Halifax FE 8 50. A nice B3 cover. \$200.00 SOLD





Item 644-04 – Quebec LC freight money to England – 1840, partial folded letter from Quebec LC to Hertford England via New York private trader ship. Triple "Paid" 11d, 18¾, 12½ prepaying the freight money letter rate. 12½¢ for a sailing ship. Endorsed to the care of Mr. Benjamin Summons at Bristol / to be forwarded – not Hertford try Bristol. Rated 8d Sterling ship letter fee with London (b/s). Freight money is the postal history term used to describe the charged imposed by the operators of pioneer steamers and sailing vessels operating between US and UK. The practice was never authorized by the British Post Office and was stopped in December 1840. On reverse, the star indicates the letter was out of course but since the 8d Stg rate is correct, one can surmise it related to the need to forward the letter. A rare triple "Paid" freight money letter with the trio of rates separated. \$750.00



Item 644-05 – Paid 9&25 Canada Company – Portsmouth Ship Letter – 1836, Canada Company abstract of transaction in Canada letter from Toronto paid 9&25 paying the BNA, the ferriage and the US postage to New York (7+2+25). The Paid 9&25 was used in Toronto in 1836 and 1837 only. Once in New York, carried by an American sailing packet to Portsmouth and charged 1/4 as ship letter and inland postage to London (8+8). Great strikes, nice waxseal. \$300.00 SOLD



Item 644-06 – Montreal to Massachusetts via Swanton - 1829, business letter from Montreal to Massachusetts paid 6d and 18¾¢ collect. The letter travelled south by steamboat on the Richelieu River and Lake Champlain to Swanton. When postal exchange was re-established between Canada and US after the War of 1812, the town of Swanton was designated as the place where cross-border mail to or from Montreal would be processed. This exchange office gradually lost his function to nearby Highgate Vermont (starting slowly in 1827). Swanton exchanged letters are all very scarce. \$350.00



Item 644-07 - Vermont to Quebec US\$1.00 and 10/BNA - 1824, folded legal letter from Vergennes Vermont paid \$1.00 to the border and 10/- collect to Quebec. Manuscript postmark "Vergennes Vt March 23" - 2 ½ oz. Likely exchanged at Derby Line with Stanstead, to Montreal then on to Quebec. This 2-page letter, signed by Edward Sutton, contained heavy legal documents (10 times the rate). Provenance: Siegel Auction September 1972. A huge rate for 1824. \$300.00




Item 644-08 – St. Catharines money letter to Connecticut – 1846, business money letter from St. Catharines UC fully prepaid to the Retreat for the Insane, Hartford Connecticut. Two paid markings and rated 4½ and "USP10" (6d) total 10½d. Exchanged in Queenston (b/s). Interestingly, the Postmaster at St. Catharines converted the US rate of 10¢ to the Canadian equivalent of 6d. "4228" at top left as letter bill number. There was no registry system in the US and no additional security gained on such letter while in the custody of the Americans. A very scarce example of a cross-border money letter. \$250.00





Item 644-09 – Georgetown PEI to New York – 1851, business folded letter from Georgetown PEI to New York, paid 1/1½d paying postage to the border and 10¢ US collect in New York. Prince Edward Island Paid in red on front, reverse datestamp in black. The letter was carried by steamer from PEI to Pictou N.S., then overland to St. Andrews and exchanged in Robbinston Maine. \$125.00 SOLD



Item 644-10 – <u>Bridge Island letter (Leeds)</u> – 1861, 4-page family letter datelined *Bridge Island 18 November 1861*. In 1860, Bridge Island, also known as Chimney Island, was the site of a fortified British military post located on the St. Lawrence River. The island was instrumental in protecting the supply route and the St. Lawrence River. The letter is a challenge to decipher but it refers to grain and flour that have fallen owing to the stoppage in trade cause by heavy tariffs put on British goods by President Lincoln. A few words on the U.S. Civil War and Slavery. The high tariffs of the Morrill Tariff Act, enacted in March 1861, are linked to the start of the Civil War and were part of a protectionist policy. A challenge but for sure an interesting letter from a very unusual Canada West location. \$500.00 SOLD



Item 644-11 – <u>Letter from retired soldier to Lord Aylmer</u> – 1832, folded letter from Montreal, American circle dated JUL 7 struck in red, rated double 9d collect to Quebec. The letter is from a retired soldier, John Mornay - Rifle Brigade (*British Army Rifle Brigade of sharpshooters established in Montreal*), to Lord Aylmer Commander of his Majesty's Forces in North America. The letter is a request for land in township of Rawdon 50 miles north of Montreal. "*Most humbly beg leave to forward my certificate to his noble person Lord Aylmer, that your Lordship will be pleased to forward me and family to his Majesty's Grant of Land that your Lordships will seen proper, my Lord, my family 6 in number, 4 boys and two girls. My lord I have the honour to remain with the most dutiful respect – Your local and obedient servant. J.M." \$250.00* 



Item 644-12 – <u>Correspondent of Montreal Gazette</u> – 1894, 2¢ SQ tied by Ottawa squared circle on J.A. Phillips c/c cover paying 2¢ drop letter rate. John A. Phillips was a well-known lithographer and journalist in Ottawa, the Ottawa correspondent for the Montreal Gazette. \$35.00 <u>SOLD</u>



Item 644-13 – Gore Bay Ont squared circle – 1896, 3¢ SQ tied by Gore Bay Ont squared circle on cover paying 3¢ letter rate to Toronto (b/s). \$35.00 SOLD



Item 644-14 – Mining Association of Quebec – 1893, 3¢ SQ tied by Ottawa squared circle on The General Mining Association of the Province of Quebec advertising cover paying 3¢ letter rate to Massachusetts (b/s). \$45.00 SOLD






Item 644-17 – <u>Geological Survey Dept to Switzerland</u> – 1901, OHMS Geological Survey Dept cover signed by handstamp for the Director of the Geological Survey George Mercer Dawson (1849-1901) to Switzerland (b/s, redirected b/s). Free franking not allowed 5¢ Numeral added and tied by Ottawa duplex cancel paying 5¢ UPU rate. \$150.00 **SOLD** 





Item 644-18 – <u>Brinsley Ont (Middlesex 1864-1913)</u> – 1899, 8¢ Maple Leaf tied by Brinsley Ont broken circle on Rennie cover paying 8¢ registered letter rate to Toronto. London, Clandeboye, London & Wingham MC and Toronto (b/s). \$125.00



Item 644-20 – <u>Port Arthur mailed unpaid</u> – 1907, postcard mailed unpaid from Port Arthur Ont (squared circle SP 1 07), caught and returned for postage via Winnipeg and Toronto DLO. Postage paid with 1¢ Edward and forwarded to Nipigon (Thunder Bay). \$75.00





Item 644-21 – <u>OHMS Livestock Record card</u> – 1911, OHMS/Canada Post Card National Livestock Records free franked postcard from Ottawa to Hay (b/s). Ottawa Free keyhole 11 MR 22 11. Clydesdale Horse Association of Canada. A scarce card. \$40.00



Item 644-22 – <u>Belisle's Mills Que, became Val David (Terrebonne)</u> – 1907-1913, Belisle family archive, in postcards, mostly mailed from Montreal to Belisle's Mills Que (*which became Val David, Laurentians*). Fortunately, one card has the rare Belisle Mills Que broken circle as receiver. Possibly the second reported strike, if accurate, the earliest of the two known. All stamp removed. Joe Belisle was the owner of one of the area's first sawmills and the first Postmaster. He operated the Post Office from 1873 until his resignation causing the closing in 1887. The place was first known as Mont Morin, then Belisle's Mills etc. An interesting find. \$50.00 **SOLD**
