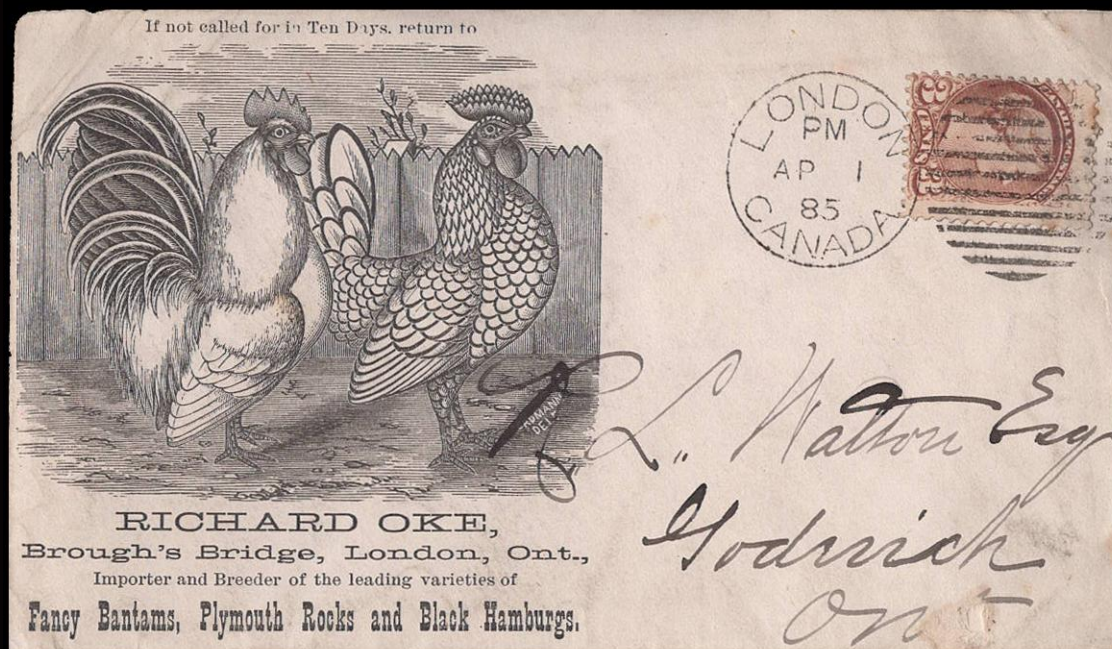

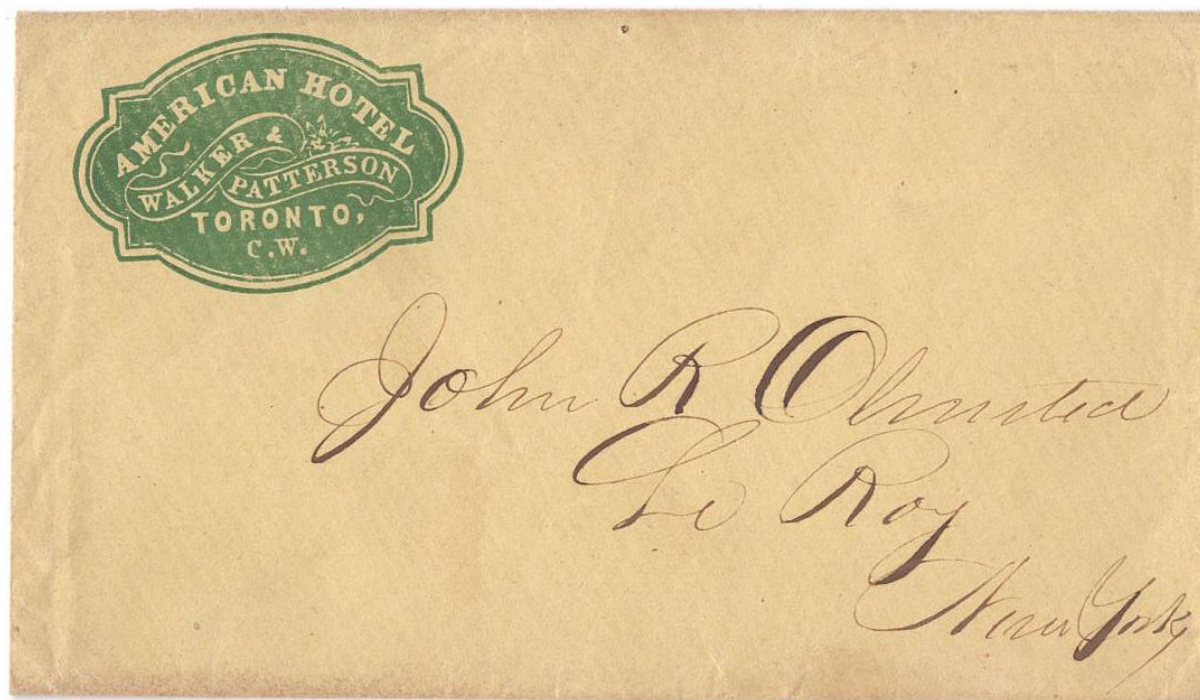

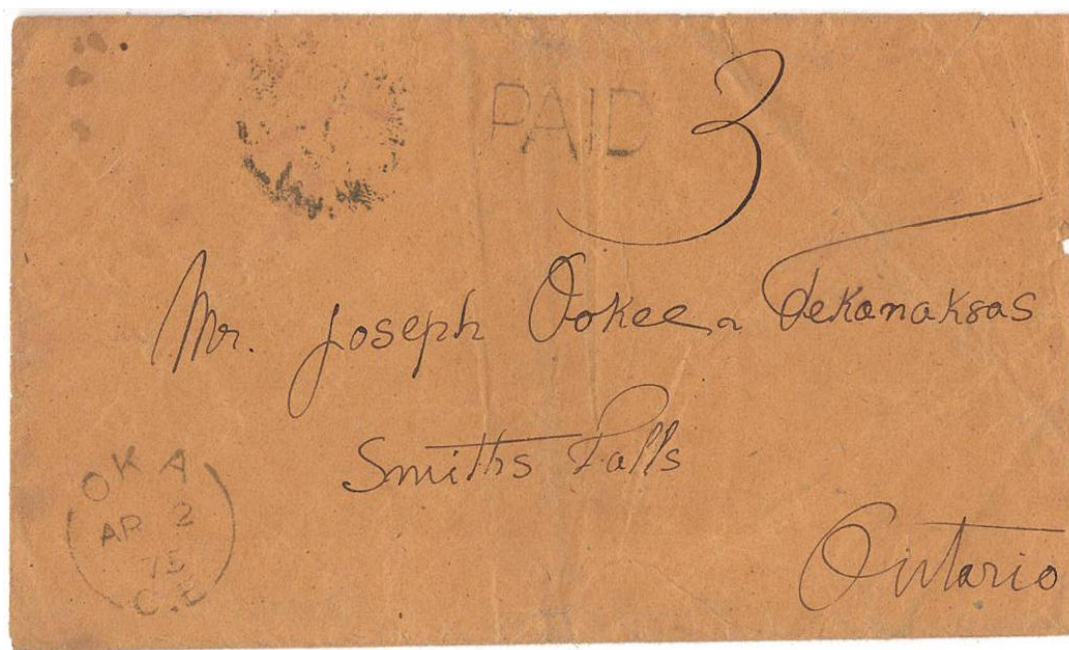
Item 653-01 – **Toronto American Hotel cameo advertising** – c.1860, yellow stampless cover from Toronto, CW featuring a vivid green cameo advertisement for the American Hotel. Addressed to New York State, with no postal markings or rate indicated. A clean and visually appealing example of early hotel advertising. \$200.00 **SOLD**



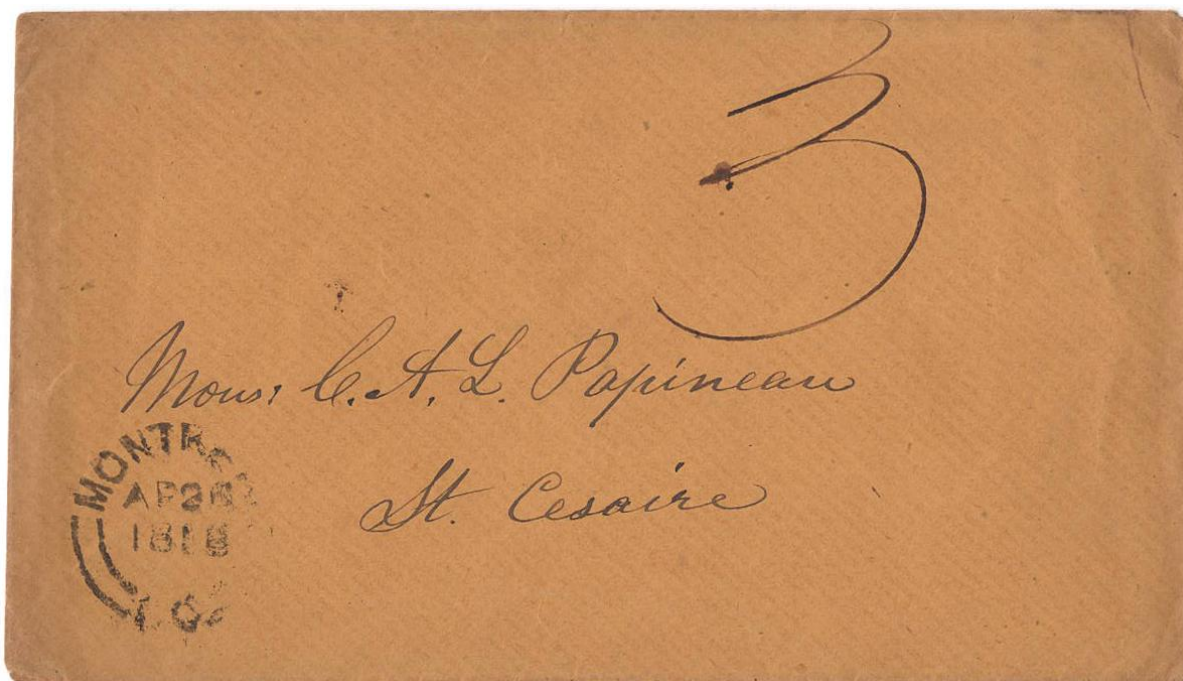
Item 653-02 – **Brantford Gore District Fire Insurance cameo** – 1855, stampless cover from Brantford, UC with an attractive cameo advertisement for the Gore District Mutual Fire Insurance Company, rated 3d collect to Stratford (b/s). Routed via Woodstock (b/s). Light staining at upper right, otherwise a fine and appealing example. \$200.00



Item 653-03 – **Steamboat letter - Cazenovia, NY to Toronto** – 1836, folded letter from Cazenovia, NY to Toronto via sailing vessel, likely a local schooner or steamboat from Sackets Harbor to Kingston. The front features an outstanding Sackets Harbor strike with excellent placement, along with a weak Kingston Up Can marking. Originally prepaid 12¢ to the lines (scratched out), then 1/4 collect from Kingston to Toronto. This is a rare example of incoming steamboat mail to Canada, predating the formalization of steamboat mail contracts. Also notable as a Lake Ontario winter letter, 1836 being a recorded year when the lake remained unfrozen. \$500.00 **SOLD**



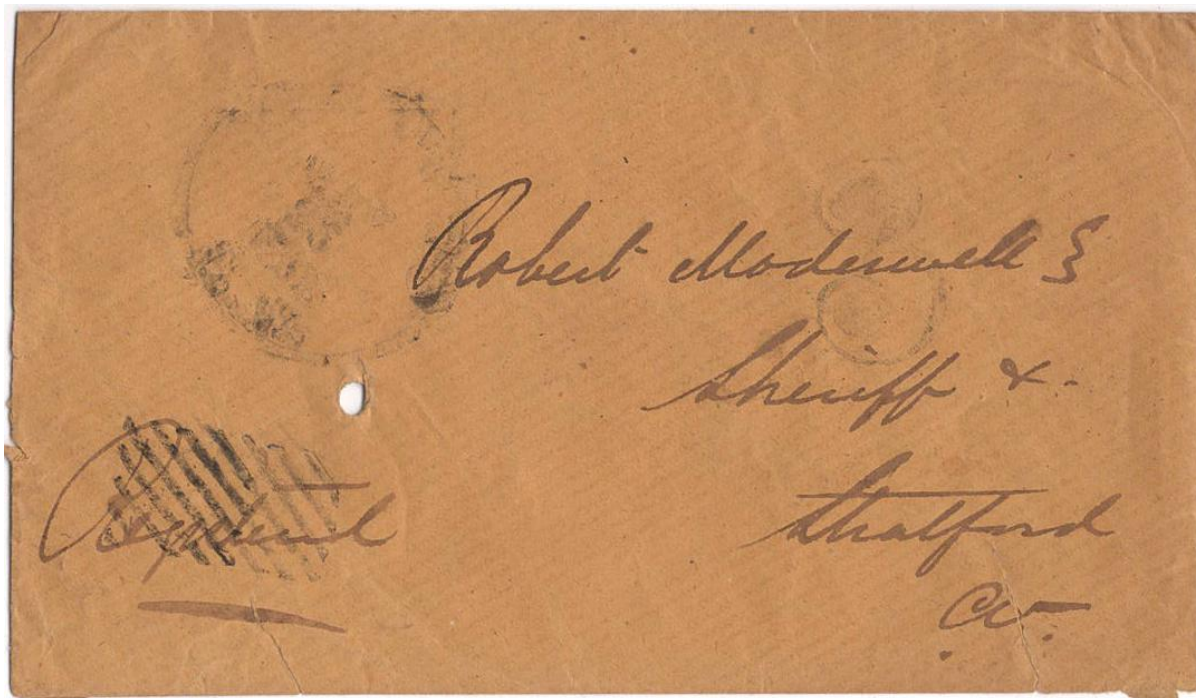
Item 653-04 – **Oka CE (Deux Montagnes County)** – 1875, stampless cover from Oka, C.E., dated AP 27 75, paid 3¢ to Smiths Falls Ont (b/s). Carried over the Ottawa River to Como (b/s), then forwarded to Montreal (b/s). This example features a very scarce Oka Berri hammer with the C.E. designation. It is also a particularly interesting stampless usage, as prepayment by adhesive stamp became mandatory starting October 1, 1875. \$125.00



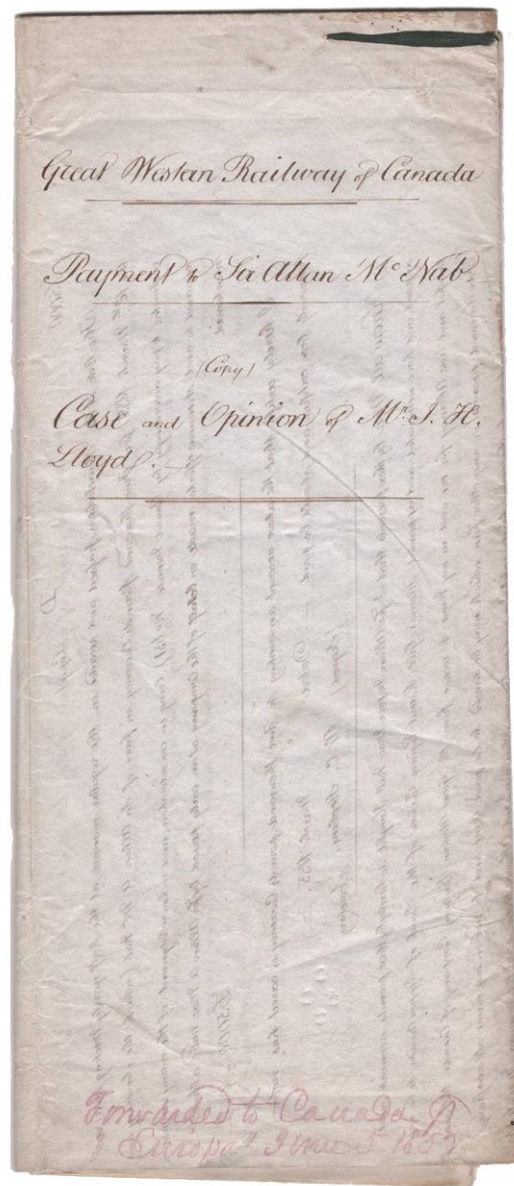
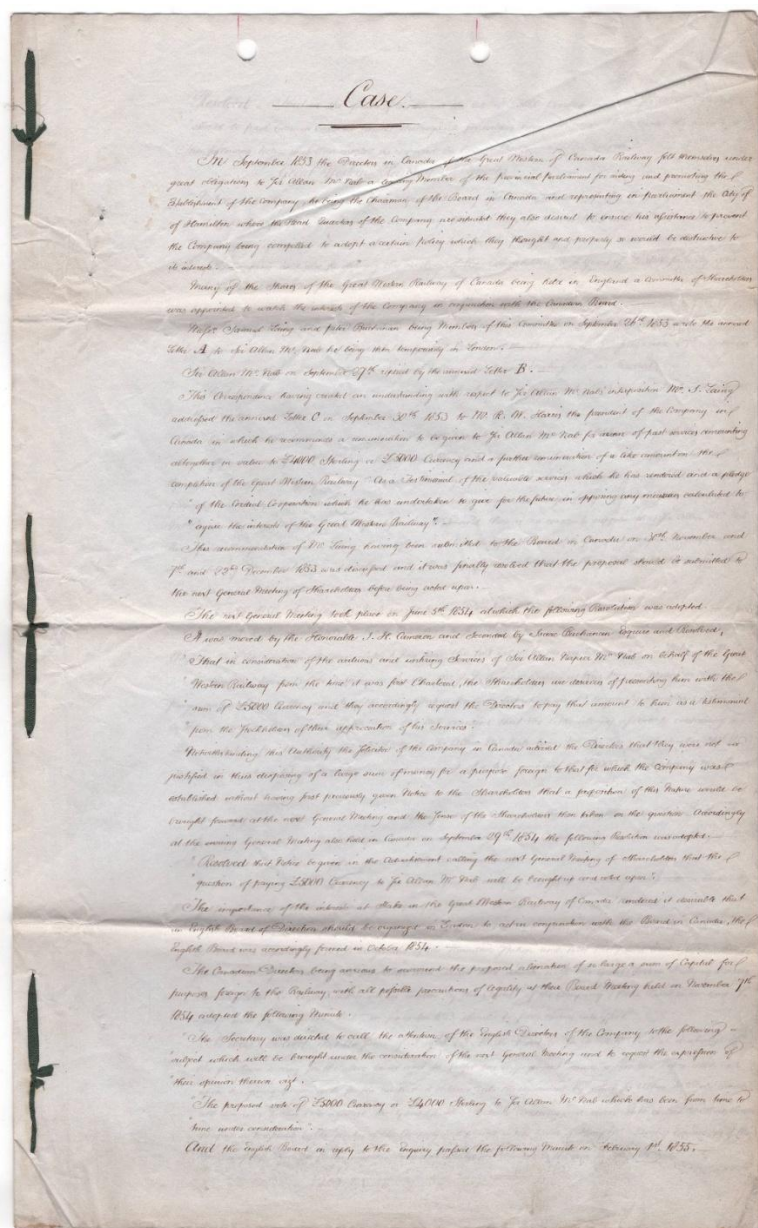
Item 653-05 – **Molsons Bank embossed advertising** – 1858, stampless cover from Montreal rated 3d collect to St. Cesaire. The reverse features a Molsons Bank embossed advertising. Founded in Montreal in 1853 by John and William Molson, The Bank was still in its formative years when this cover was mailed. By 1858, it was entering a period of steady growth, expanding its services and establishing a foothold in Canada's developing financial sector. \$50.00



Item 653-06 – **Cap Santé - Portneuf LC to Quebec** – 1852 folded letter, written in French, datelined Cap Santé 18 mars 1852, mailed prepaid from Portneuf to Quebec (b/s). The letter is addressed to a baker and relates to business. \$75.00



Item 653-07 – **Registered endorsement struck out by diamond grids** – 1858 stampless cover from Cobourg, C.W. (a very weak Ruggles strike), rated 3d collect to Stratford (Ruggles b/s). Initially intended to be registered, the endorsement was cancelled by two diamond grid strikes. A very unusual and interesting use of this postmark. Pinhole. \$75.00 **SOLD**



Item 653-08 – **Sir Allan Napier MacNab** – 1857, legal case document: payment to Sir Allan Napier MacNab by the Great Western Railway of Canada (1857), Case and Opinion of Mr. J.H. Lloyd, Date of compilation: 24 March 1857, docketed: 5 June 1857. Format: Six folio leaves, closely written and neatly presented, bound at the left edge with original ribbon. Paper bears the watermark "J. Whatman 1855." Folded and docketed. This six-page legal manuscript presents a detailed account of the £5,000 payment made in 1853 to Sir Allan Napier MacNab by the Great Western Railway of Canada, shortly before his appointment as Joint Premier of the Province of Canada. The document, compiled by Mr. J.H. Lloyd, includes a narrative of the circumstances surrounding the payment, along with supporting documentation. According to the Dictionary of Canadian Biography (Vol. IX, p. 526), the £5,000 was ostensibly given as a retirement gift. However, subsequent payments were made to MacNab in the following years, reportedly to secure his influential support in future business dealings on behalf of the railway. Mr. Lloyd's opinion suggests that the initial payment was unauthorized issued without the knowledge or approval of the board of directors and absent any shareholder vote. The document appears to have been prepared in anticipation of legal proceedings to recover the funds, alleging the transaction was improper and potentially illegal. However, there is no evidence that the case proceeded to court, and the payment was never reclaimed. \$1,250.00

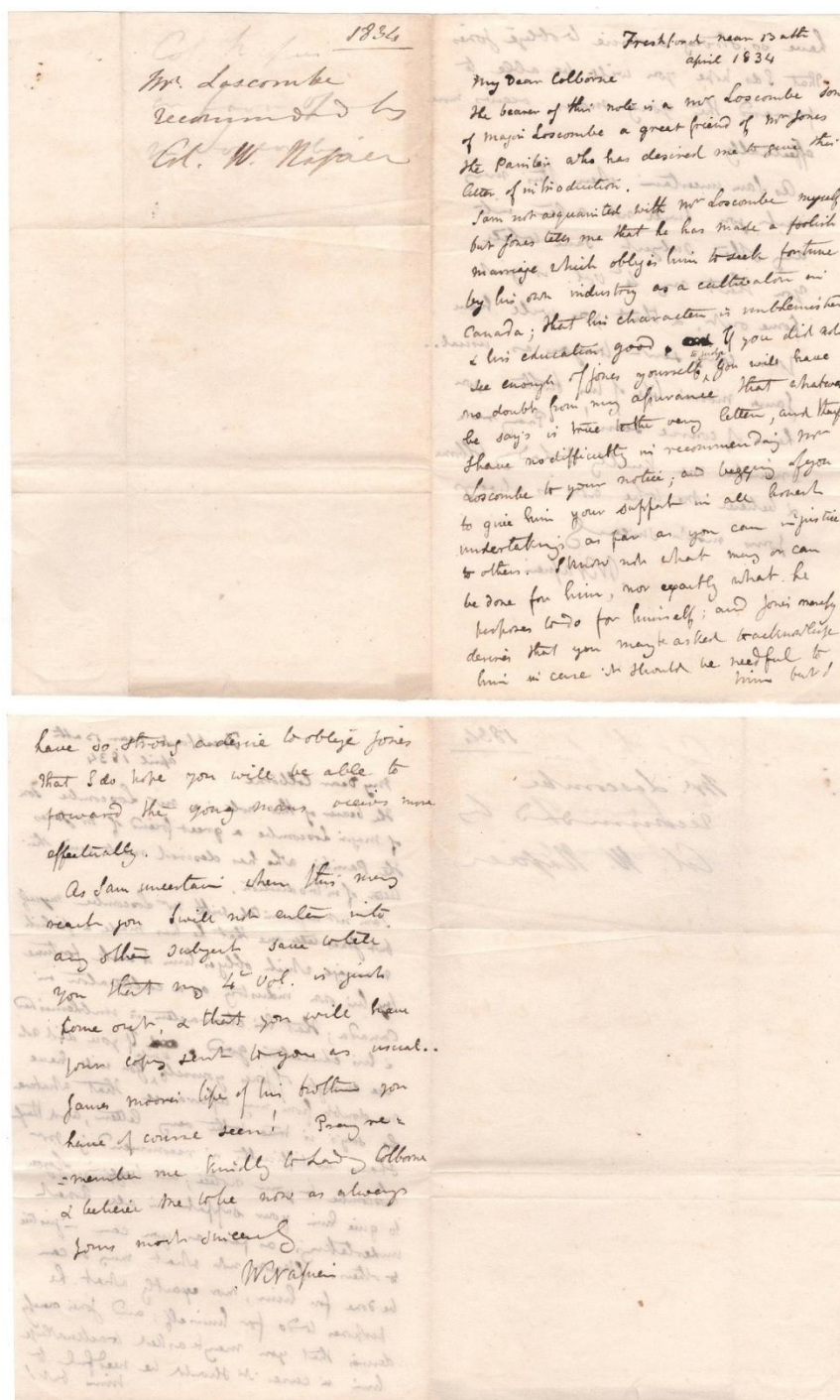

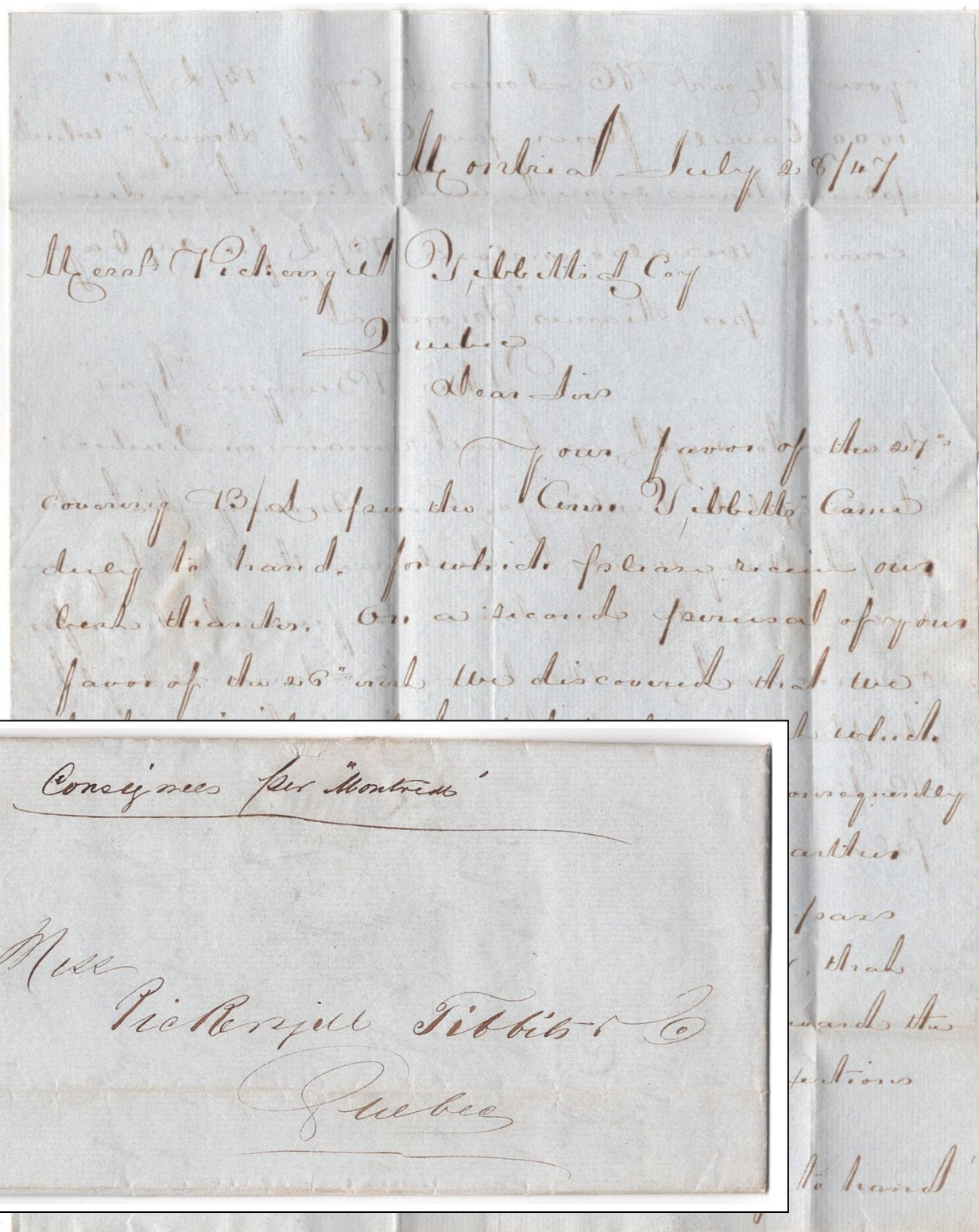

Item 653-09 – **Letter Signed by John Inglis, Bishop of Nova Scotia** – 1832 (April 21), four-page autograph letter signed, 8vo. To summarize, Bishop Inglis offers sympathy, laments high postage costs from his official duties, and seeks franking privileges. He hopes to receive The Remembrancer cheaply, expresses concern over his son John's delayed army commission, and reflects on societal decline, property news, and global unrest despite a calm legislative session. \$250.00



Item 653-10 – **Colonel W. Napier to Lt Gov of Upper Canada** – 1834, letter of introduction written and signed by Colonel W. Napier to John Colborne, Lt. Gov. of Upper Canada (1828-1836), 2 pp. In this April 1834 manuscript letter from Freshford near Bath, Colonel Napier writes to Sir John Colborne, introducing Mr. Loscombe, son of Major Loscombe, at the request of Mr. Jones the painter. Though Napier does not know Loscombe personally, he conveys that the young man, described as well-educated and of good character, has made an imprudent marriage and now seeks to build a future through agricultural work in Canada. Napier respectfully asks Colborne to support Loscombe in any honest endeavor, within reason, reflecting the era's reliance on personal recommendation and patronage in colonial advancement. \$350.00



Item 653-11 – **Consignees per steamboat Montreal** – 1847 folded letter from Montreal to Quebec, endorsed “Consignee per Montreal.” Carried free of charge under Post Office regulations, as the steamboat Montreal was operating under postal contract and the letter accompanied a shipment of goods. Illustrated in Parson’s book, page 255. Ex Bob Parsons. \$300.00

TORONTO MARKET REPORT.

We are now within a fortnight of the close of navigation, and the quantity of Produce brought to market since harvest, has not been, probably, one half of that of last year for corresponding period. Farmers most reluctantly accept current rates for their wheat; and, withholding their supplies, have succeeded thus far in keeping the price of Wheat relatively higher than that of Flour. We observe that the receipts at Boston, by Rail and Water, since harvest, have been 76,142 barrels of Flour less than during the corresponding period of 1856. The consumption of the city of Boston alone, is over 10,000 barrels a month. The receipts at Albany, also, up to the end of October, show a deficit of more than a million and a quarter barrels of Flour (reducing Wheat to Flour), upon those of 1856, to same period. This, taken in connection with the fact that the production of 1857, exceeded that of any previous harvest on this Continent, is a startling position for the large consuming cities of the East, to find themselves placed in at this late period of the season.

There will be an active business doing all winter, for Eastern account, only limited by the capacity of our Railroads. The Commercial embarrassments, precludes any orders being filled for the States, but such as are accompanied by Bank credits.

WHEAT has come in more liberally of late, and samples are decidedly improving in value.

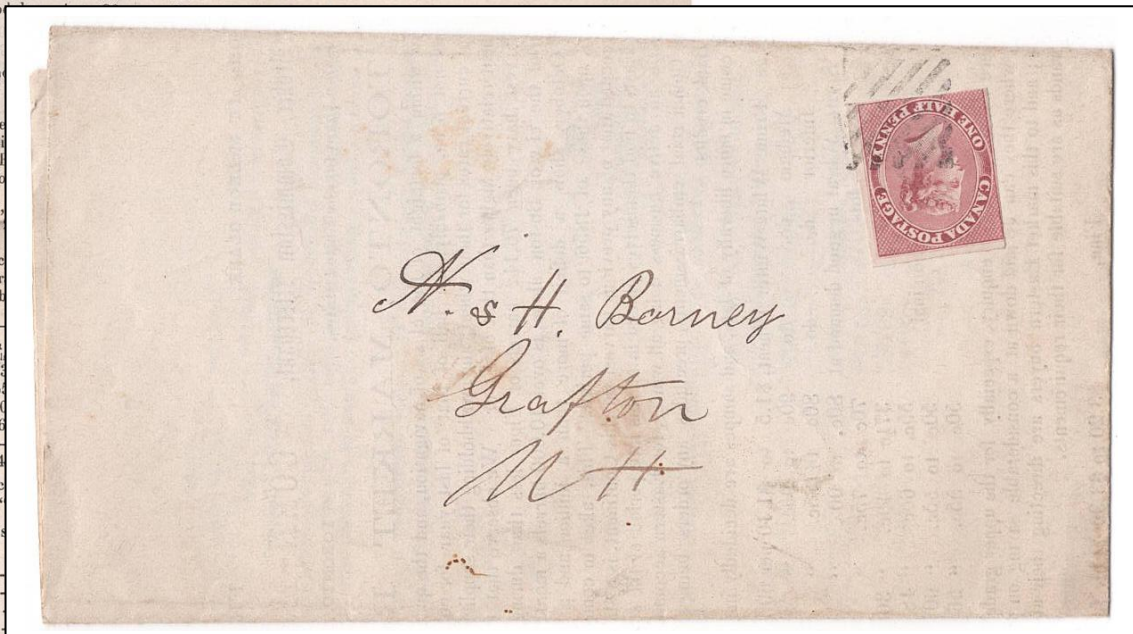

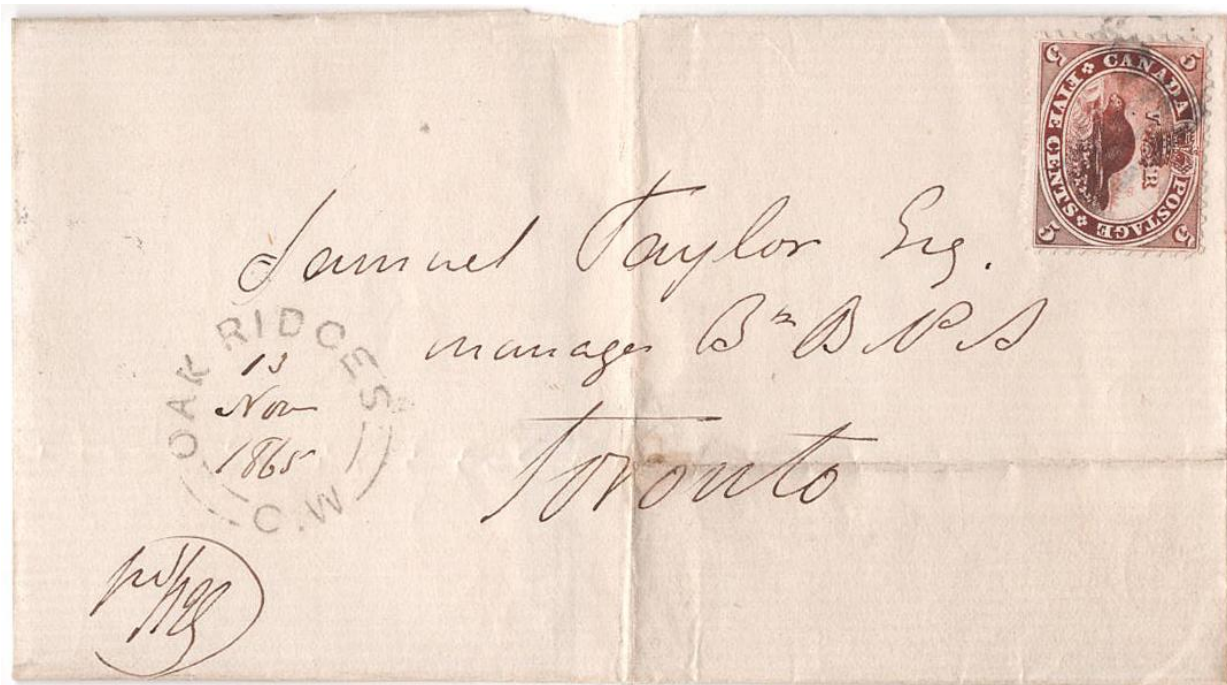

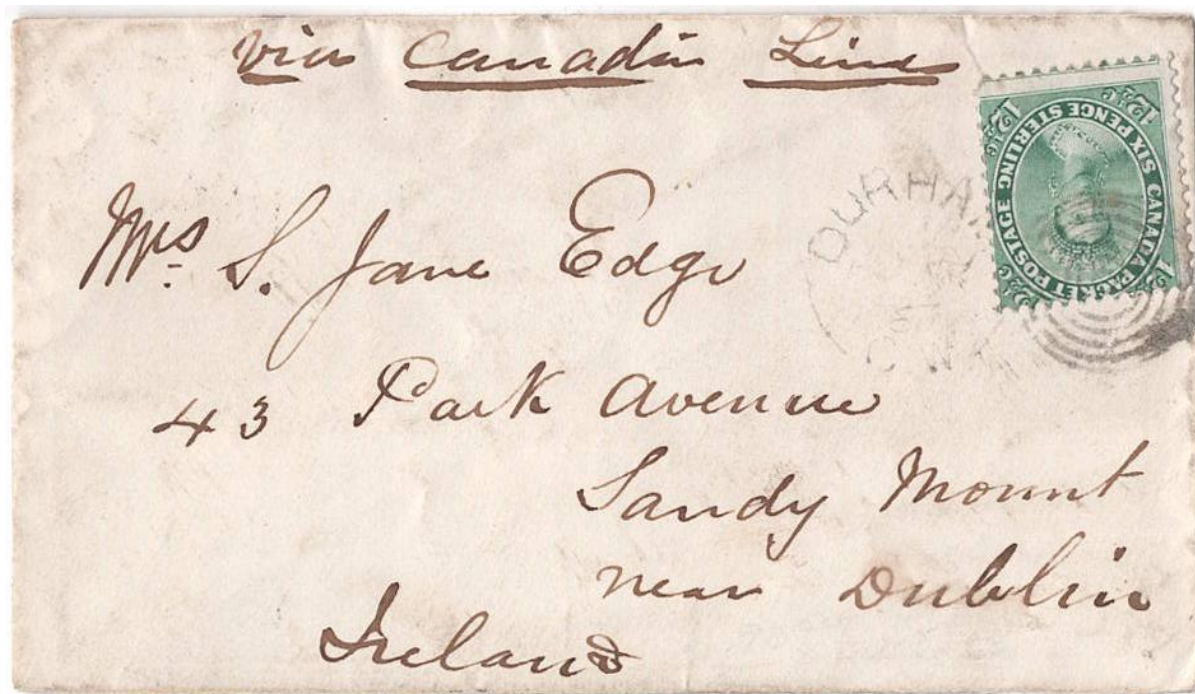

Item 653-12 – Half penny circular rate to the U.S. – 1852, $\frac{1}{2}$ d deep rose with two margins (*large at top and right*), tied by grid cancel on T.M. Clark's Flour and Grain printed circular from Toronto, paying the $\frac{1}{2}$ d circular rate to New Hampshire. A clean and attractive example of early cross-border printed matter. \$500.00



Item 653-13 – The earliest of two recorded Oak Ridges, C.W. (York) – 1865, 5¢ Beaver tied by grid cancel on folded cover from Oak Ridges, C.W., manuscript dated 13 NO 65, paying 5¢ letter rate to Toronto (b/s). A very rare York County post office, this is the earliest of only two recorded strikes. \$300.00



Item 653-14 – 12½¢ Allan Line rate to Dublin, Ireland – 1867, 12½¢ Decimal (slightly off-centre) tied by a concentric ring cancel on cover from Durham CW paying 12½¢ Allan Line letter rate to Dublin, Ireland. Endorsed "Via Canadian Lines," and carried by the Allan Line Peruvian from Quebec to Liverpool. This Durham CW 20mm Berri hammer is recorded between 1866 and 1868. Grey County. \$250.00



Item 653-15 – **A perfect Halifax duplex "H"** – 1867 Nova Scotia 5c stamp tied by Halifax duplex "H" cancel on hardware c/c cover paying the 5c letter rate to Mabou Cape Breton (b/s). \$50.00 **SOLD**



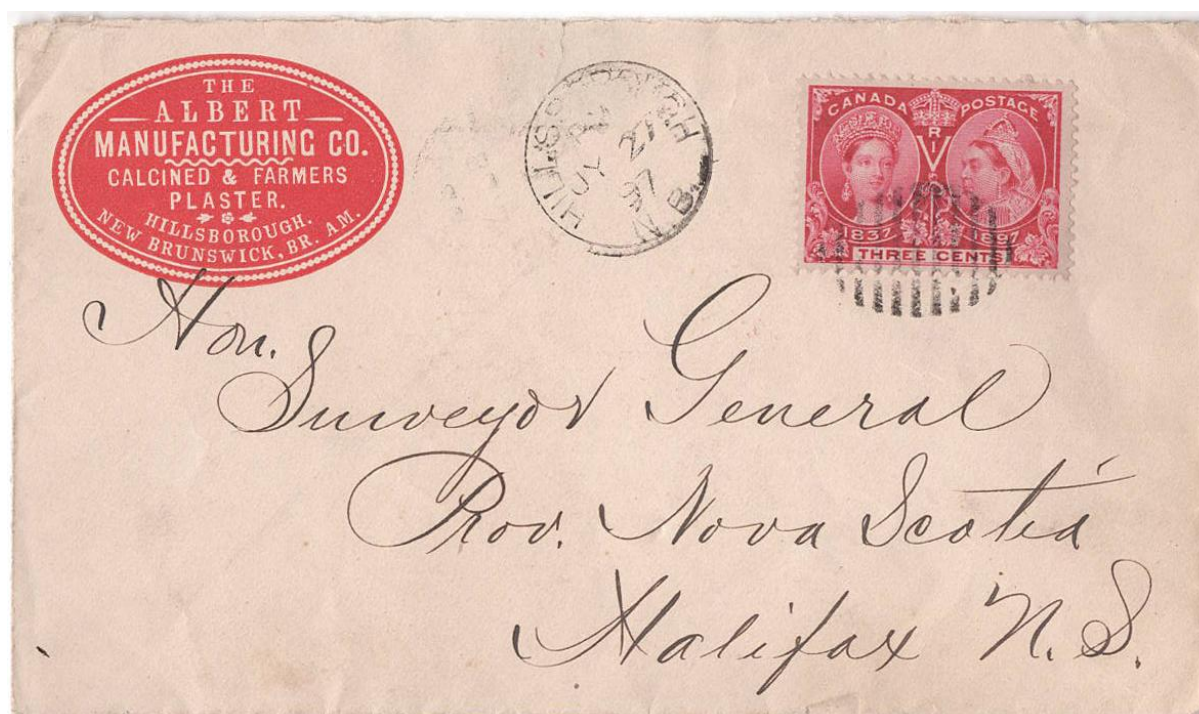
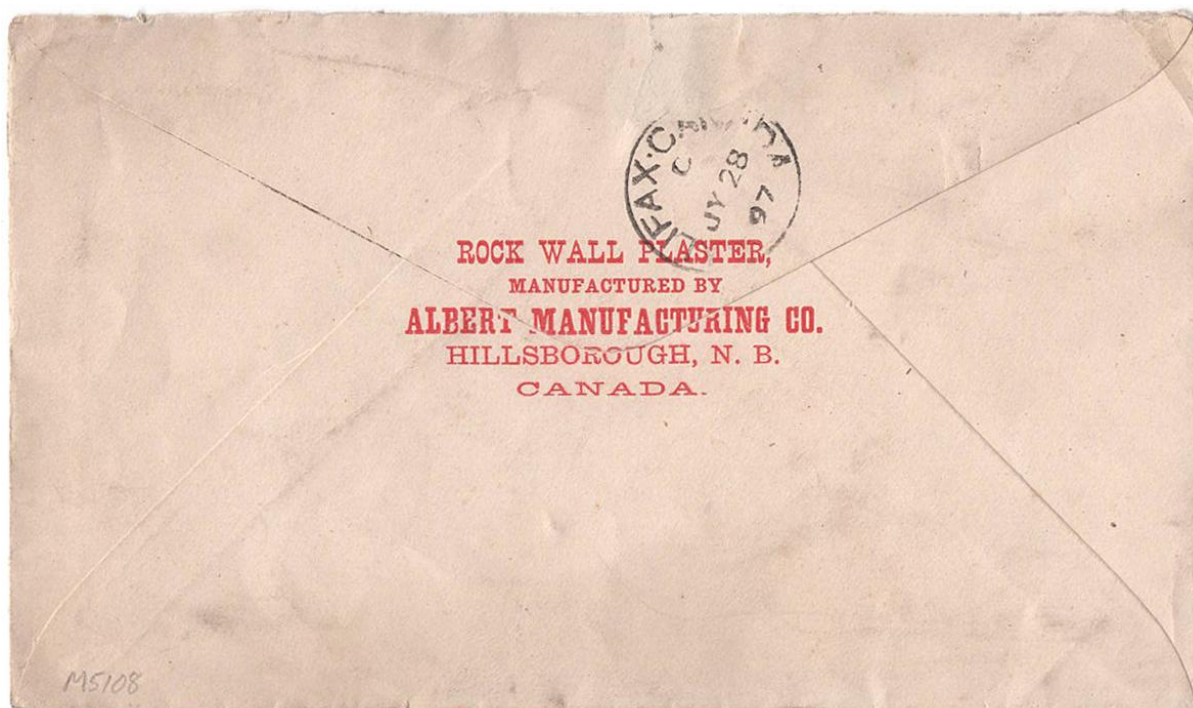
Item 653-16 – **A perfect Halifax grid "H"** – 1863 folded cover bearing a Nova Scotia 5c stamp tied by Halifax grid "H" cancel, paying the 5c letter rate to Truro. Backstamped Halifax and Truro. A superb strike. \$75.00 **SOLD**



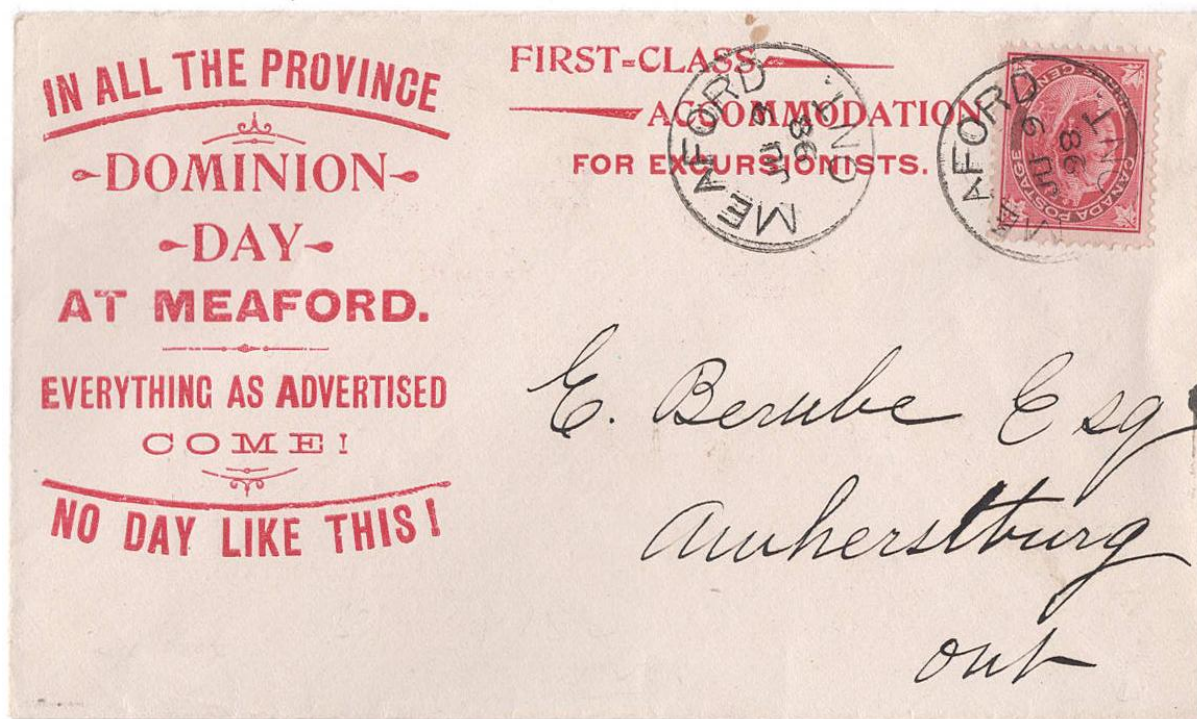
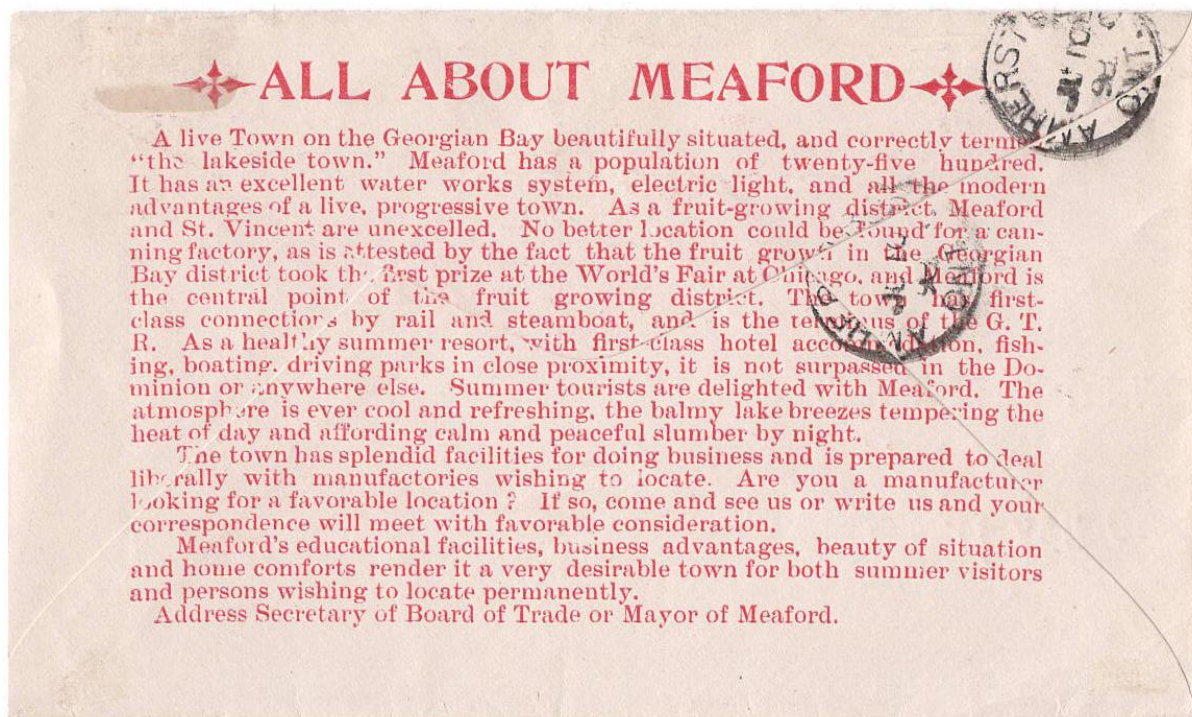
Item 653-17 – **London poultry breeders** – 1885, 3¢ SQ tied by London duplex cancel on Richard Oke of Brough's Bridge advertising cover paying 3¢ letter rate to Goderich (b/s). Oke was a noted importer and breeder of Fancy Bantams, Plymouth Rocks, and Black Hamburg's, popular varieties among poultry fanciers of the period. His illustrated cover features a striking and exuberant depiction of two roosters, making it a standout example of Victorian-era advertising through the mail. A visually spectacular and rich cover for collectors of agricultural advertising. \$300.00 **SOLD**



Item 653-18 – **G.W.R. Express and an unlisted donut fancy cancel** – 1888, 3¢ SQ tied by a bold "Honey Cruller" fancy cancel on cover, mailed aboard the GWR Express JY 26 88 (RY-76), paying 3¢ letter rate to Peterborough (b/s). Back flap missing. This distinctive donut-style cancel is unlisted in Lacelle and adds considerable character to the cover. Railway mail combined with an unrecorded fancy strike makes this one a very desirable Small Queen cover! \$100.00 **SOLD**



Item 653-19 – Hillsborough NB gypsum cameo advertising – 1897, 3¢ Jubilee tied by oval grid cancel on cameo advertising cover from the Albert Manufacturing Company, Hillsborough NB, paying 3¢ letter rate to Halifax (b/s). Addressed to the Surveyor General and features an elegant and emblematic cameo design. The Albert Mfg Company was founded in Hillsborough in the 1850s and operated a gypsum milling facility, an important industry in the region. \$100.00



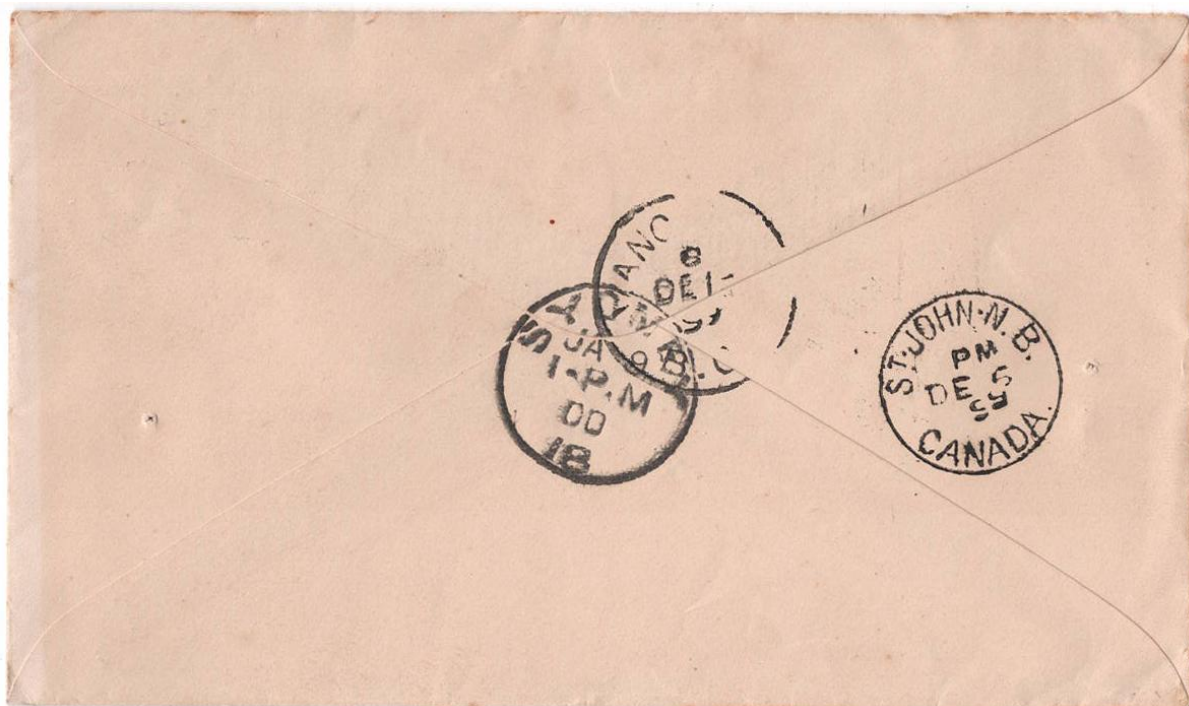
Item 653-20 – Dominion Day at Meaford – 1898, 3¢ Maple Leaf tied by Meaford Ont cds on Dominion Day advertising cover paying 3¢ letter rate to Amherstburg (b/s). The reverse features a detailed promotional text "all about" the town. Slightly reduced at right, but still a charming, scarce and historically evocative cover. \$150.00



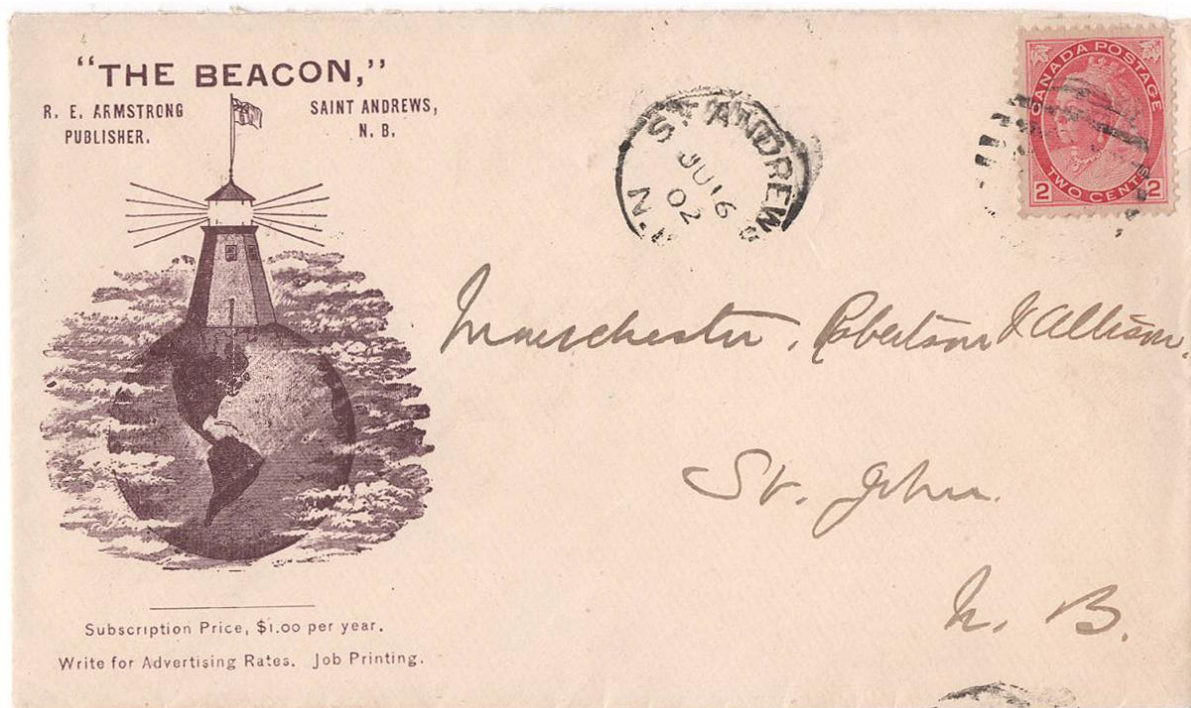
Item 653-21 – Leap Year - Presque' Isle Ont (Grey County) – 1899, 1¢, 2¢ (3) Maple Leaf tied by Presque' Isle Ont broken circle on Rennie Seeds reply cover, dated FE 29 99 a leap year date, paying 7¢ registered letter rate to Toronto (b/s) via Owen Sound (b/s). Presque' Isle is a very scarce Ontario post office, adding notable rarity to this cover. \$125.00



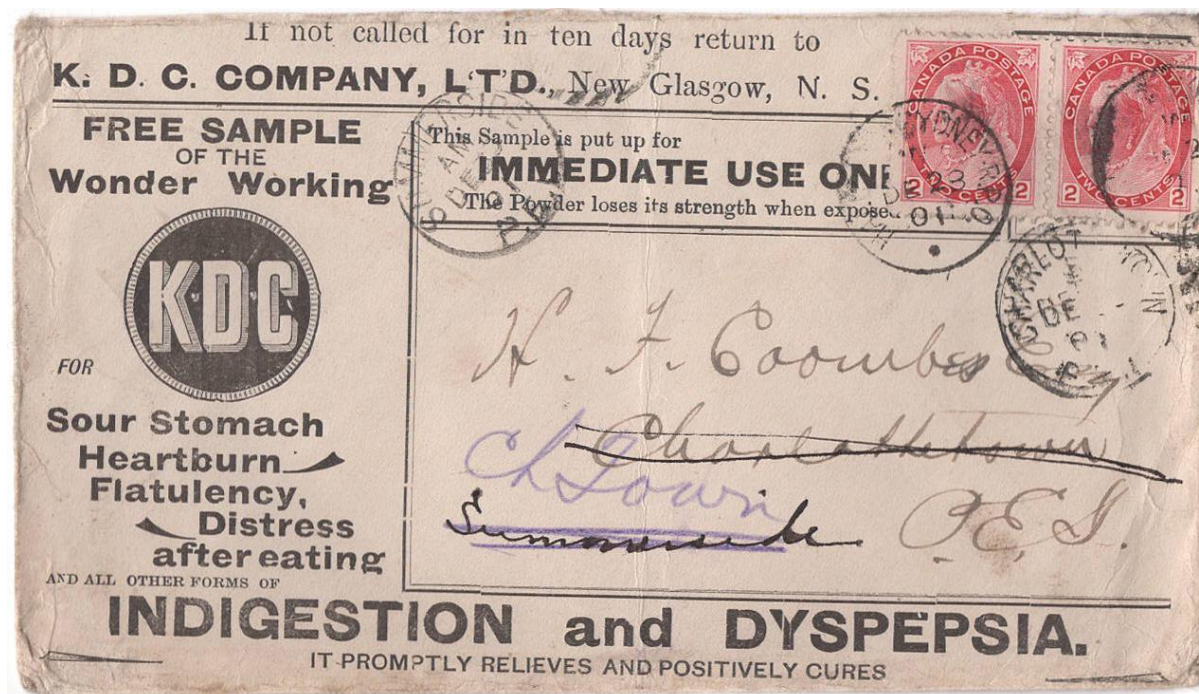

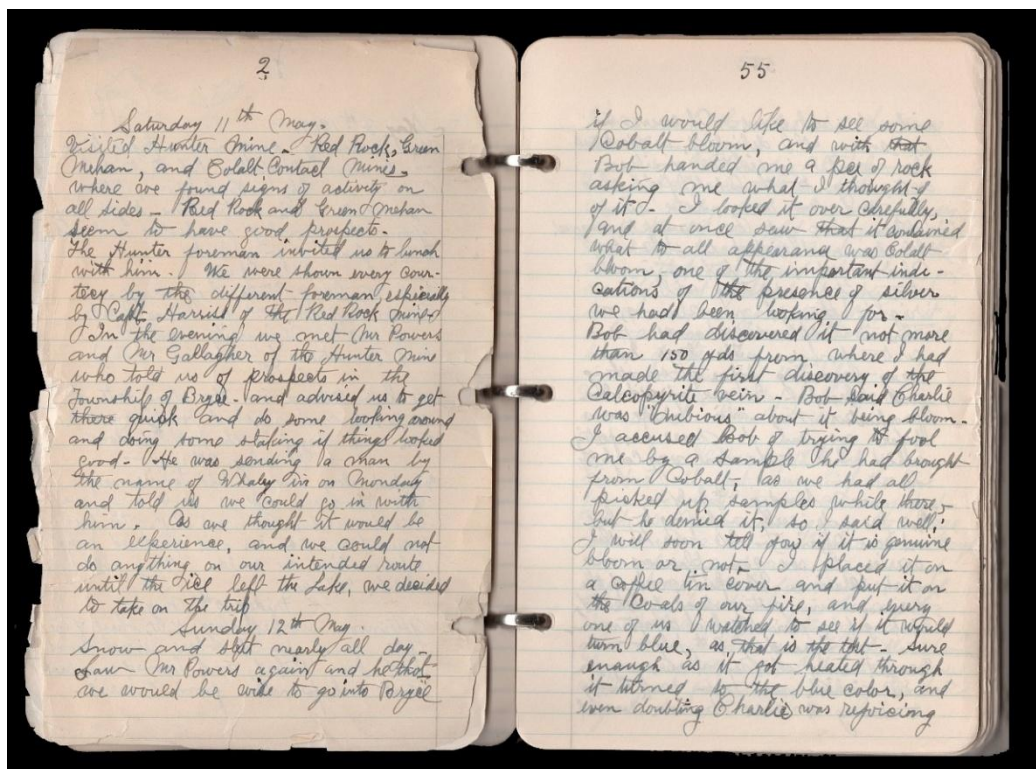
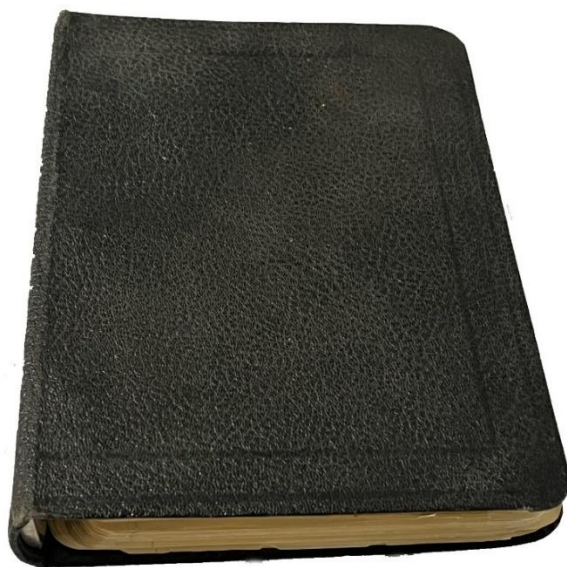
Item 653-23 – **Lunenburg NS to New South Wales** – 1899, 3¢ Maple Leaf tied by Lunenburg NS broken circle on 2¢ on 3¢ postal stationery envelope to New South Wales, Australia (b/s). Routed via St. John and Vancouver (b/s). This cover was mailed at the UPU letter rate. New South Wales did not join the UPU until 1907, 2¢ Empire was the rate at the time of mailing. \$125.00



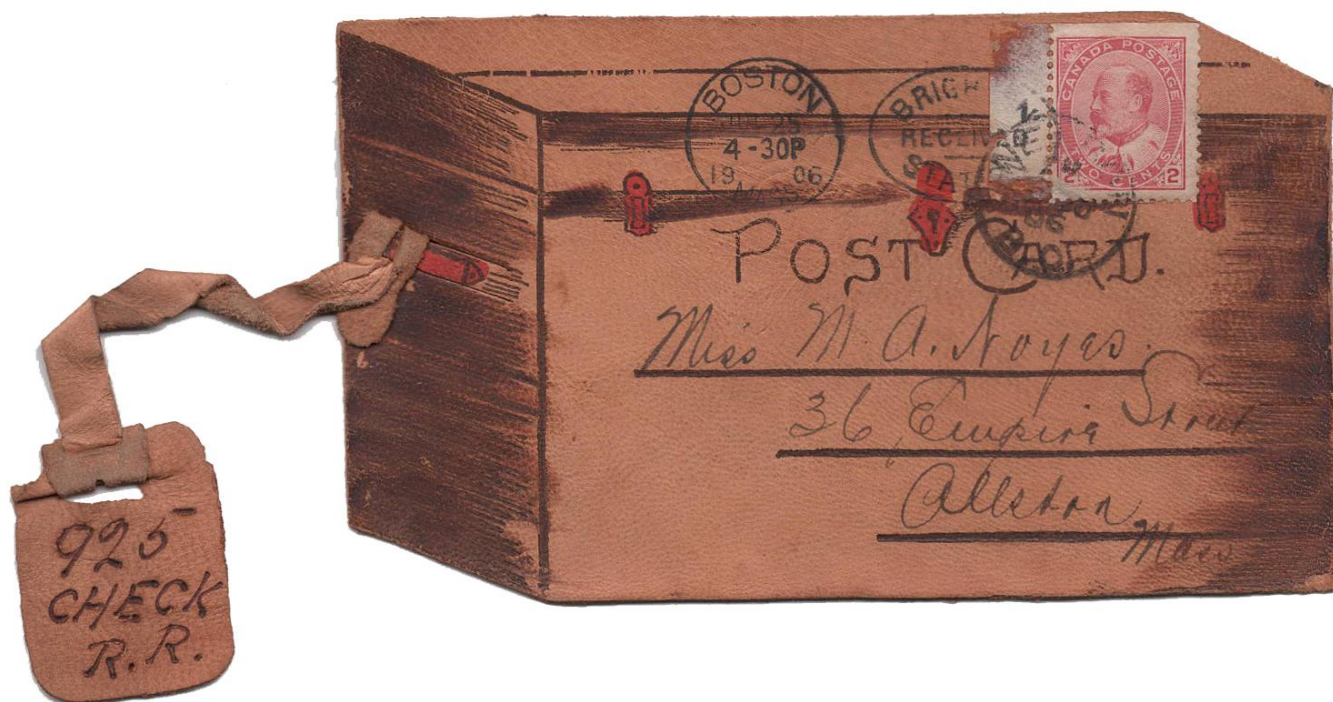
Item 653-24 – The Beacon Newspaper (St. Andrews NB) – 1902, 2¢ Numeral tied by grid cancel on The Beacon newspaper illustrated advertising cover, a striking lighthouse design, paying 2¢ letter rate to St. John NB (b/s). The Beacon was a weekly journal devoted to the interests of Charlotte County, New Brunswick. A very pretty cover. \$100.00



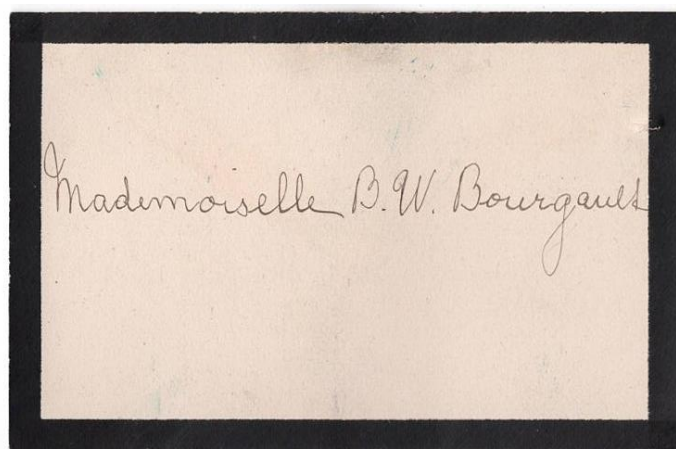
Item 653-25 – New Glasgow NS medicine and pharmacy – 1901, 2¢ Numeral pair tied by North Sydney NS cds on K.D.C. Co. Medicine and Pharmacy advertising cover, promoting remedies for ingestion and dyspepsia, paying 4¢ double-weight letter rate to Charlottetown, PEI. Then, redirected to Summerside and returned to Charlottetown. \$125.00



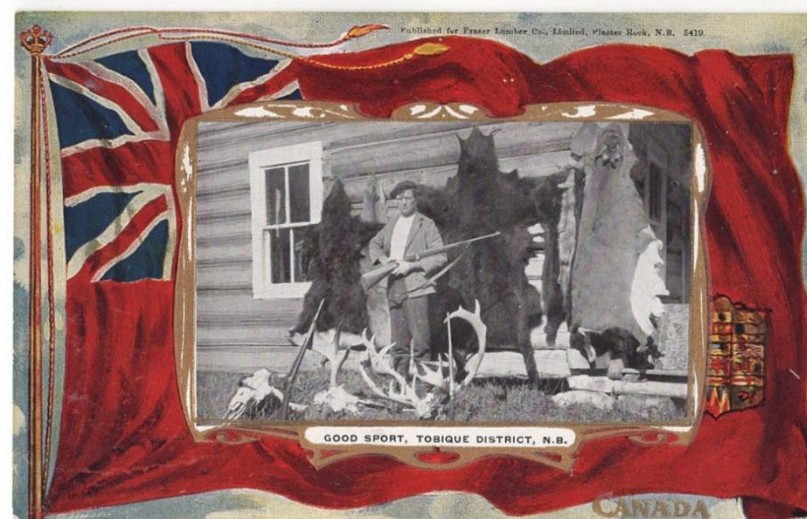
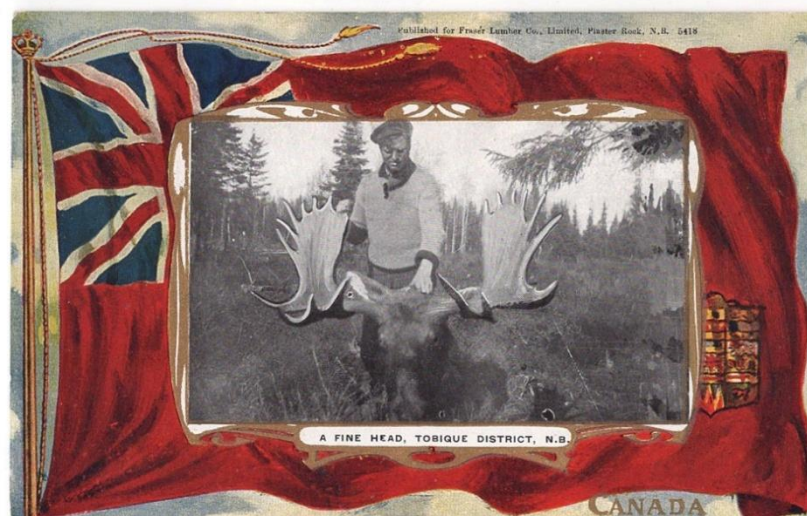
Item 653-26 – **A detailed diary kept by a miner in Northern Ontario** – 1907, an extraordinary and richly detailed 208-page diary kept by a miner during a silver and chalcopryite prospecting expedition in Northern Ontario, beginning in May 1907. Departing from Ottawa, the writer chronicles his journey northward by canoe along Lake Temiskaming, to Haileybury, Cobalt and to New Liskeard, capturing vivid scenes of camp life, encounters with trappers, and hunting with a Winchester rifle. His entries include time spent in Silver Creek and Heron Lake, offering a rare, immersive portrait of early 20th-century Northern Ontario exploration. So thoroughly descriptive and personal, the journal reads like a forgotten novel of Canadian wilderness life, truly an exceptional firsthand account of grit, solitude, and survival. 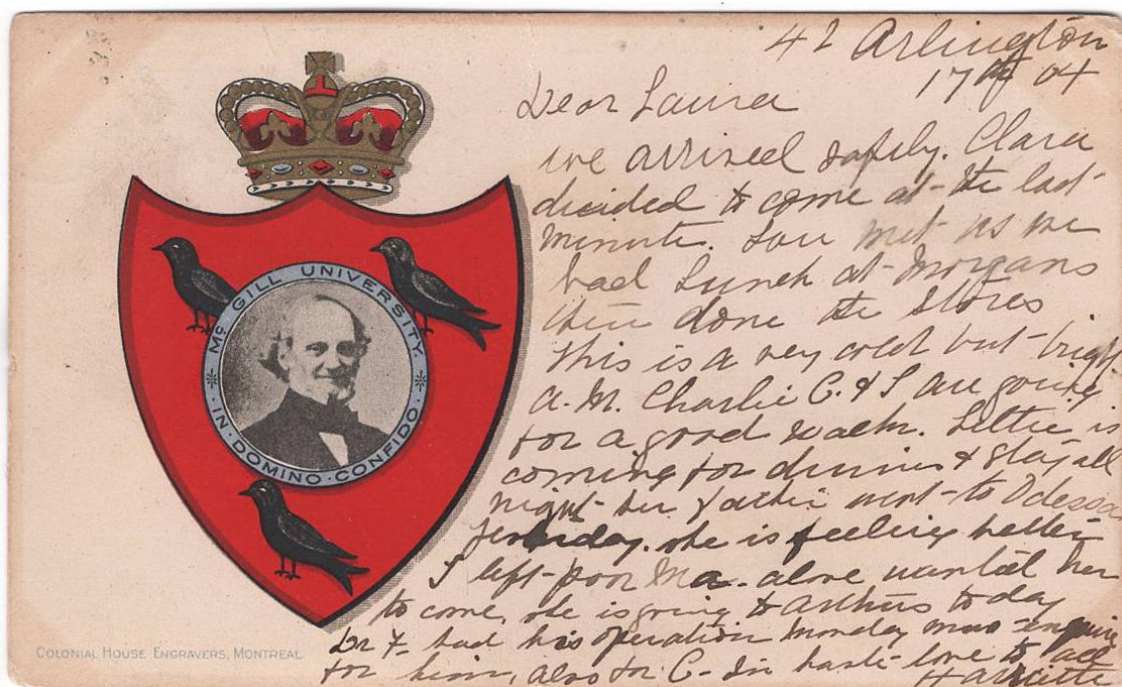

Item 653-28 – **St. Jean Port Joli Que mourning card and cover** – 1911, 1¢ Edward tied by grid cancel on a tiny mourning cover measuring just 95×65 mm, mailed from St. Jean Port Joli, Que, paying the 1¢ drop letter rate. Accompanied by a sympathy card written in French, reading in part: *"Please accept our deepest condolences"*. A nice example of mourning mail. \$45.00



Item 653-29 – **Trio of Tobique, NB hunting scenes** – c.1908, a rare set of three patriotic postcards depicting hunting scenes from Tobique, New Brunswick. Unused and richly illustrated, published by Warwick Bros & Rutter, Toronto. A rare and visually spectacular trio. \$150.00 **SOLD**



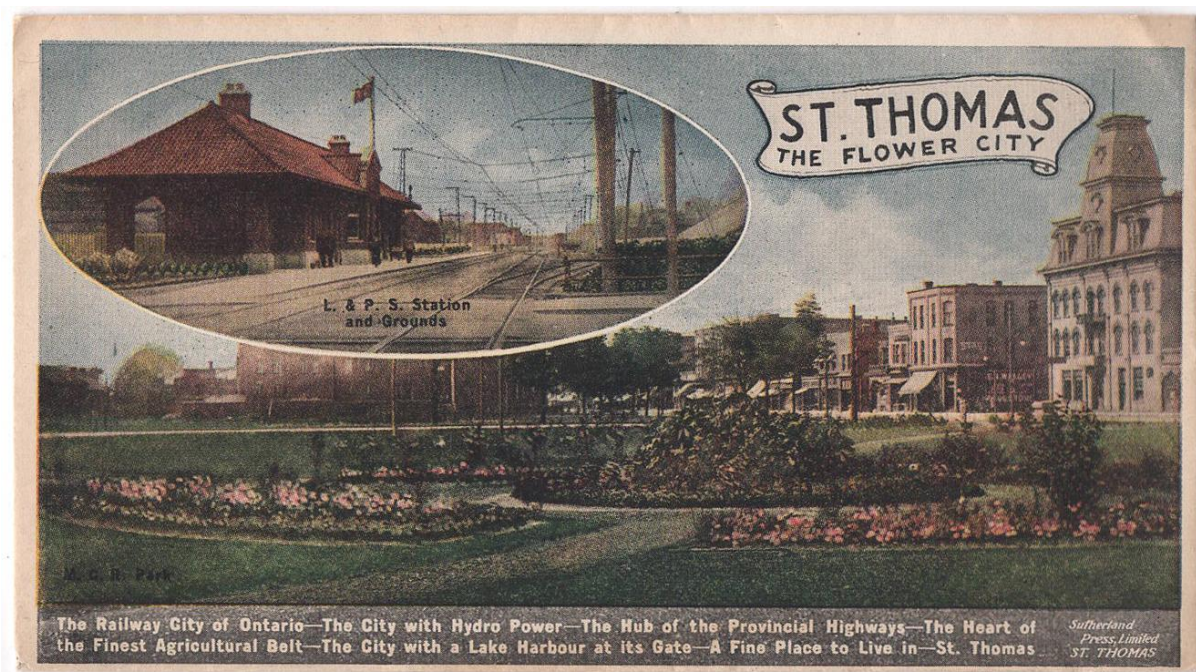

Addressed to Grand Trunk Railway storekeeper, with private receiver marking on front. A multifaceted 3rd class cover: steel industry origin, added corner card to a stationery, and railway related. \$50.00
