Item 652-01 – <u>Clarendon LC double circle (Pontiac)</u> – 1858, free franked stampless cover from Clarendon LC, bearing the very scarce double circle dated DE 20 58, to Toronto via Aylmer and Ottawa (b/s). Pontiac County. \$200.00 <u>SOLD</u>



Item 652-02 – <u>Vankleek Hill CW to New Liverpool CE</u> – 1853, stampless folded cover from Vankleek Hill CW rated 3d collect to New Liverpool CE. Routed via Hawkesbury with "Forwarded" handstamp and Quebec (b/s). This cover represents a very early use and great strike of the scarce 25mm hammer II postmark from Vankleek Hill. New Liverpool was situated on the south shore of Quebec City in the county of Levis. \$150.00 SOLD



Item 652-03 – <u>Dorking UC hammer 1 (Wellington County)</u> – 1874, stampless cover from Dorking UC, with a fine strike of the scarce Berri Hammer I with manuscript date and rate (<u>Paid 3e</u>), paying 3¢ letter rate to Toronto (b/s). Routed via Berlin (b/s). The Dorking hammer 1 was in use only from 1873 to 1877; the post office itself closed in 1914. A clean and appealing example from a short-lived Wellington County office. \$100.00 <u>SOLD</u>



Item 652-04 – <u>Huntingdon LC Postmaster Free</u> – 1839, free franked money letter from Huntingdon LC, addressed to lawyer Thomas Nye in Montreal and signed by Postmaster Dowie Kettle Lighthall. Features a red manuscript postmark dated 31 MY 39. The letter notes that someone attempted to visit the recipient, includes a partial payment, and outlines a proposed fulfillment schedule over a few months. A scarce early Huntingdon letter from its Postmaster with financial and legal content. \$200.00



Item 652-05 – <u>Templeton CE (Hull – 1846-1887)</u> – 1858, stampless cover from Templeton CE, initially rated 3d collect and subsequently rerated free, to Toronto (b/s) via Ottawa (b/s). Templeton is a challenging Western Quebec office for postal history collectors, operating until 1887. A scarce and appealing example. \$150.00



Item 652-06 – <u>St. Vincent UC, Grey County (1841-1865)</u> – 1862, 10¢ Consort (*printing order 9B, purplish brown, showing minor dots and scratches*) tied by concentric ring cancel on cover from St. Vincent UC, paying the 10¢ cross-border letter rate to Chicago (backstamp). St. Vincent was a very scarce Grey County office, active from 1841 until its closure in 1865. The Berri hammer remained in use until the end, with recorded strikes from 1861 to May 1865. A handsome and scarce cover, notably bearing a seldom-seen 1860s U.S. receiver. \$350.00 <u>SOLD</u>



Item 652-07 – <u>Dingle CW - 5¢ triple weight rate</u> – 1864, 5¢ Beaver and 10¢ Consort tied together by pen cancel on cover from Dingle CW, paying 15¢ triple weight letter rate to Goderich (b/s), routed via Seaforth (in blue) and Morrisdale (b/s). Dingle is a scarce Huron County office, which closed in 1873. A clean and uncommon franking from a difficult office; file fold noted. \$300.00



Item 652-08 – Farmer's magazine reply cover with horses Illustrated – c1868–1870, early unused reply cover from the London Farmer's Advocate and Home Magazine, featuring detailed illustrations of horses and sheep. Printed warning at top reads: "Money Orders & Registered Letters at Our Risk." A visually striking and well-preserved agricultural-themed cover from a scarce periodical. \$125.00 SOLD




Item 652-09 – Michael's Bay Ont (Manitoulin) – 1889, 3¢ SQ tied by circular fancy cancel on cover from Michael's Bay Ont, paying 3¢ letter rate to Manitowaning. This postmark may represent the latest recorded use of Hammer I, previously listed by me as the earliest known date of Hammer II. \$150.00 SOLD



Item 652-10 – Michipicoten River Ont (Algoma) – 1882, 3¢ SQ tied by large grid cancel on cover from Michipicoten River Ont, paying 3¢ letter rate to Collingwood (b/s), routed via Sault Ste. Marie (b/s). The cover is from, and docketed "Peter Bell" referring to Peter Warren Bell, Chief Factor of the Hudson's Bay Company's Superior District from 1866 to 1895. A scarce HBC-related cover from a remote Northern Ontario office. \$200.00 SOLD



Item 652-11 – <u>Manitowaning Lake Huron</u> – 1872, 3¢ SQ (a nice early shade) tied by concentric ring cancel on cover from Manitowaning Lake Huron, indicia placement 1872 MR 2, paying 3¢ letter rate to Seneca (b/s) via Hamilton (b/s). \$150.00 SOLD



Item 652-12 – 1¢ SQ deep brownish orange 11.85 – Owen Sound – 1870, 1¢ SQ deep brownish orange (perf 11.85) tied by Owen Sound Ont cds with inner arc, dated SP 26 70, on Dominion of Canada printed circular to Eugenia, paying the 1¢ circular rate. The enclosed text concerns the bankruptcy and estate of the Bank of Upper Canada, declaring all assets property of The Crown. A striking early use of the 1¢ SQ in an historically significant context. \$250.00



Item 652-13 – St. Agapit Que (in blue with manuscript date) – 1884, 1¢, 3¢ SQ cancelled by matching fancy circular devices on cover from St. Agapit, Que, paying 4¢ quadruple printed matter rate to Quebec (b/s). St. Agapit was a Lotbinière County office opened in 1880; this may represent one of the earliest recorded uses, as no earlier example has been seen prior to 1887 (by me). Lawyer's file fold; one hinge used for reinforcement at bottom. \$100.00




Item 652-14 – <u>Kingston Cross fancy cancel, Lacelle 1079</u> – 1871, 3¢ SQ tied by the Kingston Cross fancy cancel on cover dated JY 4 71, paying 3¢ letter rate to Peterborough. The cancel is listed as Lacelle 1079 (pp. 102–103) and recorded in use from July to October 1871. A scarce and well-struck early fancy cancel. \$125.00



Item 652-15 – Barrie "B" fancy cancel, Lacelle 273 – 1872, 3¢ SQ tied by intaglio "B" fancy cancel on cover from Barrie Ont, dated MR 16 72, paying 3¢ letter rate to Toronto (b/s). The cancel is listed as Lacelle 273 (pp. 36–37), with recorded use from March 1872 to June 1876. A scarce strike on a large Crown Department envelope, neatly reduced to letter size. \$100.00




Item 652-16 – Collingwood Cross fancy cancel, Lacelle 1061 – 1872, 3¢ SQ tied by the Collingwood Cross fancy cancel on cover dated OC 14 72, paying 3¢ letter rate to Caledonia. Routed via Seneca and Hamilton (b/s). The cancel is listed as Lacelle 1061 (pp. 100–101), with recorded use from September 1872 to June 1874. A clean and attractive. \$75.00





Item 652-17 – **Toronto Cement Company** – 1881, 1¢ stationery card from Toronto to Longford Mills, with ornate reverse advertising for Edward Terry's Portland, Thorold, and other cements. The message discusses a shipment of Portland Cement. A visually appealing industrial-themed card. \$40.00





Item 652-18 – Montreal experimental machine cancel – 1902, 2¢ on 3¢ stationery envelope mailed from Quebec Que, paying 2¢ letter rate to Montreal. The reverse bears an experimental machine marking, hub used alone as a receiver, known as "Experimental X2." This rimless dater is tentatively attributed, with some skepticism, to Geary, an American machine manufacturer, and is recorded in use only between January 6 and February 15, 1902. Scarce. \$100.00 SOLD




Item 652-19 – <u>Gold Dust Washing Powder advertising</u> – 1903, 2¢ Edward tied by Montreal International machine cancel on Goldie and Dustie advertising cover for the Fairbank Company, featuring the iconic Gold Dust Twins, paying 2¢ letter rate to Moncton (b/s). A vibrant advertising cover with early brand imagery. \$150.00



Item 652-20 – <u>Spice and Coffee Mills of London</u> – 1911, 1¢ Edward tied by London Ont. machine cancel on IXL Spice and Coffee Co. advertising cover, featuring a smiling lady illustration, paying 1¢ drop letter rate. A charming and visually striking example from Canada's early coffee and spice trade. \$85.00 <u>SOLD</u>





Item 652-21 – Columbus Breeders of Horses - 1908, 2¢ Edward tied by Oshawa Ont cds on Smith & Richardson, Breeders of Horses advertising cover from Columbus Ont, paying 2¢ letter rate to Gowrie (b/s). Redirected to Gorrie (b/s), with transit markings from Munro and Mitchell (b/s). A well-travelled and visually appealing livestock-related cover. \$100.00 SOLD



Item 652-22 – <u>Pretty River Valley Ontario (Grey)</u> – 1904, 2¢, 5¢ Edward tied by grid cancel on cover from Pretty River Valley Ont, dated AP 6 04, paying 7¢ registered letter rate to Toronto (b/s). Routed via Nottawa (b/s). The Pretty River Valley Post Office is very scarce, in operation from 1887 to 1917. This postmark is now possibly the latest recorded date by 9 years, previously recorded OC 14 95. \$100.00





Item 652-23 – Shortpaid leather postcard – 1907, 1¢ Edward tied by St. Catharines Ont duplex cancel on leather postcard to Paris, bearing "More-to-Pay" handstamp, ms 2¢. As leather postcards were not permitted at the postcard rate, this item was reclassified as a 2¢ letter, rated 1¢ short, with double deficiency resulting in 2¢ due on delivery. A fascinating and rule-defying novelty for the postage due or postal regulation enthusiast. \$50.00





Item 652-24 – <u>Shortpaid leather postcard</u> – 1906, 1¢ Edward (fault) tied by Stratford Ont cds on leather postcard to Alton, bearing both "More-to-Pay" and "2¢ Due" handstamps. Leather postcards were not accepted at the postcard rate and were instead rated as 2¢ letters. This example was 1¢ short, with double deficiency resulting in 2¢ postage due upon delivery. An unusual and regulation-challenging piece, ideal for collectors of postage due or postal rule anomalies. \$35.00 SOLD






Item 652-25 – Shortpaid leather postcard – 1906, 1¢ Edward (fault) tied by Paris, Ont duplex cancel on leather postcard to Stratford, bearing both "Insufficiently Prepaid" and "2¢" handstamps. As leather postcards were not eligible for the postcard rate, this item was reclassified as a 2¢ letter. Rated 1¢ short, with double deficiency resulting in 2¢ due on delivery, paid with a 2¢ postage due stamp (also faulty). A distinctive and well-suited for collectors of postage due or postal rate curiosities. \$35.00







Item 652-26 – <u>Galloping through the mail, trio of horse postcards</u> – 1904 and two 1905 postcards depicting equestrian scenes: a polo match, a horse race, and military horses. All cards postally used in Quebec. A spirited trio showcasing horses in sport and service. \$30.00 <u>SOLD</u>




Item 652-27 – <u>Hudson Bay Knitting Co.</u> – 1904, 2¢ Edward tied by Montreal International machine cancel on Hudson Bay Knitting Company advertising cover, paying 2¢ letter rate to Moncton (b/s). HBK specialized in mitts, gloves, and moccasins. Fold at bottom. A nice cover from a notable Canadian outfitter. \$50.00 SOLD




Item 652-28 – <u>Oval Winnipeg Canada postmark</u> – 1926, 2¢ on 3¢ postal stationery envelope from Winnipeg, paying the 2¢ drop letter rate. Features the seldom seen and perfect oval Winnipeg Canada marking. A scarce local usage with an uncommon postmark. \$20.00 <u>SOLD</u>



Item 652-29 – <u>St. Stanislas Quebec (Champlain County)</u> – c1920, lot of four unused St. Stanislas Quebec postcards published by International Fine Art Co. of Montreal. The views include: the Molson Hotel with prominent Molson beer signage, a bilingual crossroads sign, a general merchant storefront with visible gas pumps, and the local school bearing its "Established 1887" plaque. A charming and evocative glimpse into early 20th-century rural Quebec. \$75.00



Item 652-30 – <u>Bulova and fine diamonds</u> – 1929, 1¢ Scroll stationery card mailed locally within Toronto. The reverse features Miss Liberty Bulova Watch advertising for Proctor's Fine Diamonds shop. Pretty! \$40.00 **SOLD**







Item 652-32 – <u>Canada Steamship Lines perfin</u> – 1915, 2¢ Admiral with CSL perfin tied by Montreal machine cancel on Canada Steamship Lines private postcard, paying the 2¢ postcard rate to Pictou. The message refers to a claim under investigation. A scarce CSL corporate usage. \$40.00 <u>SOLD</u>




Item 652-33 – Autograph letter signed by Sir Sandford Fleming – 1904, four-page private letter 8vo with postscript from Sir Sandford Fleming, datelined Winterholme, Ottawa, January 15, 1904, addressed to James Bain. In this candid and personal correspondence, Sir Sandford Fleming outlines his reasons for withdrawing support from a mutual acquaintance referred to as "Peter." He also discusses an upcoming address by Sir Thomas Barclay at the Canada Club, expresses hope that Bain might attend, and shares further notes on Barclay's speaking engagements. Sir Sandford Fleming (1827–1915), renowned civil engineer and scientist, was Canada's foremost railway engineer of the 19th century and the visionary behind the Three-Pence Beaver Canada's first postage stamp. James Bain (1842-1908) was a bookseller, publisher, first Chief Librarian of the Toronto Public Library. Sir Thomas Barclay (1853–1941), a distinguished figure in international law and economic thought, was also a British Liberal politician and respected public speaker. \$450.00 SOLD







Item 652-34 – <u>Trio of autographed letters from the Duke of Argyll</u> – 1871, 1884 and 1901, set of three signed letters each autographed by John Douglas Sutherland Campbell, 9th Duke of Argyll and Marquis of Lorne, who served as Governor General of Canada from 1878 to 1883. As the husband of Princess Louise, he was of course the son-in-law of Queen Victoria, linking these documents to both Canadian and royal history. 1901 letter datelined Kensington, reflecting his later years in Britain, 1884 letter top portion trimmed, 1871 letter affixed to a backing sheet. An interesting trio of a prominent figure in Canadian and imperial history. \$150.00 SOLD



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


Item 652-35 – <u>Autographed mourning letter from Lord Aberdeen</u> – 1899, four-page handwritten letter signed by John Campbell Gordon (1847–1934), 7th Earl of Aberdeen and former Governor General of Canada (1893–1898). Writing in the wake of personal tragedy, Lord Aberdeen thanks Mrs. Riggs for her thoughtful gift following the recent death of his son in an accident. A poignant and intimate document reflecting the human dimensions of public figures in mourning. \$100.00



Item 652-36 – Mackenzie King appointment letter to League of Nations – 1924, typed letter of appointment signed by the Clerk of the Privy Council, acting on behalf of Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King, formally designating Edward Mortimer Macdonald, then Minister of National Defence, as Canada's official delegate to the Fifth Assembly of the League of Nations in Geneva. The document bears a wax seal and ribbon affixed to the upper left corner. A historically significant artifact, it reflects Canada's early commitment to international diplomacy and multilateral cooperation in the postwar era. The League of Nations, established in 1920 to promote peace and global collaboration following World War I, sought to prevent future conflicts through diplomacy, disarmament, and collective security. Though it achieved notable progress in humanitarian and social domains, it ultimately failed to prevent the outbreak of World War II and was succeeded by the United Nations in 1946. \$150.00 SOLD



Item 652-37 – <u>Calgary hatchery promotional mailing</u> – 1934, 1¢ Medallion tied by Calgary machine cancel on James Fox Quality Hatchery advertising cover, paying the 1¢ printed matter rate to Standard, Alta. Enclosed is a remarkable promotional insert: highly illustrated special offers for various poultry breeds, a chick starter kit advertisement with order form, and a typed letter addressed to the poultry keeper. Cover shows some wear with flap reattached, otherwise in fine condition. A pretty Medallion Issue item paired with vibrant, content-rich Alberta agricultural advertising. \$75.00 **SOLD**





Item 652-38 – Monument Que (Giffard) – 1935, 2¢ Medallion tied by Quebec PQ machine cancel on cover attempting to pay 2¢ drop letter rate to B.P. Monument (b/s), Giffard, Quebec. Although the Monument Post Office might be considered part of greater Quebec City, in the 1930s it was deemed too distant to qualify as local. The cover was charged 2¢ postage due for double deficiency on the 1¢ shortpaid (due *stamp precancelled by roller*). The Monument Post Office, located on *Chemin Royale* within Mastai near the Sanatorium Mastaï, served a territory divided between two seigneuries west of the Beauport River. This included the former municipalities of Giffard and Saint-Michel-Archange, in the southeastern portion of the seigneury of Notre-Dame-des-Anges, originally granted to the Jesuits in 1626. The office operated from 1913 to 1946. A scarce and historically layered cover from the Quebec City Beauport region. \$75.00





Item 652-39 – 3¢ preferred letter rate to Argentina – 1937, 3¢ GEOV stationery envelope mailed from Dunnville, Ontario, paying the 3¢ preferred letter rate to Argentina, with backstamp confirming delivery. A fine cover. \$50.00







Item 652-40 – **3¢ Empire to Leith Harbour, South Georgia** – 1940, 3¢ GEOVI stationery envelope mailed from Schumacher Ont paying 3¢ letter rate to Leith Harbour, South Georgia, via the Falkland Islands (b/s). Leith Harbour was one of several whaling stations on the northeast coast of South Georgia, established and operated by an Edinburgh-based company. The return address reads: "Postmaster at Leith Harbour/if John Harrison is not there, please forward letter to Scotland.". The envelope shows folds and wrinkling from handling. A rare South Atlantic Ocean destination. \$250.00 **SOLD**



Item 652-41 – <u>Lac Bouchette PQ MOOD cancel</u> – 1936, 2¢ Admiral, 1¢ Medallion tied by Lac Bouchette PQ MOOD handstamp on cover paying the 3¢ letter rate to Toronto. The MOOD handstamps were typically used for administrative purposes within the post office, including money orders and official documents. Scarce on regular mail. An unusual and appealing Lac St. Jean usage. \$35.00



Item 652-42 – **3¢ Mufti double print on cover** – 1940, 3¢ Mufti double print and 10¢ Pictorial on military cover from the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders, tied by Military Post Office No.301 cds (Ottawa) paying 13¢ registered letter rate to Hamilton (b/s). The 3¢ Mufti stamp is well known for its many printing varieties; this dramatic double impression is a standout example. A striking showpiece. \$500.00 **SOLD**




Item 652-43 – <u>Timmins – received as way mail in Toronto</u> – 1938, 3¢ Mufti tied by Toronto Travelling Letter Box machine cancel on cover from Timmins, Ontario, paying 3¢ letter rate to Toronto. This cancel was applied at Toronto Union Station to uncancelled mail arriving by trains, part of the "way" mail system used for dispatches from Northern Ontario towns. Such covers range from common to scarce. Addressed to the Head Office of Credo Porcupine Gold Mines Ltd in Toronto. A clean and appealing mining-related and way cover. \$40.00 **SOLD**



Item 652-44 – Rouyn Quebec – received as way mail in Toronto – 1938, 3¢ Mufti tied by Toronto Travelling Letter Box machine cancel on hotel c/c cover from Rouyn Quebec, paying 3¢ letter rate to Hamilton. This cancel was applied at Toronto Union Station to uncancelled mail arriving by train, part of the "way" mail system used for dispatches from outlying towns. An especially rare Quebec-origin example of this routing practice, with a crisp strike and attractive commercial usage. A standout item for collectors of Abitibi mail, Northern mail or Travelling Letter Box markings. \$75.00 SOLD





Item 652-45 – 4¢ GEOVI stationery envelope cutout – 1945, 4¢ GEOVI stationery env cutout affixed to cover and tied by Camp Borden MPO 202 machine cancel on Armoured Corps envelope, correctly paying 4¢ letter rate to Hamilton. Although cutouts from postal stationery were not valid for postage, this unauthorized usage was either overlooked or tacitly accepted, likely due to its origin from a serviceman. \$40.00 SOLD



Item 652-46 – <u>Chewing Gum booklet panes and stamps</u> - 1947, 4¢ War Chewing Gum booklet panes and single stamps (12) tied by Toronto Airmail Section cds on cover overpaying 45¢ triple weight airmail letter rate to England. Redirected within to Plymouth. A spectacular Chewing Gum booklet franking. \$75.00 <u>SOLD</u>



Item 652-47 – <u>Blackout roller cancel</u> – c1942–43, pair of 4¢ War Issue tied by a highly unusual and unofficial blackout roller cancel on 1¢ GEOVI post band, paying 9¢ printed matter rate to Plevna Ont for a 36 ounces bundle or fraction thereof. The post office name was deliberately removed, in keeping with wartime security protocols. Although official blackout devices were distributed in 1942, this roller cancel appears to be a locally improvised solution, likely devised by a resourceful postmaster at an unidentified office. This is the first example of a blackout roller cancel I have encountered, an extraordinary and enigmatic piece of WW2 domestic postal history. A true discussion piece, worthy of further study or to be published. \$100.00 SOLD






Item 652-48 – <u>Bulova registered cover</u> – 1945, 14¢ War Issue tied by Eganville Ont duplex cancel on Bulova and Jewelry advertising cover, paying the 14¢ registered letter rate to Montreal (b/s). Carried via the seldom-seen Ottawa & Barry's Bay RPO, Gray ON-364, RF C. A great combo "Bulova" and "Registered". \$40.00 <u>SOLD</u>





Item 652-52 – Eleanor Roosevelt letter to Quebec Rolland Family Paper Mill – 1959, typed letter signed by Anna Eleanor Roosevelt, accompanied by its original free franked envelope postmarked New York, 1959, and addressed to Mrs. Rolland of the distinguished Rolland Paper Company family (*Marc and Roméo Rolland*). Initially misdirected to St. Ours, Quebec, the letter was rerouted to Mont Rolland and then to St. Jérôme. The correspondence is mounted on a scrapbook page and includes a related letter from the company's Head Office referencing the exchange. Eleanor Roosevelt (1884–1962), renowned American political figure, diplomat, and activist, served as First Lady of the United States during Franklin D. Roosevelt's presidency (1933–1945). This compelling piece offers a tangible link between one of the 20th century's most influential women and a notable Canadian industrial family. \$300.00




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
